Before Shamrock could follow, the defender had slipped into the lead, a position which she maintained until the postponement signal was blown three hours later.

Race Called Off.

The yachts worked the Jersey shore for the next two hours, with the wind backing and hauling and still keeping up a head-wind, shifted canvas quickly and was well to the windward when the breeze finally sank back into the caverns of the deep. The signal calling the race off was sounded at 5.03 p.m., with Resolute six miles from the turn and Shamrock two miles away off-shore. The yachts will try to decide the long contest to-morrow





Upon the recommendation of the Food Control Board, and under the provisions of the Food Control Act. 1917, and the War Measures Act, 1914-1916, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Regulations regarding the sale of Sugar:-

1. The wholesale price of sugar when sold by the importer shall not exceed Twenty-seven and three-quarter cents per pound, when it is a cash

2. When sugar is sold by jobbers the price shall not be in excess of Twenty-eight and three-quarter cents per pound, when it is a cash transco

3. For purpose of this Regulation, Twenty-five barrels or over shall constitute and be deemed a wholesale transaction, and must be taken delivery of at one time. Any less quantity than above, sold in original package, shall constitute a jobbing transaction. A barrel shall be sold to contain not less than three hundred pounds.

4. From and after this date the retail price of white granulated sugar within the Municipal limits of the town of St. John's shall not exceed thirty-one cents per pound, and in the Outports thirty-one cents per pound, plus transportation, insurance and other charges.

5. Any person who shall offer for sale, or shall sell any sugar at a greater price than that fixed in above Regulations, shall be guilty of a breach

6. All foregoing prices are for cash

sales. 7. No dealer shall refuse a tender o cash when a purchase is made.

8. Any person violating any of the provisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence and liable upon summary conviction before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, to a penalty not exceeding one thousand dol lars, or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, or to both fine and imprisonment. One-half of the fine shall be paid to the informer and the balance to the Food Control Board, for the benefit of the Domin-

9. No sugar shall be imported into Newfoundland unless a permit to do so shall have been obtained beforehand from the Food Control Board.

10. These Regulations shall be, and come into effect on the Twenty-seventh of July, 1920.

11. The Regulations published in the Royal Gazette on June 15th, 1920, are hereby cancelled.

Willing workers took out office supplies, papers, etc. The end of the building, occupied by Marden, Orth and Hastings as an oil buying plant, had about thirty casks or more of oil stored, most of which came up recently from Newfoundland. General stocks in this regard are low at this part of the season. This was all removed but about ten casks, which were soon devoured by the flames. Kellys had a large quantity of oil and paints in an adjoining building. These were removed, but for a time it seemed as if the flames might destroy the shed, as well as Thomas McDonald's blacksmith shop, just between the former building and Farquhar's warehouse. The French trawler Asie Grey at Farquhar's wharf, pulled out from the danger

Farquhar's had stored in their building about five cars of flour and feed, besides quantities of other goods. All this was totally destroyed and the loss involved would be somewhere around \$30,000. Marden, Orth and Hastings, of course, lost all their plant, besides over ten casks of oil and other sundries.

Losses all told will amount to about sixty thousand dollars, in general fairly well covered with insurance. Besides monetary losses, the firms concerned will suffer consider-

Another Pompeii.

During the war archaeological excavations were continued at the Italian colony of Cyrenaica on the North which hang below the hem of the African coast, and now comes the news that what has been found already promises the uncovering of another ancient city as important as Pompeii. Once upon a time the spot was a Greek colony, with the civilization of Greece transplanted to the soil of Africa. The work has been carried on during the war under the supervision of Prof. Lucio Mariani, director of the archaeological services of the Ministry of the Colonies, and the prediction is now made that the newly discovered city will eventually prove actually richer than Pompeii in its evidences of a past civilization. Here have been already found statues of the Graces, a Hermes, an Eros, an Alexander the Great, and most impressive of all, the Aphrodite of Cyrene, which is said by certain connoisseurs to be a fair rival in beauty to the Venus of Milo and the Venus of Cnidus. The discoveries have exended over many years.

The field of radio-activity seems to the lustre of precious stones.

While experimenting in his laboratory, the scientist to whom credit for this twentieth-century magic is due, found that a diamond ring near the apparatus glowed with added brilliancy in the darkness of the apartment, and shortly afterwards its colour turned to a brilliant green. This led to a further test of the gem

The rays from the diamond, when subjected to treatment, were dazzling and its hue a lovely emerald—in fact the stone was no longer a diamond but an emerald, and a particularly fine




