

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



(Final Instalment.) Two linesmen shall be appointed, whose duty (subject

(16) In the event of any tempor-ary suspension of play from any cause, the ball having gone into touch or behind the goal where it was when play was suspended, and the ball shall be in play when it has touched the ground. If the ball goes touch or behind the goal the Referee shall again drop it The players on either side shall not play the ball until it has

touched the ground.

) In the event of any infringement of Laws 3, 5, 6, 8, 10, or 16 or a player be sent off the field under law 13, a free kick shall be awarded to the opposite side, from the place where the infringement occurred. In the case of any inten-tional infringement of law 9 outside the penalty area, or by the attacking side, within the penalty area, a free kick shall be awarded to the opposite side, from the place where the infringement occurred. #### Origin of Newmarket and Ascot.

Horse racing has been the favorite sport of British Sovereigns ever since Hugh the Great brought over some "running horses as a gift to Athelstan, whose daughter he came to woo. In the time of Richard of the "Lion Heart," horseracing had established itself firmly as a sport, highly popular not only with Kings, but with Lords and Commons, great nobles acting as jockeys in races, the guerdon of which was "forty pounds of red gold." Henry VIII., we are told, was as fond of horse-breeding as he was of matrimony. He imported the finest animals money could buy, and founded the Royal Paddocks at Hampton Court. The Stuart Kings took the turf still more enthusiastically under their wings. Under the Merry Monarch horse racing assumed a popularity and splendour it had never before approached. It is to him that Newmarket owes its splendid history; for it was him that rescued it from obscurity and made it the mecca of the world of rank and fashion. Never, in fact, has any sporting town so basked in the sunshine of royal favor as Newmarket in the rollicking days of Charles II., who, year after year, transported his court there, to "dance and feast and revel." William III, who was a patron of the turf running his horses at Newmarket, founding an academy for riding, and giving pieces of plate to be raced for in all parts of the kingdom. It was Queen Anne as whose bidding Ascot was cradled, and who offered the first plate of 100 quineas that was run for on the Ascot Course on July 28, 1711, and her last dying wish was to live long enough to learn the result of a race for which she had entered her favorite horse, "Star." King Edward VII, did more for the British turf than any other man in its long history. He had to wait a long time for his own success, but when at last the tide of fortune turned it began to flow right royally. Florizel II. reaped a rich harvest of stakes for him in 1894 and 1895, and "Persimmon" brought him laurels,

such as few owners have even wonwinning the Derby, St. Leger, Ascot Cup, the Eclipse stakes, and three other classic races in succession, and putting £34,700 in stakes alone in his owners pocket. Success followed fast on these, and, as was fittingly, the turf crowned with all its chief laurels the King to whom it owed more than to any of his Royal prede-

#### Wellington's Season.

The battle of Talaveral, fought on Arthur Wellesley into Lord Wellington; but, owing to the incapacity of the Spanish General, Cuesta, and the incompetence of the Spanish Government, it had no material influence on the Peninsular War. The French, nominally under Napoleon's brother, King Joseph, but really directed by Marshals Jourdain and Victor, were repulsed in all their attacks and ultimately retired from the Allied front; but Wellington was unable to follow them, and soon, being threatened by the junction of all the French armies in that part of Spain, he was compelled to retreat into Portugal, leaving many of his wounded in the hospitals in the care of the French. In the two day's fighting, the Allies had lost 6,-268 killed, wounded and missing, the French 7,238 killed and wounded, 156 prisoners, and 17 guns. Nor had any tangible benefit accrued from so much bloodshed. The normal, result however, was valuable to Wellington, for the battle established the truth, overshadowed by the miscarriage of many of the English Government's ill-considered expeditions, that the English infantry could contend successfully against Europe's best soldiers. It at once gave them confidence in their leader and in themselves, and taught their enemies to respect them. Also, the campaign taught Wellington just how much value was to be attached to Spanish promises and made him resolve never again to expose his army to dire peril by placing reliance upon them. "I have fished in many troubled waters," he said, "but Spanish troubled waters will never try again. I have overcome difficulties enough, as

to those of Spain, I will have no more to do with them." Thenceforward he was not to be beguiled into hazardous adventures by illusory words but kept his own counsel and took his own course.

#### Not Guilty.

A clergyman, taking occasional duty for afriend in one of the moorland churches of a remote part of England, was greatly scandalized on observing the old verger, who had been collecting the offertory, quietly abstract a half-crown before presenting the plate at the altar rails.

After service he called the old man into the vestry, and told him with emotion that his crime had been discovered. The verger looked puzzled. Then a sudden light dawned on him, "Why, sir, you don't mean that ould halfcrown of mine! Why, Ofte 'led off with he the last fifteen years."

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
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
