London, July 29,-Great Britain, France and Italy are in complete agreement regarding negotiations with the Russian Soviet Government, despite statements to the contrary made by sensational and inaccurate newspapers, declared Premier Lloyd George in the House of Commons today, in replying to questions concerning the Boulogne conference.

Warsaw, July 29.—By the Associated Press.—Additional French officers at-tached to the military mission have ar-rived. All of them will be assigned to various Polish units as technical advisers. A large officers' school, under the supervision of French officers was opened today at Rembertoff, a suburb of Warsaw. of Warsaw.

The appeal of Mr. Leitch against the valuation of his property on Hillcrest has suggested this opinion, and it will probably be determined by the judge of the county court.

The village court of revision will hold an adjourned session on Monday, but the objection raised by Mr. Leitch will scarcely be considered by the court as it is made up of laymen. There are less than a dozen appeals to be heard, but they are of big importance to the revenue of the municipality. Among them are the appeals of the London and Port Stanley Railway, who also aver that the assessment is "illegal." The property of the commission is appraised at \$113.805. Returned Soldier.

Some of the Men Would Favor Accepting Government Suggestion.

council, appointed to investigate the proposal of the Government to give all returned men, who are entitled to pensions their money in a lump sum, will be held tonight in the armories. The Government suggested that all returned men drawing disability pension be given their entire pension in a lump sum, instead of so much each month. When this was made known many of the men declared that this would be much to their advantage. A soldier drawing 5 per cent disability pension, \$90 a year, would receive \$600 in a lump sum. If the men took their pensions by the year, the man drawing 5 per cent disability pension would receive in sixteen years, \$720, and the man drawing 5 per cent disability pension would receive \$1.440. Such a summary of third party government in the United States could not be complete without one more example. It was not until 1892 that Socialists first ran a candidate for presidency in the United States. In that year they polled twenty-one thousand votes out of twelve million. In 1904 their vote had grown to four hundred and two thousand out of a total of thirteen millions. Since that time their strength has varied from over 400,000 in 1908, to 901,873 in 1912, and down to 600,000 in 1916.

In the United States, when an amendment to the constitution is proposed, it must, in order to become a part of the constitution, be passed upon first by a two-thirds vote of the House of Representatives, and two-thirds vote of the Senate, and it is submitted then to the several states, and three-fourths of these must adopt the proposed amendment before it can become law. Subsequen to this adoption, Congress passes an enforcement act to carry out in detail the principle adopted by the amendment. The enforcement act may be amended from time to time by a majority vote Congress, like any other act, as it is not in itself

All this cannot be done in a short period of time, but during the years 1918-19 a constitutional amendment was enacted, making prohibition the law of the land for the whole of the United States It had to receive the indorsement of three-fourths. or 36 of the 48 states, to become law. It received the indorsement of 44 or 45 of the states. This should not be confounded with the war-time prohibition regulations. The constitutional amendment was enacted when the Prohibition Party was the smallest in its career, but their objects had been

noused or taken up by the other parties, and hence the result.

Liberais Should Take Heed. In the Federal elections in the United States in 1912 the Wilson party polled 6,293,019, Taft 3,464,956, and Roosevelt 4,119,507. 





C., dealt largely with the question of rural neglect. He stated that this is not now neglect.
