DEATH OF ARCHBISHOP MCKINNON.

It is with feelings of extreme sorrow we record to day the death of His Grace Archbishop McKinnon, which occurred on Friday last at his residence in Antigonish. On the previous Wednesday he had an attack of paralysis which rendered him unconscious until he breathed his last. The last rites of the Church were administered to him by Father H. Gillis, his confessor. At his last moments, and during the three previous days, he was surrounded and attended upon by Bishop Cameron and a large number of his clergy. Archbishop McKinnon was born at William's Point in this County, in the year 1810. He was sent to Rome at an early age to pursue a course of studies in the famous Propaganda, where he was ordained priest. On returning to his native country, he was installed in the Parish of St. Andrew, where he served and labored in the vineyard of Christ with force and energy, and with great zeal and love for the salvation of souls for about sixteen years. On the 24th February, 1852, he was consecrated Bishop of Arichat in St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax. He continued Bishop of this Diocese until July 17th, 1877, when failing in health, on account of incessant labours, he resigned his charge. In consideration of the very many services which he rendered to the Church, the late Holy Father, Pope Pius IX, promoted him to the high rank of Archbishop, his titular See being Amydo in partibus infidelium. The funeral of His Grace, Most Rev. Dr. McKinnon, took place on Tuesday last. No sooner the holy and illustrious prelate surrendered his soul to God, than messages were sent to the neighboring Bishops, announcing the sad news of his death; and although all of them were at the time far away from their homes, on their episcopal visitations, and had to travel over difficult roads, yet such was the love, respect and veneration which they entertained for him that they strained every point to be present at his funeral, to pay their last homage to their noble and kind-hearted friend. St. Ninian's Cathedral was skillfully draped and well prepared for the occasion. The services for the dead began at 9 a. m. A Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Bishop Cameron, assisted by the Very Rev. Neil McLeod as Archdeacon, Rev. Canon Power and Rev. Fr. Martell as Deacon and Subdeacon, and Rev. Canon Murphy as Grand Master of Cereémonies. In the Sanctuary were also present, Most Rev. Michael Hannan, Archbishop of Halifax; Rt. Rev. Peter McLoiye, Bishop of Charlottetown; Rt. Rev. Dr. Rogers, Bishop of Chatham; Very Rev. Monsignor Trein, of New Orleans, Domestic Prelate to His Holiness; Very Rev. James McDonald and Dr. Chaisson, of Charlottetown; Revs. Canon Curmody and Fr. Kearns, of Halifax; Rev. Fr. Morrisey, of Chatham; Revs. W. B. McLeod, J. V. McDonald, H. Gerrier, R. McDonald, Andrew McGillivray, R. McGillivray, H. Gillis, W. Chisholm, Dr. McGrover, J. Obisholm, M. Thompson, W. LeBlanc, A. McKenzie, J. Grant, A. E. McGillivray, P. Wisset, Dr. Angus Cameron, Dr. Alexander Chisholm, James Fraser, James Quinn, Donald Cameron, Roderick McDonald, Wm. McPherson, D. J. McIntosh, F. Broussard, T. Richard, M. A. McPherson, M. Laffin, Dr. Joseph Quinn, Wm. B. McDonald, and E. Fougerson, of the Diocese of Arichat. After Mass the Rev. R. McGillivray, P. F. of St. Joseph's, delivered a most beautiful and touching panegyric on the life and labors of the deceased prelate. During the sermon no one could help noticing how deeply the audience felt and sustained the loss of him who was so dear, so much esteemed and so loved by them. It did not, in this vicinity, require any public demonstration to show the deep hold which Archbishop McKinnon's signal merits had taken of the affections of the people; but the congregation on Tuesday showed to the stranger that the services of the great prelate were treasured up in the popular heart. Our thanks are due to the concourse which assembled and to the thought which came uppermost as we watched the solemn pageant on Tuesday, that the illustrious dead was as much cherished abroad as at home.

His Lordship the Bishop of Arichat, accompanied by the Rev. Neil McLeod, P. F. of St. Joseph's, here yesterday morning on a visit to the U. States. We understand that his Lordship will be absent for about three weeks.

