Wheat and Marriages.—The Massachusetts Spy has gathered up the following as one of the modern discoveries of the politicians of the day, that the high price of agricultural productions diminishes the number of matrimonial contracts. The proof is sought in the statistics of England, and a table was exhibited by Mr. Rantoul in one of his lectures, showing that while rose and fell with the market value of grain. The evidence is contained in the columns of figures below, expressing the price of wheat and the number of marriages in the United Kingdom.

The average price of wheat in each year above stated, is 75s.; of marriages, 81,791.

"The Field of Blood" at Jerusalem.—At a late soiree of the Dublin college of physicians, a highly interesting paper was read by Dr. Wilde, giving an account of a remarkable tomb discovered at Jerusalem, which he had in person examined; and from the remains found therein he was led to believe it to be the "Aceldam, or field of blood," purchased with the 30 pieces of silver returned by Judas to the Jewish priests! The door way of this tomb was a mixed architecture, the pillars and pediment being Grecian: the floral embellishment on the architrave Hebrew, and the door itself solid stone, hung on horizontal hinges. Inside it was a large chamber hewn out of the solid rock, having smaller crypts in each of the three sides, in all of which human remains were found. The skulls which he exhibited, were of nations who never inhabited that land, therefore "strangers" at Jerusalem at this period. No Jewish remains were found. The skulls belonged to the Mongolian,

Æthiopian, or mixed races; two of them, on the authority of Pitchard, were of Turkish origin, one an African, probably a negro of Mozambique. The Tomb was accidentally discovered by an Arab of Siloc. The inference Dr. Wilde drew was, that it was the true Potters' field, being used for the burials of strangers who died in Jerusalem.

"Hung" versus "Hanged."—A vile Yankeeism has crept into use by Canadian writers, which is becoming so offensive to our ears, that we must venture to correct it, even at the expense of being thought pedantic or fastidious. Since hanging has become quite an every day occurrence, we must not here, that such a scoundrel was "hung," and such a vagabond is to be "hung." Quite recently, the *British Colonist* told us, that Robert Perry was sentenced to be "hung," the *Hamilton Express* talks about the Indian Powells being "hung," and the *Observer*, of Cornwall, calls Sutherland and the "Great Unhung." We take the liberty of reminding the Editors of these papers and other gentlemen, that "to hang," of which "hung" is the participle, is a verb active; and "to be hanged," of which "hanged" is the participle, is a verb passive. The hangman may have "hung" the criminal, but the man was "hanged." Therefore, while hanging continues to be fashionable in Canada, never let us hear again of a man being "hung"; unless indeed, but we must stop, lest the further expression of the idea should be deemed too indelicate for this refined age.—*King ton Whig.*

THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, JUNE 26, 1833.

No United States or Upper Canada papers were received by this morning's mail. The Kingston Whig of Saturday last received yesterday, says:

"There seems to be a deliberate intention on the part of the American Frontier Press, to mislead the Canadians and delude them into the belief that the late excitement has subsided, and no further attempts at murder and piracy will be made or encouraged by the American people. In this opinion, the American Patriot Case," and recommends such Canadians as may chance to be in the United States to return home, and submit themselves to the clemency of the British, making the best terms they can. From the very best authority we know, the operations are now on foot, on a larger scale than ever, to strike one more blow for Canadian independence," and we have reason to think that the shores of Lake Erie will be the scene of the forthcoming irruption. Of this our authorities have full intimation.

The Brigadier General Sutherland, who was for a long time confined in the citadel of Quebec, has been discharged, and is now in the United States. The Kingston Whig says,—"The recently emancipated General Sutherland, since his landing on the opposite shores of Cornwall has been haranguing the ladies and gentlemen of the State of New York (query—is there a native born gentleman in the United States?) upon the cruelties he experienced from the "dam'd Britishers" during his sojourn in Canada; and the cheers and other tokens of encouragement he received speak plainly the sentiments of his audience. When the liberation of such a man produces such a result, of what use is further clemency?"

The same paper states that another of the prisoners confined in Fort Henry has been liberated; but that all further liberations are ended; the sheriff and the high constable having received directions to make preparations for the departure of the remainder of the prisoners for New South Wales.

