



Six numeral prefixes and five names give all metric tables of weight and measure, which can be formed by any Each term is a definition, and the prefix indicates the numerical value. A simpler scheme could not be devised. The essentials of the me tric system can be learned in a few minutes. Workmen can take up its use almost without instruction, in fact in metric countries the people need practically no formal instructions in the system. In contrast with the extreme ease with which the methic system may be learned is the fact that no living American can repeat the tables of weights and measures used in this country.
