Succession of 160 Shocks.

TEHERAN, Nov. 29 .- Details of the earth quake disaster at Kuchan recently are arriving. The first shock, which occurred arriving. The first shock, which occurred Nov. 17 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, completely destroyed the town and all the villages within a radius of 30 miles of Kuchan. The official reports confirm the previous advices that 12,000 persons and 50,000 animals perished. Private reports, however, place the number of dead at a much smaller figure. The shocks continued daily until Nov. 24. Altogether there were 160 shocks. On Nov. 23 a great storm set in, with heavy rains in the day-time and snow at night. This greatly increased the suffering of thousands of persons whose homes had been destroyed. Supplies of provisions and clothing are being forwarded from Meshed, which also experienced several slight shocks.

The Matsheles cut off the breats of many women and hacked and speared the children. Some of the women were terribly wounded and are still in the hospital. The chartered company explicitly denied the assertion that the Mashonas were allowed to kill the Mataheles who were wounded during the fighting. London, Nov. 29.—The appeal of Miss Jennie Mighell from the decision of the lower court, which held that the courts had no jurisdiction over the Sultan of Jahore, was dismissed to-day. Miss Mighell, who is a handsome girl residing in Brighton, met the Sultan some years ago, when he was introduced to her as Albert Baker. Miss Mighell claimed the Sultan promised to marry her. She finally learned of his identity and continued to receive him and corresponded with him on the occasion of the Sultan's last visit to England. Miss Mighell, who believed that she was to return to India with him, made some communication which he refused to acknowledge. Finding that she was ignored she brought suit against the Sultan for breach of promise of marriage, placing her damages at \$50,000. The Sultan pleaded that he was a reigning sovereign, and therefore the English courts had no jurisdiction whatever over him. This contention has now been upheld by the Court of Appeal.

The Fastest Run Ever Made on the Canada Division of the M. C. R. Canada Division of the M. C. R.

A phenomonal run, eclipsing all previous ones, was made on the M. C. R. this morning. Train No. 19, North Shore limited, is a very fast one, making 50 miles an hour, including stops, from river to river. This morning she was 25 minutes late at Clifton. Engineer Cooper, with engine 431, brought her from Hagersville to St. Thomas, 64 miles, in 64 minutes, including slow-ups at Port Dover Junction and Yarmouth for railway orossings. The average time made between Hagersville and St. Thomas, excluding the time lost in slowing up, was nearly 68 miles an hour, although there was a strong head wind. Six miles were made in five minutes in a few instances. This is the fastest run ever made on the Canada division of the M. C. R.

FIT FOR THE GODS.

How the Pig Was Honored by Greeks and Romans - Fork the Most Epicurean of Uishes - An Aristocratic Fad.

Aristocratic Fad.

Greece and Rome ored the pig upon the altars of the nation in sacrifice, while the banners of Italy bore the effigy of the animal as an emblem of fecundity. Before the Roman standards the conquered prostrated themselves, for the image of the pig they bore betokened the elemency of the victor. When kings or princes wed, pigs were made a sacrificial offering. In the days of Greek ascendency the noble Athenian knew of no greater delicacy to offer his guests than a smoked ham, regarded one of the rarest dainties of the feast.

In ancient Rome the pig was the center of attraction, the aristocratic fad of the times. Spare-ribs, ham and bacon, pig's head and feet, tenderloin, were regarded dainty dishes by the epicure. Not only were parts of the pigs—in those days costly and precious—preserved in brine, but they were parts of the pigs—in those days costly and precious—preserved in brine, but they were covered with a paste in which honey figured and were then placed in a closed vessel. There were in those days Lilliputian pigs and giant pigs, regular Gollaths, for one of which King Enmenes paid what to-day would be equivalent to \$500. Those huge animals, when up to standard, measured four feet seven inches in height and as much in length.

