There is a loophole in the law which compels every Chinaman landing in British Columbia to pay \$50 for a certificate of settlement. It would take a microscope to tell the difference between one member of the race and another, and the result is that after a Chinaman settles for some time in the country and makes his little pile he wends his way to his naitive country, carrying with him his certificate and selling or giving it away to another intended emigrant. 
