## A BRILLIANT SCHEME.

Gen. Joubert, Boer Commander-in-Chief, and His 20,000 Men

### WOULD OVERRUN CAPE COLONY.

In Two Weeks After a Declaration of War With Great Britain the Transvaal Authorities Would Be Able to Dictate Terms of Peace—Again, a Brilliant Scheme.

London, June 20.—The St. James Gazette yesterday afternoon claimed to have received from an absolutely reliable source at Pretoria, capital of the Transvaal, the plan of a campaign which will be followed by General Joubert, commander-in-chief of the Boers, in the event of war between the Transvaal and Great Britain. General Joubert's force, it appears, will consist of 20,000 men armed with Mauser rifles, in addition to 40 quick-firing guns and 1,000 artillerymen, most of them drawn from the German and Dutch armies.

## YANKS HARD PRESSED.

U.S. Reconnaissance Roughly Handled Near Manila.

### GENERAL WHEATON IN DANGER.

A Battalion of Immaturely Trained Filipinos Attack the 4th Infantry, Resulting From Instantly Five Killed and 25 Wounded—Rebel Loss Heavy—American Volunteers Are Tired of the War.

Manila, June 20.—A battalion of the 4th Infantry, which left Manila, where General Wheaton is in command, yesterday morning to reconnoitre toward Paredas Marina, where it was believed most of the rebels who escaped from Panay and Ilocos had fled, was attacked by apparently friendly natives in the rear, which broke up in a chaotic engagement, lasting several hours. It resulted in five Americans being killed and about 25 being wounded. The loss of the rebels was very heavy.

## RAISER HOLDS THE REINS.

Peace Conference Delegates Marking Time Until His Will is Known.

### WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.

London, June 20.—The Cape Town correspondent of The Daily Mail says that the Government has forwarded a list of heavy guns to Kimberley for the defence of the diamond fields. There is great activity in the Cape Imperial command, and munitions of war are being sent northward in large quantities.

## WEDDING WAS ALL ARRANGED.

Wedding of the Princess Louise and the Duke of Albany.

Washington, June 20.—The following cablegram has been received by the Adjutant-General from General O'Dea at Manila: "All volunteer organizations here desire to muster out San Francisco."

Reinforcements Arrive.  
Manila, June 20.—The United States transport Sherman, which sailed from San Francisco May 24, with 1,800 men and 75 officers, under command of Brigadier-General F. D. Grant has arrived here after a smooth voyage. One private died after the transport's arrival.

St. Petersburg, June 20.—The wedding of the Princess Louise, daughter of the Emperor, and the Duke of Albany, was celebrated yesterday at the Grand Hotel in St. Petersburg. The ceremony was a most brilliant affair, and the wedding party was the largest ever assembled in the city.

## ELLEN NEW CARDINALS.

The Pope Disposed of His Hat and Also Created Seven New Bishops.

Rome, June 20.—The Pope at the conclave held yesterday morning created 11 cardinals and a number of bishops. The cardinals created were: Mgr. Francesco Nava di Binofo, papal nuncio at Madrid.

Edinburgh, June 20.—In the Parliamentary by-election held yesterday in the southern division of Edinburgh, Mr. Arthur Dewar defeated the Liberal-Unionist candidate, Major-General Andrew G. Wauchop, carrying the division by a majority of 811 votes. This is a Liberal and Radical gain.

## ONE INDIAN SHOT ANOTHER.

Violent Wind and Hail Storm Near Steeles, Manitoba.  
Winnipeg, June 20.—The Attorney-General's Department received word yesterday afternoon from Leo Seal of the shooting of an Indian in the territory north of that point. An Indian, whose name is not given, was supposed to be going westward, or in other words, insane, and a member of the tribe named Thomas shot him as a duty. He has not escaped and is not yet arrested.

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

Mr. Tarte's Reply.

The Minister of Public Works (Mr. Tarte) said that the question of doing any work by day labor was an important one, and he felt that it would be well to consider it in an impartial manner, as he did not consider it a question of party politics, and also because in the present state of his health it was quite possible that unless there was a considerable improvement he might not be able to remain long in his present position. With regard to dredging, he considered that letting the work by tender was by no means so satisfactory as having the work done by the Department of Public Works, under the supervision of its officers. Experience had shown him that this was the cheapest and best way. In many instances works were of such a nature that it was impossible to call for tenders because the works were frequently largely experimental, and it was only after the work had been commenced that any proper estimate could be made of what was necessary to be done. He took up several of the cases instanced by the hon. member, and defended his action in each case, and said that he had acted after consultation with the proper officers of his department, and in the manner which seemed best to them and to him to be most in the public interest. He was not in the favor of the Government doing as much of its own work as possible, without the intervention of contractors, and a larger amount for the work done, and for profit to the contractor than if the work was done directly by the departmental supervision. 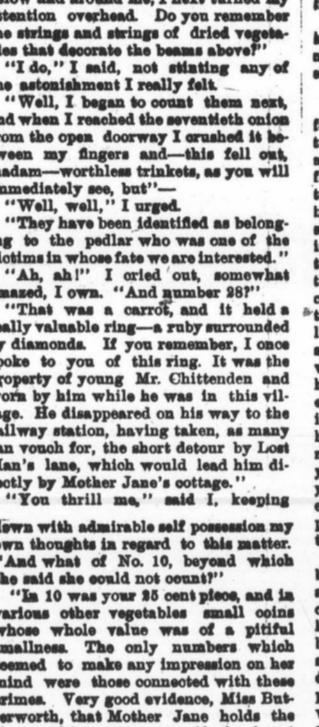

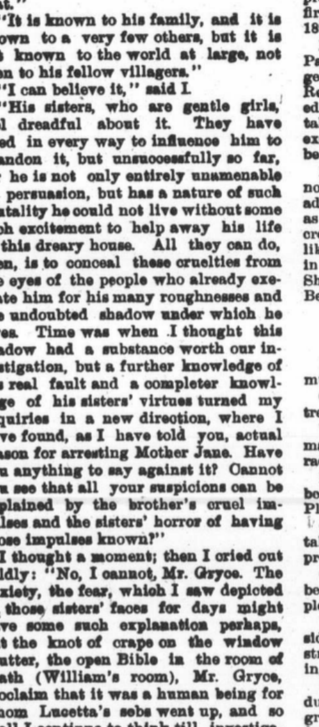

ORCHARD AND GARDEN.
Keeping the orchard trimmed adds much to the beauty of the farm. Give the first spraying on the apple tree as soon as the leaves are out well.
Wet rotted manure from the woodpile makes one of the best top dressings for radishes.
For strawberries select land that has been in cultivation two or three years. Plow deep and harrow well.
Old tin cans with the tops and bottoms taken off are good to set over plants as a protection against cutworms.
On every warm, sunny day the hotbed mashes should be soaped so as to admit plenty of pure air to the plants to grow.
When set out, if the trees are leaned considerably to the southwest, they will be straight by the time they come into bearing.
Plants that have been growing in pots during the winter may be set in the open ground as soon as the danger of frost is fully past.—Exchange.

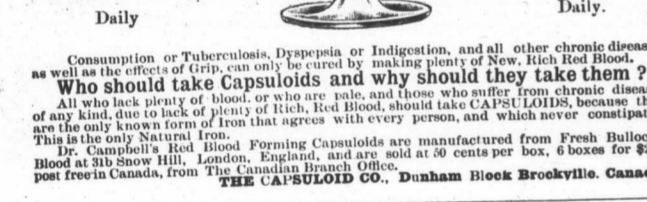