Soyer, the renowned apostle of gastronomy, makes the pig a discoverer, for it brought to notice and use as food truffles and he says: "In refusing to it brilliant external qualities, nature, by a wise compensation, has conterred on it others much more solid; and this quadruped, so despised during its lifetime, does not fail after its death to conciliate the constant favor of rich and poor—of the man indifferent to the attractions of good cheer, and of the spharite, ever attentive to enlarge its domain." Apicius, another renowned chef, placed it first in the list of meats susceptible to the work of skilled chefs. Nature, says a renowned Grecian philosopher, created the pig for man's palate; he is good only to be eaten. Its flavor was called exquisite, and while in form there was no comeliness and beauty about the pig, this only seemed to enhance its value as food with the ancient Romans and Greeks, whose feasts and suppers surpassed those of modern times.

CROWDED FROM THE FARM.

The Vast Improvements of Haif

Compel Farmers to Leave Their Home and Sock Their Fortunes Elsewhere.

(New York Eun.)

Prior to 1850, practically the entire agricultural development, as well as the production of the great staples, was in regions more or less densely covered with forests; and there the bringing into cultivation of a farm of 80 acres was the arduous work of a long life. On the other hand, just as soon as the prairie regions were reached, the energetic settler could reduce 80 acres to cultivation by as many days' work with a good breaking team; 80 acres the productive power of which averaged a fourth more than that of the 80 covered with stumps, while the labor cost of production was at least a third less than that during the existence of the obstructing stumps, or, say, another generation. Only by the development and cultivation of the prairie areas were the possibilities of improvement in mechanical aids to agriculture made clear, and there these aids have been and still are most in use.

Such aids and the saving of all the immense expenditures of labor formerly devoted to removal from the surface and placing in stone fences the boulders of seaboard states and the conversion of the forests into rail fences and cordwood, has these the savet convert of mysellar forces.

board states and the conversion of the forests into rail fences and cordwood, has liberated a wast amount of muscular force that is now either employed in actual production on the farm or in the town or distributing the wares produced.

Forty to fity years ago it was the work of years to split the rails and to inclose a quarter section of land. Now, however, the same area can be inclosed with wire fence at a cost no greater than twelve months wages of an ordinary farm laborer, and the galvanized wire being practically indestructible the fence will last half a century if strung upon posts as durable as locust, mulberry or cedar. The rail fence required almost constant care; it soon decayed and was a never-ending source of annoyance in the harbor furnished for weeds and vermin. But now the labor of inclosing the farm has been reduced at least three-fourths, and the cost maintenance nearly to nothing.

The result of these successive improvements is that, whereas it required ten men to cut and place in shock ten acres of grain 40 years ago, three men now, with the aid of four horses, can place from sixteen to eighteen acres in the shock; and wherever the ordinary hervest time is fairly dry, the "header" enables eight men to cut and place at once in stack 30 acres a day, the labor-saving effected by the header being greater even than that with the self-binder, while the grain is at once secured from the deterioration usually resulting from weathering in the shock. By this progressive advance toward a higher civilization, four men out of the five formerly emyloyed in harvest work have been actually and visibly pushed off the farm and into the ranks of those seeking work in the towns. The work of the farm has deserted the farmer's son; not the son the work.

Equally destructive of employment on the farm have been the mower, the wheeled hay rake, the hay tedder, the hay loader, the self-feeding steam threshing machine, the gray plow, the grain drill, the broadcast seeder, the two-horse corn cultivator, the corn lister and a thousand and one other labor-saving devices; and when to the employment-lessening effects of all these we add the reduction of labor due to cessation of forest clearing, rail and stone fence building, and the conversion of timber into fuel and its carting to town, we can get some idea of that irresistible force which has crowded as many of the sons of the farmer off the soil, and which but for the normons increase of the number of farms up till the middle of the zineties would have crowded still greater numbers into the ranks of those engaged in manufactures and distribution, as it certainly will crowd them in the years to come.
