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THE WELLINGTON STRIKE

The meeting of the miners, held in Nainimo, on Thursday, shows pretty clearly that many of the men believe that an end should be put to the strike at Wellington. This strike has been a heavy drain on the miners, many of whom have families to support. Thirty thousand dollars is a very large sum, and this is the sum that has been paid, chiefly by the workmen, to aid in the support of the men on strike at Wellington. A man who has a family to feed and clothes to be given to him to do his work, is not inclined to support men in idleness for whom plenty of work and good pay are waiting. This is not his contributing money to relieve those who are destitute because they cannot get work. It is a noble thing for a working man, or any other man to make sacrifices to relieve distressed fellow-creatures, but it is noble or right for a man to deprive his wife and children of what they ought to have in order to keep men in idleness who could, if they liked, be better off than he himself!

A NEW PARTY

The Farmers' Alliance, which played so conspicuous a part in the elections of the United States, appears to be quite a formidable combination. Its president's name is Polk. He has been telling the people what the Alliance is and what it wants. He says that the principles on which the Alliance is founded are solid and correct, and that one of the things which it intends to bring about is financial reform. What he means by financial reform is not quite clear, but the members of the Alliance seem to think that it means putting more money within the reach of the farmers. Some of them are of opinion that the United States Government should go into the banking business and the grain trade, and make the farmers large advances on the growing crop, some contending, to within eighty per cent. of its value. Others again want to see more money made—whether by printing press or by the mint—does not, as yet, appear very clearly. Some accounts would lead to the conclusion that the Farmers' Alliance is, in some sort, of the Greenback party. The conclusion that the intelligent reader of the American newspapers is likely to arrive at is that the Alliance has very loose and very crude notions as to what are the functions of Government, and that its members are doomed to be disappointed. But whether their views are reasonable or practical or not, it is certain that they form a very powerful combination. President Polk claims that the Alliance has been able to elect thirty-eight members of Congress, and that twelve or fifteen others will meet likely with the party. Whether or not these members will work with the Democratic Party appears as yet uncertain. It is quite evident that the Alliance does not regard the Republicans with very friend-

ly feelings, but the chances of their being able to form a third party seem just now to be very slim indeed. The organization is, however, strong enough to make itself feared and respected, and a good deal will, no doubt, be heard about it and from it in the not distant future.
