



To you voters of the West Coast, ho in all good faith and sincerity recorded in the general and bye-elections of 1919-20, your decision in favour of the present administration I would ask a question, don't you think your representatives have deceived you? Look around you at the present chaotic conditions. Industrial depression, financial stagnation, the persistent wanton extravagance that is still going on and your already overburdened country shouldering the colossal debt of \$50.000,000. Then visit the legislature and witness those men, who in trumpet tones pledged their determination to justify the comfidence you placed in them when are raigned for their unjustifiable conduct in the management of the country's affairs, sitting mute and dumb, a tacit admission of their guilt, and then in all fairness and sincerity an-

swer the above question. Yes they have deceived us all, but there is still hope. Sometime ago an article appeared in the Telegram overthe signature of Mr. Spurrell, under-the heading, "Let the Voters Protest." Yes, let them protest, but not by pen, but by public demonstration. The time has arrived for the people of this country to arise in their numbers and record in no uncertain accents their condemnation of this wasting of public funds that is bringing ruin and" famine on this country which is now. headed for the rocks but beyond lies the serene bosom that rests on the limitless sea of prosperity in the capable hands of Sir Michael Cashin and his able crew she can yet weather the point. Will she do it; will she ride triumphant those turbulent billows and reach ere long the harbor of prosperity it is yours to decide.

HOW THE TELEPHONE FIRST

How Dom Pedro, emperor of Brazil, spoke the word that brought respect ful consideration to the telephone, the unknown device of an obscure teacher, when shown for the first time at the Philadelphia Exposition of 1876, is told in Power Plant Engineering, Chicago, by F. H. Sweet.

The Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia opened its doors exactly two months after the telephone had learned to talk.

Mr. Sweet goes on to say: "Bell had no intention of going to the Centennial himself. He was too poor. For his three or four years of inventing he had received nothing as yet-nothing but his patent.

"But one Friday afternoon, toward the end of June, his sweetheart, Mabel Hubbard, was taking the train for the Centennial; and he went to the depot to say good-bye. Here Miss Hubbard learned for the first time that Bell was not to go, She coaxed and pleaded without effect. Then as the train was starting, leaving Bell on the platform, the affectionate young girl could no longer control her feelings and was overcome by a passion of tears. At this the susceptible Bell, without ticket or baggage, dashed after the moving train and sprang aboard.

"As it happened, this impromptu trip to the Centennial proved to be one of the most timely acts of his life. On the following Sunday afternoon the judges were to make a special tour of inspection, and Mr Hubbard, after much trouble, had obtained a promise that they would deal to her. 

#### An Incident of the "Titanic" Disaster.

Huntley Refloated.

AND IS BEING TOWED TO PORTA The four-masted auxiliary schooner

Huntley, which was reported in yes-

terday's Telegram as having struck Petty Harbor Motion; on Tuesday, in

a dense fog, refloated yesterday and is now being towed to port by the tug

Ingraham. The Huntley left Turk's

Island, B.W.I., on March 17th, and

was making a good trip when she met with disaster. When making the coast the vessel encountered thick

fog and for the past ten days Capt

King has been running on dead

reckoning, being unable to get the

sun, and did not know he was so

near the land till his vessel struck.

The Huntley's engines were running

at the time and on being reversed the

vessel refloated and an examination

being made it was found that she was

seriously damaged and began to set-

tle by the head. The crew immedi-

ately made preparations for leaving

the sinking vessel and the ship's

boats were launched and the men put

whatever belongings they could save

into them and started to row for the

land. At 4 p.m. the Huntley sank,

and owing to the fog the men were

unable to get their bearings and it

was 7 p.m. bfeore they finally reach-

ed the shore, landing at Bay Bulls.

The crew remained there till early

yesterday morning, when they left for

St. John's in the ship's motor boat,

arriving here at 1 p.m. The tug. In-

graham was despatched to the scene

of the wreck yesterday morning, and

meeting the Huntley's motor boat

near Cape Spear, Capt. King trans-

ferred to the tug and proceeded to

Petty Harbor. At 7 p.m. yesterday,

Messrs. Tessier & Co. received a mes-

sage from Petty Hr. stating the

Huntley was again affeat and that

the Ingraham had the ship in tow and

was taking her to port. The Huntley

was then on her beam ends. Cape

Spear and Maddox Cove also reported

the vessel as being affoat and the In-

graham should reach here with her

early to-day. The vessel's salt cargo

has evidently been washed out of the

hull, causing her to come to the sur-

face. The Huntley is practically a

new vessel, built three years ago and

was amongst the best of our local

fleet. The ship is managed by

Messrs. Tessier & Co., and is partly

covered by insurance.

Of all the recitals of personal adventure in the "Titante" shipping disaster on Amil 14, 1912, that of Colonel Gracie, of the United States Army, who jumped from the topmost deck of the "Titanic" when she sank and was sucked down with her, is the most extraordinary. As the ship was shinking the people were driven to the topmost deck. Colonel Gracie found himself alone after the wave which swent the liner just before the final plunge. By great good fortune he had managed to grasp the brass railing, and he hung on with might and main but when the ship went down he was forced to let go. He was swirled round and terminable time, but eventually came to the surface unhurt, and managed to seize a wooden grating that was floating near by. When he recovered his breath he discovered a large can-I vas and cork raft which had floated up, and saw a man struggling towards it from some wreckage to which he had clung. The two men then began the work of rescuing those who had jumped into the sea, and were floundering in the waters, when dawn broke. Thirty of them were collected on the raft which eank with their weight till they stood knee deep in water. Men were still swimming round, and as one died on the raft and the body was dropped carrboard, another was taken on the raft in his place. They stood back to back, packed in columns two deep, for the longest and most terrible hours they had ever spent, listening to the shrieks of the drowning victims round them. Even when it was whispered on the raft that a steamer was approaching, those whose faces were turned away from it, dared not turn round to look for fear they would disturb the balance. Those who passed through that perilous night said that the sea seemed to be strewn with dead bodies with lifebelts round them. It was the most terrible shipwreck of modern times.
