After all, one may well believe that 50,000 men from Britain alone may make for the Yukon country next year, as asdence from Victoria, and goodness knows how mahy more from Canada, the States and Australasia. The day of the Pacific coast has come and with it a greater day for the Dominion. Had there been any doubt at all prior to this that Canada did well to assume when she did the great burden of building the C. P. R. there would be no question now that she com pleted the enterprise hardly a season too soon. Without the C. P. R. the wealth

of Yukon would be meaningless to the greater part of Canada. At the same time let us still remember that marvellous as the Yakon outlook is, the realization of all that is hoped of the product of gold will not equal the average grain crop of any one of several of our provinces. The Dominion need not lose its head about the Yukon even if fifty millions of gold are washed out by the placers next year or every year. The Ontario harvest this year was worth several times that; the Quebec harvest was double it; the harvest of Manitoba was worth more, and Nova Scotia's not worth less. The best of the Yukon outlook is that it promises from a vast territory which apparently was absolutely valueless, from thousands of miles of pitiless rock, barren scrub and eternal frost, a