Our readers may remember that Her Majesty Queen Victoria presented Colonel Stone of the New York Commercial Advertiser, with a portrait of herself, on account of the pleasure she had experienced on perusing a memoir of Brant, lately written by Colonel S. It appears that there is a law in the United States declaring that, "if any citizen shall accept, claim, receive or retain any title of nobility or honor, or shall, without the consent of Congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office or emolument of any kind whatsoever, from any emperor, king, prince or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States." The New York Era argues from this that Colonel Stone has voluntarily disfranchised himself, forfeited his citizenship with all its rights, privileges and immunities, and is in all respects and purposes an alien. The Era mentions a similar circumstance occurring in the person of a Dr. Mitchell, who received a diamond ring from the Emperor of Russia, and who never voted at elections afterwards. Co-

lonel Stone has been appointed to proceed to Holland for the purpose of examining State papers connected with the Dutch settlement of the State of New York and reporting thereon, but the Era remarks that according to the strict letter of the law, his appointment must necessarily be cancelled.—Montreal Herald.

"Among our rivals," says the *Pictou Observer*, "we notice a cargo of Durham coal! Not King Coal's? Inflammatory politics, but a real veritable cargo of luminous coal from the demerits of the arch viceroy! Durham coals in Picton, and we exporting 30,000 chaldrons of lamely better quality! Bravo!"

The steamer *Canadian Patriot*, which sunk whilst lying at her winter quarters, has been raised, and has undergone a thorough repair, at an expense of nearly £1000. It is expected that she will commence running between Quebec and Montreal at the commencement of the next month, leaving the latter port each trip at six o'clock in the morning.

The steamer *Canadian Eagle* has arrived at Montreal from Sorel, where she has been repaired and painted. She is to take the place of the *John Bull*, and will commence her trips immediately.

The first number of a semi-weekly paper to be published in Quebec, under the title of "The Canadian Colonist,"—a prospectus of which was issued some time since,—is said will make its appearance on Monday next. The *Colonist* is to be printed by Mr. Jacques, who by a judgment of the Court of King's Bench has recovered possession of his printing materials.

The number of strangers arrived at Quebec within the last few days has been very great. The different hotels in town are nearly filled, and some of them are unable to accommodate all the visitors a plying.

A meeting of the gentlemen of Quebec and officers of the Garrison is to take place at Payne's Hotel on Monday next, to appoint a committee of management for the ensuing Quebec Races.

We learn from the New Brunswick Sentinel, that it is in contemplation to raise money in that province, for erecting a Wesleyan Academy; and that Charles Allison, Esq., of Sackville, in the County of Westmoreland, has offered to contribute to such an institution the sum of £4000, besides several acres of land and £100 per annum, for ten years, towards its support.

The *New York Commercial Advertiser* says, "we understand that all the berths in the main saloon of the *British Queen*, which is to sail from here for London on the first August, are already engaged, and that the list for the other state-rooms is filling up very rapidly."

United States.

Something Funny.—On Tuesday last, the young ladies of the schools held their annual May Festival, and elected a May Queen according to custom. The young lady having the majority of votes, was born in England, of English parents now settled in this country. Most of the other girls at once rebelled, saying they would not be governed by a British Queen. The Queen elect, either afraid to rule such turbulent subjects, or resenting this affront to her nationality, or what is more probable, from an amiable desire to prevent difficulties or unpleasant feelings, informed her teacher that she declined wearing an American crown.

Writs for a new election were issued, and the majority of votes were given for an American girl named English. Harmony was then restored, and three little republican monarchs, having in the old spirit of Anglo Saxon blood fixed their crown to suit themselves not the wearer, returned to their allegiance and frolic.

We see something prophetic in this. It proves that a crown could not fall to the lot of any thing decidedly American, but must devolve upon something English. This shows a natural repulsion between royalty and every thing American which indicates an eternal duration to our republic!—Phil. World.

Think you so, Mr. Jonathan? Why, we rather guess it is prophetic of quite the reverse. It is the symbol of your Republic. You impudently rebelled against your natural sovereign who was glad to decline the disagreeable task of governing such refractory subjects; but fate has a rod in pickle for you—the next cast of the die will yet leave you under English rule.—Halifax Paper.

Upper Canada.

Kingston, June 21st.—Information was given to one of the Aldermen of the town, that five casks of spurious coppers, amounting in weight to 23 cwt., consigned to John Roy, Esq., of Kingston, who is Paymaster of the 8th Regt. of Incorporated Militia, and who has recently returned from a visit to Montreal, were on board one of the O. & R. Company's barges from below. The Town Officer immediately proceeded to the office of the Collector of Customs and demanded the seizure of these coppers, which demand was forthwith complied with. We have seen some of these coppers and they are quite new, of the light kind, and made of bad brass, colored black by some chemical compound. By the computation of a gentleman present, the probable cost of this vile trash was £83—and should it pass into circulation as its nominal value, a net profit would accrue to the importer of £947!!! an amount almost incredible to those unacquainted with this abominable traffic.
