However, those now engaged in the business do not encourage this idea. They fear that increasing the coduction will degrease the price. Canada imports upwards of twelve million pounds of leaf annually, of which more their eleven millions come from the United States. Most of this is cigar tobacco, but how much is burley, the same as the variety raised in Canada, is not shown in the returns. Considering the amount of smoking and chewing totacco in the plug form that is manufactured in Canada yearly, burley tobacco of different kinds must be imported in large quantities. DRY FARMING.

Explanation of the Principles of the

What western people have become accustomed to call the "Campbell system of dry farming" consists simply in the exercise of intelligence, care, pa-tience and tireless industry. It differs in detail from the good farming meth-ods practiced and taught at the various ods practiced and taught at the various agricultural experiment stations, but the underlying principles are the same. These principles are two in number: First, to keep the surface of the land under cultivation loose and finely pulverized. This forms a soil mulch that verized. This forms a soil mulch that permits the rains and melting snows to percolate readily through to the com-pacted soil beneath and that at the pacted soil beneath and that at the same time prevents the moisture stored in the ground from being brought to the surface by capillary attraction, to be absorbed by the hot, dry air. The second is to keep the subsoil finely pulverized and firmly compacted, increasing its water holding capacity and its capillary attraction and placing it in capillary attraction and placing it in the best possible physical condition for the germination of seed and the devel-opment of plant roots. The dry farmer thus stores water not in dams and artificial reservoirs, but right where it can be reached by the roots of growing

Through these principles a rainfall of Through these principles a railian of twelve inches can be conserved so effectively that it will produce better results than are usually expected of an annual precipitation of twenty-four inches in humid America. In considering the matter we have deduced our reckonings from what is considered the best authority on the considered the best authority on the subject. From this it appears that the temperature of a given mass of warm air is lowered in the ordinary course of atmospheric phenomena by one or the other of the processes mentioned in the following: By radiation to the cold sky, by radiation to the neighbor-ing masses of clouds or the cold ground, by mixture with cool air or by the absorption of heat in the expan-sion of ascending columns of air.


