CHINESE SOLDIERS.

Novel Way in Which They Receive Their Pay.

The Chinese soldier receives his pay once a month only, and Chinese months, it must be remembered, are much larger than those we are accustomed to reckon by. On the eve of the pay day the captain of the company, together with the sergeant-major, goes and receives the amount of money requisite to pay his company from his next superior officer.

This is not paid to him in jingling oins, but in pure silver, which, however, has been broken into somewhat irregular pieces. The whole of the night preceding pay day is occupied in weighing out for each man the required quantity of silver, and this occupation, as may be imagined, is a very tedious one, and only uccessfully accomplished by infinite care, for here a piece the size of a pin's head must be clipped off, and there a piece of arger dimensions has to be added to make up weight, and any deviation one way or the other means the loss of peraps a day's pay or more to some poor

efender of the Celestial empire. When the process of meting out is acomplished the silver is carefully wrapped in paper, upon which is written the name of the intended recipient. On the following afternoon the company is mustered, and the sergeant-major divides the money, commencing with the first man in the ompany and going on to the last. When this division is concluded the question is asked in stentorian tones: "Has any one else a claim?" and the customary "No" having been promptly given, the men are then dismissed.

Each one now repairs to the nearest tradesman's shop, where he exchanges his silver. For one tael he receives 1,000 small coins called cash, perforated in the centre so as to allow of being threaded on a string, and having received the proper amount, turns homeward with a cheerful mien, but nearly sinking beneath his

The private receives three and one-half taels, equal to about nineteen shillings monthly, out of which he has to provide himself with food and clothing. But he



In Toulon, in 1721, one third of the population perished. Almost the last appearance of the black leath in Europe was in 1840 and 1841, in

Turkey and Dalmatia. It has never appeared in the United States. Our first accurate knowledge of the scourge dates from its prevalence in Egypt from 1833 o 1845, where it was studied by European physicians as carefully as could be done with the restricted pathological teachings of that time. Since then there have been outbreaks in Irak on the Euphrates in 1856 and 1873, in 1876 at Bagdad, in 1877 at other points on the Tigris, and again in 1883 in the same parts of Mesopotamia. In 1878 Europe was thrown into a panic by the appearance of the plague on the banks of the Volga, but it was mild in character, and died out spontaneously in a short time. We know it to be the most fatal of all epidemic diseases. The mortality varies from sixty to ninety per cent of those attacked, and occasionally every person affected dies. Not only human beings suffer, but rats, cats, dogs, cattle, and other animals become victims to the pestilence. It is undoubtedly an accute infectious disease, caused by some micro organism which has unusually malignant proclivities, and which multiplies with an enormous rapidity within the body. necessary first to ascertain positively if the heart is really affected. Those who suffer from such pains can frequently discover the cause better than the physician. There is no reason why such pains should give cause for alarm. Even though neuralgia or rheumatism are causing pain in that region, it is not essentially dangerous. The best plan at such times is to keep in a dry place, avoid draughts of wind, rain or wet weather and remain in a lying posture for hours. This gives the heart rest and gradually strengthens it. Hot, dry applications over the region are always good. Those suffering from neuralgia and heart disease should always apply hot flannels over the region of the heart when the pain is severe. This will prevent the neuralgia from settling in this organ, the most dangerous spot.






