# West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manliobs, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of inte

Duties-Six months' residence upon within nine miles of his homestead en a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and culti-

A homesteader who has exhausted is homestead right and cannot obtain \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside cultivate fifty acres and erect a house
