

Sixteen-year-old Robert Pudney, of Ottawa, has been placed behind the bars for shooting a little lad named Albert Barry, 7 years of age. Pudney, with other lads, was playing with a pistol.

The alarm caused by recent burglaries in St. John, N.S., does not subside, for many persons have engaged special watchmen to guard their premises, while others have had their plate removed to bank vaults for safe keeping.

The Atlantic steamships are meeting with stormy weather now. The Dominion Line steamship Toronto experienced a severe storm, and some of her boats were damaged. She also met with several dangerous icebergs.

Excitement in Victoria, B. C., Over the Seizure of the Sealers—No Official News at Washington.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 2.—The news of the seizure of the sealing schooners by the Russian man-of-war has created unusual excitement here. General action will be taken to bring the seizure to the attention of the Government and to obtain redress,
Washington, D. C., Sept. 2.—Capt.
Shepard, in charge of the Revenue Marine
Bureau of the Treasury Department, has
not yet received confirmation from any of
the revenue cutters in Bering Sea of the
reported arrest of the British and American
scalers by a Russian manof-war for illegal. ders by a Russian man-of-war for illega sealing in the neighborhood of the seal islands still owned by Russia in the Bering Sea and leased to the Alaska Commercial

Sea and leased to the Alaska Commercial Company.

The fact of these arrests being made more than three miles from shore is not doubted. The occurrence will have a pointed bearing upon two of the questions to be arbitrated upon, viz.: What exclusive jurisdiction in the sea now known as the Bering Sea, and what exclusive rights in the seal fisheries therein, did Russia assert and exercise prior and up to the time of the cession of Alaska to the United States; and second, how far were these claims of jurisdiction as to the seal fisheries recognized and conceded by Great Britain?


