





THE CAPTURE OF PRZEMYSL.

ng, the Austro-German chieved the main object of the grea thrust which they commenced against the Russian line in Western Galicia just a month ago to-day. They have yet to drive the Russians further back to establish themselves in an easily defended position, which will enable them to detach forces for operations against Italy and the Allies on the West. Whether or not they accomplish this, the Germanic allies have won a great victory and with the suddenness which overshadows all the past operations of the war. With the surrender of the fortress there fell into Russian hands, according to official reports 120,000 Austrians, 600 guns and an immense amount of war ma-terial. Most forts however had been completely descroyed by Austrians before they surrendered. This is considered in military circles here to account for the fact that the fortress succumbed so quickly to the Austro-German attack. Of what booty the Austro-Germans have captured with the fortress there is no estimate. It is not expected that the victors will be satisfied with their gain of Przemysi, but that they doubtless will endeavor to push on to Lemberg and even farther and put the Russians in such positions that they will not be able to resume the offensive for many months. The British Government is urging workmen and employers to turn out shells in enormous quantities. Lloyd George the new Minister of Munitions is touring the country with this object. The expectation is that the new British armies when they take the field will be equipped as no other forces ever were. Mean time the French continue operations in North Arras where it is declared they are slowly moving the Germans out of strongly fortified positions. 

THE MEXICAN PROBLEM.

WASHINGTON, June 3. President Wilson to-day served notice on factional leaders in Mexico that unless within very short time they unite to set up a government which the world can recognize, the United States will be constrained to decide what means should be employed to help Mexico to save herself and save her people. This signalizes a change from the "watchful waiting" policy which has guided relations with Mexico for more than two years. The President's statement is regarded everywhere in official and diplomatic quarters as notice of a new and vigorous policy to restore peace below the Rio Grande. What steps the President is prepared to take if the warning goes unheeded, is not disclosed in the statement.



THE CRY SAVES THE TRENCH. Paris, France, May 20.—A French lieutenant, now lying wounded in a Paris hospital, has given this account of the thrilling action in which he received his injury:

"We were fortifying a trench which we had taken Pohing a heavier.

two sentinels kept careful watch. We could work in all security.

"Suddenly an avalanche of bombs tumbled down on our heads. Before we could recover, ten of our men were stretched on the ground, dead or wounded, pellmell.

my mind benumbed, I saw the be-ches' jump over the barrier of sacks and invade the trench. There were about twenty. They had no guns but they carried in front of them a sort of wicker basket filled with bombs.
"I looked to the left. Our men had gone, the trench was empty. The boches' advanced; a few more steps and they were on me.

A Hero of Heroes.

"Just then one of my men, lying on the ground, a wound on his forehead, a wound on his chin, blood streaming from his face, dragged himself to a sitting position, seized a sack of grenades near him and cried out, Up, you dead!'

"He pulled himself to his knees, lived into the sack and flung the grenades at the group of assailants. "In answer to his cry, three more wounded men dragged themselves up.

Two of them, who had broken icgs, ook guns and, opening the magazines started a rapid fire, each shot of which hit home. The third, whose left arm was inert, seized a bayonet with his right.

"When I picked myself up, having juite recovered my senses, about half the hostile group had been felled, the est having retreated in disorder.

"All that remained was a huge, perspiring sub-officer, congested with rage, who, leaning against the barrier protected by the iron shield, continned most courageously, I must say, to fire his revolver in our direction.

The Trench is Saved.

"The man who was first to organze the defense, who had cried, 'Up. ou dead!' received a bullet straight n the jaw. He collapsed.

"Suddenly, the soldier with the ayonet, who for some minutes had een crawling from corpse to corpse, stopped about four feet from the birrier, drew himself up, dodged two ullets fired at him, and plunged his ayonet into the German's throat. "The position was saved. The

vounded soldier's sublime appeal nad resuscitated the 'dead.' "

LINERS HAVE 34,000 TONS WAR MATERIAL.

New York, May 19 .- The Cunarder Orduna and the White Star steamships Arabic and Georgia, which left this port in the last two days for Liverpool, carried 34,000 tons of war nunitions and provisions for the Al-

Among the 10,000 tons carried on the Orduna were 32,000 cases of cartridges, 3,750 cases shrapnel, 1,169 cases of empty shells, 548 cases of brass rods, 25 cases of tungsten metal, three cases of copper, 120 barrels of sheet brass, 3,687 bundles of steel angles, five auto cassis, one areoplane tractor, 220 barrels of crude metal. 260 barrels of nickel, 3.725 ingots of nickel, 383 copper cathodes, 4,100 copper ingots, 400 tons of steel billets, 488 bundles of skelp steel, 133 cases of infantry equipment, 476 cases of uniforms, two auto truck cassis, five cases of rifles, four cases of motor cycle tires, 594 cases of leather military articles, 44 cases of metal working machinery and eight cases of

brass wire. The 12,000 tons of cargo on the Arabic included 795 barrels of grease. 5,407 pigs of lead, 3,370 bars of copper, 5,216 ingots of copper, 400 cases of cartridges, 730 cases of barbed wire, 1,516 pieces of forgings for guns, 14,041 barrels of steel and 41

The cargo of the Georgia included 4,247 cases of loaded shells, 1,000 cases of cartridges, one aeroplane, 670 ses of cartridges, one aeroplane, 670 reels of barbed wire, 1,940 steel billets, 786 bars of iron, 722 bars of steel billets, 759 bundles of steel, 25 cases of fuses, 12 cases of forgings for guns, 20 auto trucks, 643 cases of auto parts, 168 auto cassis, and 1,882 barrels of lubricating oil. Loaded shells are not likely to explode unless the fuses have been inserted. The fuses are shipped in separate cases on the ships.

INTERNED FRENCH SAILORS ARE RELEASED BY ITALY.

Rome, May 29.-A Messina despatch to the Messagero says that after Italy's leclaration of hostilities the ministe of war ordered the release of the survivors of the crew of the French cruiser Leon Gambetta, who had been interned at Messina. They will be ent back to France.

The Leon Gambetta was torpedoed by the Austrian submarine U-5 in the straits of Otranto on April 28 with he loss of 552 of her crew.
