Pte. Ivan S. Rossiter Tells Story of Being Confined With Diseased Men, of Being Fed on Poorest Food, of Being Flea-Ridden and of Unbelievable Conditions — Battle of Somme Brought Better Treatment for British Prisoners-Captured After Being Wounded and Returned as Unfit for Further Military Service.

The first Londoner to survive the horrors of German prison camps and to be exchanged, incapacitated for further military dreadful treatment of Canadians capservice, is Pte. Ivan S. Rossiter, who arrived on Friday bearing accounts of German treatment toward Canadian and English pri oners of war which surpass in dreadfulness the worst reports which have been circulated in Canada. He is now with Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Tanner, 428 St. George street, and today gave The Advertiser an interview on his experiences.

He received no personal ill-treatment, as German military authorities take the greatest pains to prevent men who have been naltreated reaching their own countries with the story, His tale is rather one of neglect and of brutal disregard of men

Christmas Stockings

Every Canadian soldier in England and France received a Christmas parcel on December 25. In the Canadian Red Cross hospitals every patient, whatever his nationality, was given a Red Cross Christmas stocking; 3,000 were sent through this branch alone, besides many other kinds of "Christmas cheer." One of the boys, writing home said "the Canadian women have done us proud."

Prisoners of War

For reasons that have already been stated in the press, no more private can be sent to prisoners in Germany.

But from the Canadian Red Cross Society's offices in England (special department) each prisoner of war receives a weekly parcel of food to the value of \$2.00, besides six pounds of bread (two pounds from Holland, four pounds from Switzerland).

The Red Cross also supplies clothing for each man

A parcel may be posted here, but the Government authorities in England will not torward it. All such parcels are sent to the Red Cross offices, to be examined and repacked in the authorized boxes.

This is not a Red Cross regulation. It is a Government regulation

The prisoners are actually dependent on this supply of food.

There are at present 2,196 Canadian prisoners of war in Germany.

Each prisoner costs approximately:

\$120.00 a year. 10,00 a month 2.50 a week. 35 a day.

The number of prisoners is increasing slowly but surely.

Last year this branch sent \$4,294.31 to this fund.

During that time private parcels in great numbers were being sent to the prisoners



Proceedings of the Huron & Erie Annual Meeting

The Fifty-third Annual Meeting of the Shareholders of the Huron & Erie Mortgage Corporation was held at the Corporation's offices in London, Ontario, on February 14th, 1917. The President, Mr. T. G. Meredith, K.C., took the chair, and Mr. Morley Avlsworth acted as Secretary.

The President, in moving the adoption of the Annual Report and Financial Statement, said:

"I shall not long detain you today, as the figures in the Report before you tell the story of another year under war conditions.

"The outstanding feature is the growth of THREE-QUARTERS OF A MILLION DOLLARS in the Company's assets, despite repayment to Great Britain of over half a million dollars on maturing debentures. This increase was rendered possible by the high standing of the Huron & Erie in Canada, and the energetic campaign for funds referred to at our last Annual Meeting.

"While the rates offered by the British and Canadian Governments necessitated an increase in our own, yet we are able to report profits somewhat in advance of former years, and these profits were earned only after making ample allowance for possible losses.

"For the first time in many years, no losses were incurred on sales of mortgaged properties which came into our hands, and we again have to report that we have no real estate on hand, other than office premises.

"Throughout the year the demand for mortgage loans was light. and in consequence additional investments were made in War Loans and in the debentures of municipalities, School Districts and Rural Telephone Companies, all of the latter being charged upon and amply secured by

"The progress of the Canada Trust Company was both absolutely and relatively in advance of that of the Huron & Erie. Despite repayments of Scottish maturities, the assets of the Trust Company increased by nearly a million and a quarter dollars, thus bringing the total assets of both Companies beyond Twenty-Five Million Dollars. As the Reserve Fund of the Canada Trust Company now amounts to one-half of its Paid-up Capital, it is proposed this year to increase the dividend of that Company to 7% per annum, an increase which will benefit the Huron & Erie Shareholders to the extent of over nine thousand dollars.

"The Huron & Erie Mortgage Corporation continues to pay into the Dominion treasury, as a war tax, 1% of its gross profits, or more than \$10,000 per annum. In addition to the payment of this tax, certain smaller war taxes, and ever-increasing Provincial demands, the Corporation has given freely to various patriotic funds. You will later be asked to authorize the contributions made last year, and subscriptions for the current year, of \$7,500, to the Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross Society. As the Canada Trust Company has already voted the sum of \$2,500 for the benefit of the same causes, the shareholders of the Huron & Erie will, directly and indirectly, this year donate at least \$10,000 to

'These taxes and contributions are cheerfully paid, yet our Shareholders should not forget that Mortgage Companies are not making profits out of the war; on the contrary, they suffer (with countless others) from the abnormal conditions prevailing. Not only, as already mentioned, do we pay higher rates on our borrowed monies, and experience difficulties in investment, but various legislative enactments, particularly those of the Western Provinces, render more difficult the business of a Mortgage

"The task of the staff of our joint corporations has not been an easy one. The additional strain imposed by war conditions, and the absence from the office of those members who have enlisted, made the burden of the remainder the heavier. I am glad to testify to the cheerful willing

ness with which this burden has been carried.

'It has been well said, I think, that, during the greatest war of all ages, no one desirous of preserving a reputation for common-sense will venture to predict what the future may hold. I can, however, assure those interested in the Huron & Erie that both the directorate and management will use every effort to maintain the Company's strong standing, to safeguard its welfare, and throughout (as heretofore) to make safety rather than profit the first consideration.'

In the absence of Mr. Frank E. Leonard, the Vice-President and General Manager, Mr. Hume Cronyn seconded the motion to adopt the report, and spoke as follows:

"I desire to call your attention to the satisfactory position of our investment accounts so far as interest payments are concerned. While the harvests in Ontario and the West were below those of the preceding year, yet the high price of all grains and other agricultural products has enabled the farmer, as a class, to meet his obligations. So heavy, indeed, were the payments made to our Regina Branch by Saskatchewan borrowers, that slight deficits in Ontario and Manitoba were more than made up, and the Corporation, as a whole, carries as Interest in Arrear a sum smaller by \$10,000 than the amount on its books at the close of 1915.

"Early in the past year a Branch of the Company was established in the City of Edmonton, Mr. R. P. Baker, who for eight years has been in the Company's service, being sent to that centre as Accountant in charge. With the assistance of a careful Inspector, a moderate amount of money has been lent on mortgage throughout that portion of the Province of

Alberta devoted to mixed farming.

'In the City of Windsor, Ontario, a site has been purchased whereon it is intended, during the present year, to erect a suitable office building. 'We are glad to report that our alliance in Winnipeg with Messrs. Oldfield, Kirby & Gardner has been of distinct benefit to our institutions. The joint efforts of our staff at that point, and the firm mentioned, backed by our energetic Local Board, have already produced satisfactory results.

"The Audit Committee of your Board this year undertook, in conjunction with your Head Office Auditors, a careful examination of the bonds held by the Corporation. This physical scrutiny occupied many hours of the closest attention. I am pleased to state these securities were found in order and as represented in the Report, the adoption of which I have the honor to support.

The adoption of the Report carried unanimously.

A vote of thanks to the Directors and Staff was moved by the Ven-

The resolutions approving subscriptions to the Pension Fund and to the funds for various patriotic purposes were unanimously approved. The retiring Directors were re-elected for the ensuing year.




