The French members doubtless voted against the measure because their church does not recognize the right of parliament to interfere in marriage. The Roman Catholic church, however, is not opposed to such marriages, for Cardinal Manning said to the English royal commission that his church was accustomed to grant a dispensation, especially when the parties were poor.
