It was twenty-one years ago that the first 2:10 mile was trotted. That epochal feat was performed by Jay-Eye-See at Providence, R. I., Aug. 1, 1884, and it marked an era in light harness history. The next day Maud S. trotted in 2:09% at Cleveland. It was seven years before another 2:10 trotter appeared. Then five-Sunol (2:0814), Palo Alto (2:0834), Nancy Hanks (2:09), Allerton (2:0914), and Nelson (2:10)-dropped in.

That was in 1891. The next year the "bicycle sulky" was introduced, and from that date 2:10 trotters have been multiplying at a comparatively rapid

At the close of last year there was a grand total of 222 trotters with official records of 2:10 or better. Of these 32 had entered the list in 1904. This was the largest number on record for a single season, and it was commented then that it might be some time before such a showing was equaled, and a long time before it was beaten. However, the returns for this season show that last year's record has been exceeded by two in 1905, and a new one of 34 new 2:10 trotters established.

This is very gratifying to breeders and students of the "breeding problem," as it is conclusive evidence that extreme speed is being produced with more certainty every year, as the result of their constant study to improve the trotting breed by the systematic, intelligent use of the best strains of blood, properly crossed .- Chicago Record.

Tim Murnane of Boston, writes as follows regarding the baseball season: "The most successful season financially the American League ever had," said President Ban Johnson in New York last week. "We thought we were doing pretty well last season, but have played to 400,000 more people this season than last, every club in the American League making money." Mr.Johnson was speaking by the book, for he is in close touch with the business department of each club, and supervises all accounts.

A rough guest would place the following "rake-off" for the eight clubs of the American League: Chicago \$100,000, Philadelphia \$60,000, Boston \$40,000, Cleveland \$40,000, Washington \$30,000, St. Louis \$25,000, New York \$20,000, and Detroit \$10,000-a total of \$.30,000. A rough guess at the winnings of the National League would be: New York \$125,000, Pittsburg \$60,000, Chicago \$60,-000, Cincinnati \$30,000, Philadelphia \$25,000, St. Louis \$20,000, Boston even, Brooklyn loser \$10,000-total winner, \$300,000.

On the other hand, the field of interdenominational operation is to provide the machinery by which the great system of uniform lessons may be furnished to the denominational houses; to continue to agitate for the best in Sabbath school work; to stimulate the denominations to vie with each other in a friendly, but vigorous, effort to surpass, not each other, but themselves in the work; to Quicken pastors, encourage teachers, popularize Bible study, and to draw the denominations closer and bind them together in Christian fellowship.
