### FRENCH ART AT THE WORLD'S FAIR

Some of the Sculptors and Painters Who Will Exhibit—Turkish Co-Operation.

PARIS, May 17.—Since the Chicago exhibition was decided upon the French artists have taken more interest in it than any other class in this country. The Associated Press correspondent recently asked the leading painters and sculptors what they intended sending to the fair, and here is what some of the sculptors answered: M. Barcholdi said: "I shall certainly exhibit, but I have not yet quite made up my mind just what to send."

Mme. Leon Bertrax, one of the most distinguished of the women sculptors, said: "I shall send two or three works which I have already exhibited at the 'Woman's Art Society' of which I am president."

M. Gerome, who is a sculptor as well as a painter, said: "I do not expect to send anything from here, for some of my work is at my disposal. But a good many of my creations are in America and perhaps their owners will send them."

M. Georges Rochegrosse, the painter, remarked, with a smile: "I shall probably send my 'Destruction of Babylon' which figured in last year's Salon, if American modesty does not prevent it."

"I shall send several pictures," said M. Tony Robert-Fleury.

M. Ferdinand Humbert answered: "I cannot yet say what I shall be able to send anything to Chicago, for my work on the Paris City Hall and the Pantheon may take all my time."

M. Auguste Flameng declared: "The exhibition is of considerable importance from any point of view, and I shall send several canvases."

M. Gabriel Fernier's answer was as follows: "I have a great desire to exhibit at Chicago, and this to express once more my sympathy for our American friends."

Mme. Virginia Demont-Breton, perhaps after Rosa Bonheur, the best-known French painter in France, said: "I have already a good many pictures in America, and possibly some of them may be sent. Mr. W. W. Minn, of Minneapolis, Mr. Smith of Rochester and Carey Cole of Baltimore each have several, and there are more than 20 others in different private collections."

M. Benjamin Constant said: "I have already two pictures in America which would fitly represent my work and which I consider the best I have painted during the whole of my career. They are called the 'Justice du Cherif' and 'La Seif.'"

M. Albert Aublot says: "I intend exhibiting several important pictures, and also a picturesque panorama of France."

"I shall send a number of portraits, several of them being those of some of the most important women in Paris," said M. Jacques E. Blanche.

M. Gustave Courtois remarked: "While I shall exhibit, I shall not have time to visit Chicago in person."

"I certainly shall send," said M. Demoy, "for America has long been a good market for my works."

M. Leon Lhermitte says: "I expect to be well represented at the Chicago Exhibition. The son of the great Meissonier, M. Charles Meissonier, says: "I fear I cannot exhibit at the Chicago Exhibition. In 1889 I wished to exhibit a few of my pictures which were in American collections, but their owners were unwilling to lend them to me, and the reason they then gave me made me fear that they will be no more willing to part with them for some months in 1893 than they were in 1889."

M. Bernard, one of the founders of the Champ de Mars Salon, said: "I shall send an important exhibit, American artists standing high in my mind, and their opinion of my work being of value to me."

Among other well-known artists who say they will exhibit, are M. Louis Le Poittevin, M. Debat-Ponsan, M. Berns-Balloon, M. Carolus Duran, M. Gustave Colin, M. Rene Billotte, M. Maurice Courant, M. Eugène Souveret, M. Eugene Dauphin, M. Delort, M. Durst and M. Jeannot.

THE HAGUE, May 17.—It is probable that Herr Messing, the celebrated Dutch artist, will go to the Chicago Exhibition as the official representative of Holland.

### THEY HAVE ADOPTED BELAWS

The Work of the Technical School Board—Good Results.

A meeting of the Technical School Board, at which Mr. Orr occupied the chair, was held last night in the old Wycliffe College. The business of the evening consisted in the adoption of a series of by-laws to control the future meetings of the board, it being decided that such meetings should be held on the fourth Tuesday of each month, excepting during June, July and August. A motion was made to appoint four committees to be known as Finance Committee, Printing Committee, Supply Committee and Property Committee, and was unanimously carried. A report was also presented from the principal of the Technical School for the adoption of the by-laws. The suggestions embodied in the report were many and will no doubt be of material benefit to the institution.

The average attendance of students each night up to the present has been 125, and during the last session examination, although the attendance of students was small, the results were very gratifying. The principal also advised a number of important changes in the educational system of the school, especially in the geometrical studies, and asked that a certain sum be set apart for the purchase of drawing models and the formation of a reference library. He considered that the present location of the school, i.e. the old college, was perfectly satisfactory, excepting as regards ventilation, and this fault should be rectified as speedily as possible. Some of the clauses embodied in the report were adopted and the remainder left over for a future sitting.

**SIGNS OF COMING AGE**  
Moist Eye, Dry Palm and Shrinkage in the Calf of the Leg.

"Do you know the surest indication of old age?" asked Dr. Reed of a number of friends at the Langle Hotel, St. Louis, recently. "The surest indications in man," he continued, "are a moist eye, a dry palm and a shrinkage of the calf of the leg. All these indications are signs of some change in the nervous system upon advancing years. In the matter of the eye, the first section is interfered with, and it is this which causes a flow of water. The second of the palm is produced by an interference with the functions of the body, also due to the action of the nerves, and the shrinkage of the leg follows from similar cause. In old age, too, you notice some men become more corpulent than in the earlier portions of their lives. With drinking men the change is often produced by the quantity of alcohol which they consume with their drink, and with those who do not drink it follows from other physiological changes. As to the hair becoming gray it results in the majority of cases from the partial closing of the hair cells and the reduction of the quantity of natural coloring matter which they produce. With women the process of the eye does not come so soon as it does in men."

Fulton still palming.  
New York, May 17.—The Rev. Dr. Justin D. Fulton spoke to-night in this city on the topic, "Shall the Columbian Exposition be Romanized?" He predicted that in the near future a great war would be waged between Catholics and Protestants in the United States by which the Catholics would be as deeply buried as was slavery by the Civil War. He offered resolutions, which were carried. These resolutions condemned the World's Fair management for requesting the participation of the Pope in the woman's department of the exposition and in the reliq department. They suggested that if the fair people wanted Catholic relics they should have procured the instruments of torture of the Inquisition.

Hanged Three on a single limb.  
CLARKSVILLE, Ga., May 17.—At 2 o'clock this morning a mob of 200 men broke into the jail, took therefrom 3 negroes charged with the murder of Night Policeman Carter at Toxoo last week and hanged them all on one limb of a large oak tree. The negroes protested innocently.

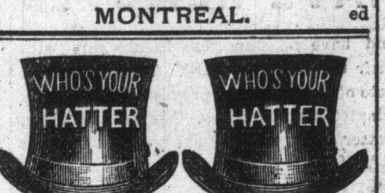

NEW CAB BY-LAW.

The Regulations Simplified and Fares Reduced. The Police Commissioners have amended the cab by-law, and all cabs and drivers will receive copies of the amended by-law immediately.

First division: That portion of the city bounded by the waters of the bay on the south, Bathurst-street on the west, Sumach-street on the east and Bloor-street on the north, and the west side of Bathurst-street, north side of Bloor-street and the east side of Sumach-street shall be included in this division.

Second division: That portion of the city outside the limits of the first division, and bounded on the west by Dufferin-street, on the north by city limits, on the east by Pape-avenue, and the east side of Pape-avenue, shall be included in this division.

Third division: That portion of the city lying outside the limits of the second division. The tariff for conveying one or two passengers from one point to another within the limits of the first division will be 30 cents, and for each additional passenger 25 cents.