We have not yet ascertained the exact pecuniary result of last week's Bazaar, but believe it to be something about \$5500. Professor Henry How, D.C.L., who for many years past filled the chair of chemistry at King's College, Windsor, died yesterday (Sunday) morning; he had been failing in health for some time past. Professor How spent twenty-five years in this country, in connection with King's College, coming here from Glasgow. He was an able educationalist, and his death will be deeply regretted. The census made to the Provincial Exhibition held at Halifax this week amount to 3,800 and include 183 horse, 434 cattle, 244 sheep, 210 couple of poultry, 540 ounces of roots and vegetables, 283 of grain and field seed, 196 flax straw and wooten goods, 77 agricultural implements, 463 fruit, 193 plants and flowers; 79 manufactures metal; 125 fine arts; 191 ladies work. The Exhibition was formally opened on Tuesday, on which occasion speeches were delivered by Governor Archibald, Hon. Mr. Holmes, Mayor Tobin and Colonel Laurin.

Diphtheria has carried off five children, between fifteen and two years of age, within ten days, belonging to Donald McArthur, of Charlottetown. The heart-broken parents are left childless. An Ottawa despatch, dated Sept. 30, says H. R. H. the Princess Louise, who sails for England on the 18th October, will be accompanied by Lady Sophia Macsaurin and Hon. Mr. and Mrs. Marston. She is expected to return in January.

The towns de Chambord, to compensate the student Dominis who, for crying, "Vive le Roi!" at the Sorbonne, was deprived of a 1,000 franc prize he had gained, has sent him a present of equivalent value. The Russian Court invited Dr. Ayer, and his family, to a wedding in the Royal Palace. This distinction was awarded him not only because he was an American, but also because his name as a physician had become famous throughout the world.—Pueblo (Col.) People.

A small sum of money, picked up in a field near town, will be delivered to the owner on application to John McPherson, steward, Antigonish, or to the Hon. Mr. Miller, if he is in town.

It is said that the negotiations on long pending between Germany and the Pope have been broken off, but that negotiations have been opened on a different basis. We are not told what this means, but every one must know that the Catholic Church need expect little justice or fair play from Bismarck. It was said that the Belgian Government sent one of their number to treat directly with the Pope for a settlement of the troubles created by the party now in power in that country. The story was very improbable and it has been contradicted. The Government and those who support it are bitterly hostile to Christianity, and they are not prepared to make any proposition of which they could expect the Pope to approve. The story that the Belgian Bishops have applied to the Pope for definite and positive instructions as to the course they should pursue in the present circumstances is also most improbable.—Freeman.

There are not more than 228 Catholic clerical parishes, chaplains, directors and professors of seminaries, etc., vacant in the archdiocese of Freiburg, Germany. In other words, the number of priests in the archdiocese is less by 228 than its normal strength. The number of convents suppressed by the law in Italy has been 4,954. Though impossible to state exactly the number composing the communities of each, the result of official inquiry for above 3,000 of those religious houses shows that they were inhabited by 23,979 nuns and by 29,863 monks. They enjoyed a lawful income amounting to 24,618,618 francs, derived from the lands and estates belonging to the communities, and the rents paid to them thereon, as well as from the products of their industry and the economy of their own lives. No wonder that the Government looked with an evil eye on such thriving communities and on the 63,862 religious, who seemed to it a useless portion of its population, and no doubt it was thought quite a meritorious act to confiscate such property, though unlavishly, for better means and ends, such as for instance, building Rome a new city, or building a city with many theatres as she formerly possessed churches and convents.

LY CABLE. LONDON, Sept. 26.—In this country the feeling among the farmers is so deeply seated that consequences of a most serious character are to be expected. Within a few weeks very large meetings have been held in Ireland, and the expression of feeling on the part of the people (to the great payment of their claims were granted, as unmistakably manifested. Yesterday a great tenants' right meeting was held in Leitwell, at which 15,000 speakers were present. One of the speakers was Sir David Bismarck, of the County Kerry. At this meeting the farmers reiterated their purpose to refuse payment of any rent whatever until the landlords acceded to the terms which the tenants demanded; and which, in their opinion, were only just and reasonable, or until Parliament should pass a statute which should secure to them rights which they now demand. LONDON, Sept. 21.—Latest despatches from Simla report intelligence that General Roberts, commanding one of the British columns in Afghanistan, has completed his commissary and transport arrangements, and the advance on Kabul will commence without delay. Col. Baker will attack Kuski, a point about 40 miles off from Kabul. No confidence is placed in the Afghans, and military preparations will go on without reference to any action that Yakob Khan may take. General Roberts will be supported by a reserve of 4,000 men, under Generals Gordon and Doughty, holding Karam Valley and maintaining communication between the advancing forces and northwestern India. The influence of Asia at Kabul is said to be constantly more apparent. A detachment from the Viceroy of India, the Afghans are concentrating at Kuski. The line of communication in the Karam and Khyber valleys has been strengthened by considerable reinforcements and the various posts fortified in view of the possibility of local troubles.
