He was a genuine Moslem of the old school, and detested Europeans and all European customs and ideas. He exercised immense influence at the Porte. His successor as Chief of the Eunuchs is an Armenian, who is supposed to be on excellent terms with the Russian Embassy.

What to Do With Convicts.

From the New York Times, April 28. Mr. Sanford H. Steele read a paper before the Oxford Club in Brooklyn last night upon "What Shall We Do With Our Convicts?" Heretofore, he held, the question has been "What form of labor shall be required of convicts?" but now, as if to illustrate the whimiscal is advanced by the labor unions muon the pretence that free labor can-not endure the competition of convict labor. In 1884 convict labor was abolished in New York by law. There are vict labor. In 1884 convict labor was abolished in New York by law. There are now 1300 convicts unemployed, and soon the existing contracts will expire, when all will be idle. There are legislators and newspapers found to openly approve of this condition of affairs. New York has a prison population of 12,800 people, of whom there are available for productive labor about 6000, whose industry, if availed of, would come in competition with the wage-carning classes. In manufacturing alone there are 700,000 free workers engaged in this state. The proposition then is that 6000 convicts should be kept idle for fear that their labor would reduce the average wages of 700,000 who are free, supposing that all the convicts even are engaged in manufacturing. These 6000 convicts were engaged in actual competition before, and will be again, after their incarceration, with those who object to their employment under confinement. The cost of maintaining these 12,800 convicts is over a million and a quarter of dollars a year; and it is a grave emergency that would justify a state in wasting so much a year. But the cost in dollars and cents is the least serious feature of the problem. These convicts are nearly all destined to be returned to society. Their average age is under 25. The average term of imprisonment is five years, which is about the ago and term of study of a college graduate. The speaker advocated the employment of part of the convicts upon public works outside the prison walls. The number to be employed in any industry should bear a fixed proportion to the number engaged in that industry outside the prison walls, and that proportion should be so low as to preclude any genuine complaint of competition.



The semi-annual meeting of the West Muron Teachers' Association, was held in the Goderich high school, on Friday and Saturday, the 7th and 8th of October. Despite the unpropitious character of the weather the attendance was large, and much interest was manifested in the discussion of the various subjects. The work of Friday morning consisted of appointing a business committee, hearing a report of the same, and arranging for future work. Not much could be done cwing to the paucity of attendance, the pouring rain having kept many away. In the afternation however, the teachers began to pour in, and despite the unfavorable weather, no less than 100 answered to their name when the inspector read the roll. The following committees were appointed:— Business — Messrs' Baird, Brown and Miss Johnson: Onestion, and annual grant to support a uniform pointed:—Business—Messrs Baird, Brown and Miss Johnson; Question drawer—Messrs J. E. Tom, I. P. S., H. I. Strang, B. A. and A. J. Moore, B. A., after which the president delivered his annual address, taking as his subject. "Criticisms on our Educational system." 
