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BITTER ENMITY TO RECIPROCITY

Outburst Against Bill in U.S. Senate Committee on Finance—Big Organization to Oppose Measure—United States Farmers' National Congress Take Strong Ground... Washington, May 10.—Vicious assaults on the Canadian reciprocity bill marked today's hearing on that measure by the senate finance committee...

Probably the greatest outburst against the bill occurred when former Governor John Straube, of Wisconsin, introduced as representing wrappings paper manufacturers and the boards of paper, all poured forth their protests against the measure...

Chicago, May 10.—Legislative agent, John M. Stahl, of the Farmers National Congress, announced today that the alliance which is represented in its membership in nearly all the important farming states, would oppose reciprocity with Canada... This decision had been reached, he said, after a thorough investigation of all the economic and international questions involved...

Victoria, B.C., May 10.—According to F. M. Kelly, who returned here today from an extended trip through Peace River Valley, in which he met near Athabasca Landing two weeks ago a secret service officer and guide, bound to the scene where the mounted police were found dead, the policemen who were killed and mutilated, he said, were not the men who were responsible for providing the poison...

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Washington, May 10.—Facing the question of an early report on the Canadian reciprocity bill, and with the free trade bill already before them, the members of the senate finance committee on finance are considering a Democratic proposal to postpone the bill...

STARTLING STORY

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Approval to Route is Given by the Minister of Railways—C.N.R. Entrance Into Winnipeg—Railway May Be Compelled to Come Into City by Underground... Ottawa, May 10.—Hon. George Graham, minister of railways, had before him for consideration today a number of western railway route maps for approval, including application of Canadian Northern Railway for the approval of its proposed new line into the station on Winnipeg...

The interests of the city were looked after by City Solicitor Hunt and Alex Haggart, M.P., was on hand to point out that the proposal to run a new line into the station on the level would increase the congestion and create dangerous conditions...

The following lines were approved subject to the usual conditions: G.T.P. Branch Lines Co., Biggar to Riverdale, northwards; Peace River, northwards; Canadian Pacific, revision of Langdon, north line... The G.T.P. Branch Lines Company applied for the approval of a line from Lozate to Biggar, and the C.P.R. asked for the approval of a line from Tantaloon to Dwyer...

High River, Alberta, May 9.—A triple tragedy was narrowly averted on a river bridge at High River, Alberta, today. A steam plow was runched by fire and escaped cut off by a fire engine...

Warren, May 8.—Thomas Foster and family have started for Grande Prairie, having sold their holdings here to the Arctic Ice Company. They are shipping all their farming equipment to Grande Prairie, and will travel to their new home 250 miles...

Chicago, May 9.—Frank Gotch, the world's champion wrestler, announced tonight that he will start his career tomorrow for a championship match with George Hackenschmidt, the "Russian Lion," to be held in the Chicago-American League baseball park, on September 24...

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TERRIFIC STORM SWEEPS MANITOBA

It is Feared That There Has Been Loss of Life—Wind Ripped 26 Inches One on Record—Tens of Thousands of Acres of Cattle Carried Away... Winnipeg, May 11.—Manitoba was swept by one of the fiercest storms in its history today. It is impossible to say how much damage was done, but it has been very great. The storm's greatest westward force was felt over Winnipeg, where a tremendous thunder, wind and rain storm, which began at an early hour this morning, continued until late afternoon...
