Dead ! OTTAWA, June 8 .- Sir John A. Macdonald died on Saturday night at 10:15 o'clock. It appears that from the day three weeks ago when the Premier was struck speechless while in the presence of the Governor-General Sir John was conscious that his end was near, although he fought against it and insisted that there was no danger and that he must work, evidently trying to convince himself that his fears were unfounded. At length the worst was realized, and what was known to himself, his Cabinet and his home circle, was revealed to everybody by the sudden and fearful stroke which descended while he was quietly and hopefully conversing

MONEY, METHODISM AND LOYALTY.

Many leaders of the workingmen Great Britain have joined in a manifesto strongly commending the adoption of the decimal system. In this manifesto they urge that the decimal system "would be to the advantage of commerce and industry, that it would tend to the reduction of the school rates, relief of mental pressure to the scholars and the simplification of accounts generally." Canada long since adopted the decimal system, and would not resort to the old method for a great deal. Yet the men who originally pronounced in favor of decimal currency in this country were denounced by the Tories of that day as plotters to hand over the country to the Yankees. These self-styled "loyalists" were absolutely certain that with assimilated currency it was only a question of a very short time when we would have a demand for assimilation in political institutions. And so it has been all down the years. Whenever a reform has been proposed by the Liberal party calculated to advance the interests of our common country and to maintain the most cordial trade and other relations with our brethren over the border, they have been denounced

as traitors. Why it seems almost incredible, nevertheless it is a fact, that the apologists for class legislation in the early days of Canada regarded every person and every institution that did not agree with their peculiar views as traitors and disloyal, to be hounded out of the country.

The early Methodist preachers had but one object in view-the spiritual welfare of the people. Yet Dr. Ryerson, in his inter book, tells us that the chief charge against Methodism during more than 30 years was that its ministers were disaffected to the Government and institutions of the country. Such, Dr. Ryerson affirms, were the pretexts for the persecutions against Christianity during the first 300 years of its history, and in the early days of the Metho dist Church in Canada history was repeated. Some of the preachers were interrupted and insulted, and seized by constables while preaching-in one or two instances headed by the sheriff-under the pretext that they were vagabonds-the vagabond offense being the preaching of the Gospel from place to place to a spiritually destitute people. Their assailants declared that none but clergy of the Established Church of England should preach in the colonies. though there were at that time but two such in all Upper Canada.

In one instance near Kingston, according to Mr. Playter, a writer quoted by the Methodist Magazine of April last, while Mr. McCarty, a Methodist preacher, was officiating at Robert Perry's house, four armed men came up and rushed into the congregation intending to take the preacher to jail. The congregation interposed, and Mr. Perry agreed to give bail, when the men went away. Subsequently, the preacher was arrested in Kingston, and tried and found guilty of being a vagabond. He was seized, thrown into a boat under the care of four Frenchmen, who were directed to leave him on one of the then desolate islands of the St. Lawrence. Here they landed him, left him, and he was never afterwards heard of. Undoubtedly, McCarty was a martyr for the Gospel, and so he was regarded by the early inhabitants. We have copied freely from Dr. Rvergon's statement to show how easy it has been in all the ages, and especially in Canadian experience, for the fearful privileged ones to raise a cry of "disloyalty" against those who do not agree with them, or who may menace the class laws that favor them. The Tory class legis laters who threw the poor Methodist preachers of pioneer days into jail and branded them as disloyal vagwere the prototypes the men who in later days denounced the principle of representation by population as disloyal; who dubbed the proposal to estab-lish a decimal currency in Canada as ulated to bring the country under the sway of the States; and who very recently were arguing with might and main that the

proposal to have the greatest liberty to buy ng disloyalty of the age !

The times have changed, but the tactics of the believers in class privileges have not.

THE FUTURE.

The London Free Press berates Liberal newspapers for discussing the Conservative leadership at this stage, It is pertinent to ask, Who introduced the subject? None other than the Toronto Empire, the chief organ of the party. No sooner was Sir John given up by the doctors than the Empire began to discuss the succession to his mantle. Has our city contemporary been asleep, or has it one code of conduct for Liberal and another for Conservative journals? The Free Press is equally astray when it alleges that there are no feuds or internal disturbances in the high tax party. One has but to remember Mr. Tarte's arraign-75 ment of Sir Hector Langevin and his bosom companion, McGreevy; Mr. Chapleau's open ostility to Sir Hector's influence; the demand of many Conservatives that Sir Adolphe Caron should be replaced; and the opposition of Mr. Davin and other western Conservatives to Mr. Dewdney. A "unity" of these incongruous elements may be effected, but only for a short time. Meanwhile, the Liberals are united to a nan under leaders who daily make their influence felt in Parliament, and who are evoted to the best interests of the people. They have a winning policy, because it is ounded on a determination to secure fair play for every taxpayer in the land. The policy of the men who have but recently returned from the electors where they went on a false issue and are now exposed, even on the evidence of Sir Charles Tupper, is one of duplicity, of sectionalism, of class legislation. Such a policy cannot be long maintained, and there are many Conserva-tives who have reached that conclusion. The country needs and must have a change.

The resolution was a proper one, and should have been adopted. It was only a declaration of facts, and should have had the support of every fair-minded member of the House. The division was on strictly party lines, and the smallness of the ma jority is significant of the waning fortunes not only of Tupper but of the Administration that boasts of its endorsement of his doings. The end of the corrupt regime cannot be far off.



The London Teachers' Association held its semi-annual meeting Friday in Colborne street school, President Graham in the chair. Sixty-three teachers answered the roll call. The librarian, Miss Robertson, reported the library in Simcoe street school contained 167 books. It was decided to rent a room in a central locality. President Graham delivered his annual adress, and fin the discussion that ensued it President Graham delivered his annual address, and fa the dist ission that ensued it was agreed that it was impossible to carry out the Board's wishes regarding recesses owing to the small grounds of most of the schools. A resolution to that effoct will be presented to the Board. The inspector suggested the plan of dividing the association into eight sections, corresponding to the grades in the schools, the sections to the grades in the schools, the sections to hold separate meetings in the forenoon, and all to meet for a combined session in the afternoon.
