## REPORT OF JUBILEE COMMITTEE.

The Jubilee Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society take the opportunity, afforded by the publication of the last number of the *Jubilee Remembrancer*, to give briefly the result of their operations in behalf of the Jubilee movement of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

It will be remembered that on the receipt of the information by the Committee of their Auxiliary, in the early part of last year, that it was the intention of the Parent Society to observe the year then entered upon as a year of Jubilee. Means were immediately taken, by the appointment of the Jubilee Committee, to co-operate in this important movement. This duty having been thus assigned to the Jubilee Committee, they commenced their efforts by the publication of the *Jubilee Remembrancer*, for the purpose of disseminating throughout the Province the information derived from the Parent Society, as well as other important and interesting intelligence bearing upon the proposed object. Three numbers of this paper have already been issued, the last of which contained an account of the Jubilee meeting of this Auxiliary held in this City in October last, and having been widely circulated, and acting upon the public mind, the friends of the Society have been thereby stimulated to assist the movement by affording to it their countenance, and by contributing to the fund proposed to be raised. And the Committee have gratefully to record that this appeal to the Christian public has been most nobly responded to throughout the limits of their Auxiliary. Mr. Isaac Smith, whose assistance was secured by the Committee, as mentioned in a previous number, has visited most of the branches, and solicited contributions both in town and country, and the result is shown in the subjoined statement furnished by the Treasurer. From this it will be seen that, including the sums subscribed on behalf of the Jubilee Fund, but di-

rected particularly to be applied to the Chinese Testament Fund, there has been raised the large sum of £690 18s. 8d. currency, by the friends of the Bible in connection with this Auxiliary. And the Committee have the gratifying statement to make, that after defraying all expenses connected with their effort, they have been enabled to remit to the parent Committee, for the General Jubilee Fund, the sum of £496 17s. 7d. stg., and for the Chinese Testament Fund the sum of £34 2s. 8d. stg., making together £471 0s. 3d. stg., equal to £583 18s. 2d. currency.

The Committee, however, would not merely refer to the amount contributed, large as it is, but they would mention, with grateful feelings, the beneficial effect which the movement has had upon the cause of the Bible throughout the Province. Everywhere a deeper and warmer, and, it is believed, a more abiding interest in the circulation of the Word of Life has been excited among the people of every Protestant denomination, and the friends of the cause have become more united and determined in the support of the parent Society, whose object and operations are now more thoroughly known and appreciated. Mr. Smith—the valued agent of the Committee—includes particularly to this in a recent letter received from him, from which the following extract is taken:—"On reviewing," he says, "the whole, I feel deeply thankful to the Lord for the measure of success which has attended these efforts, and the efforts of the Jubilee Committee from the commencement. The diffusion of the "Jubilee papers," and the "Jubilee Remembrancer," and the additional information elicited at our meetings, and by extended visitation among the people, have all resulted well, everything considered, not only for the Jubilee fund, but for the objects of the Auxiliary generally. The importance of Bible circulation, and the claims of the Parent Society, were never so well understood by many, nor ever so deeply interesting, as now."

In almost every place I visited, and sometimes under circumstances untoward and forbidding, I was cheered and encouraged by the Divine presence and blessing, and by the spirit manifested by the people. Our meetings were often large, and truly spiritual and refreshing; and so promptly and efficiently was I assisted by ministers of the gospel, and others, of almost every denomination that I was impressed with the conviction that the hand of the Lord was directing and controlling the Jubilee movement for some more special manifestation of his purposes of mercy to mankind. I could mention names and places which I shall ever remember with gratitude, but they are so many that it would occupy too large a space. I must forego the pleasure of a more special reference."

The Jubilee Committee having now, by the blessing of the Almighty, discharged the duty assigned to them by the General Committee, have only in addition to express their own devout and grateful acknowledgements to the Giver of every good and perfect gift for the success which He has been pleased to vouchsafe to their humble labors in so good a cause.

MY DEAR SIR,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your favor dated 1st February, enclosing the Bills of Exchange, value £471 0s. 3d. I cannot allow the mere official acknowledgment to pass into your hands, without availing myself of the opportunity of conveying to you and your colleagues the best thanks of our committee for the liberal manner in which you have responded to the Jubilee appeal, especially, too, as we are given to understand by Mr. Black, that we may expect some farther proof of your bounty. It is an additional satisfaction to find, that the Million Testament Scheme for China has also commended itself to your judgment, and secured the co-operation of your auxiliary. It has been very cheering and encouraging to our committee to perceive that their plans for carrying out the great work in which they are engaged are so readily and efficiently taken up by their supporters in distant parts of the world. We, representing the head, plan and devise; while our auxiliaries near and remote, the members, evince their sympathy and concurrence, and afford us their generous aid in fulfilling the mission which has been confided to our management. You will be glad to hear that our Jubilee effort promises to be more successful than the most sanguine had ventured to anticipate. Contributions are pouring in from all quarters, and it was but yesterday that, among other remittances for this object, one of £1000 came from Melbourne, Australia. In many of the West India Islands, lively interest has been felt in the movement, and collections have been made among the negro congregations in grateful remembrance of what was done by our Society on the abolition of slavery. The total amount we have received is nearly £52,000, and many additions are likely to come in before the close of the Jubilee year. The extra appeal which has thus been made to our friends is not likely to impair our regular income, which, according to present appearances, will exceed that of last year. We hope that the claims of the Society having been so widely presented to the public, by the Jubilee celebration, new impulse will be given to the cause, and permanent support secured in quarters from

which hitherto we have derived but little assistance.

The China Fund still progresses, and we hope ere long to report some actual work in part completion of the stupendous undertaking we have in hand. Our Corresponding committee in Shanghai, composed of the representatives of different bodies, are disposed to put forth all their energy, and have arranged to strike off a quarter of million of Testaments in 18 months from 1st January. They also propose that we should print in London an equal number in the same period. Whether this part of the plan will be ultimately carried into effect, I cannot say. Mr. Milne is on his way to this country, and our action will materially depend on the course which he deems most expedient. The remaining portions will be struck off with the same degree of despatch, and I have no doubt that the issues throughout will be as prompt and ample as the agency that can be prudently employed for distribution will require. We think things look auspiciously for the evangelization of China, and this Society will be ready at all times to devote a large amount of attention to that important part of the work. At a recent meeting of the committee, a vote was adopted for printing 50,000 entire Bibles in Chinese, with as little delay as possible.

Taking so deep an interest as you do in the Society, it will please you to hear that our work, in all its departments, proceeds most satisfactorily. We have manifold proofs of the blessing with which God is pleased to honor our instrumentality. Our issues are increasing. Both at home and abroad we are enlarging the sphere of our operations. But when we recollect the field is the world, and to how small an extent we have yet overtaken the world's wants, we feel what a stimulus there is to still more abundant labor and liberality. We ask, therefore, for your continued aid and prayer in circulating that word, the knowledge of which, according to the divine promise, will one day "cover the earth as the waters cover the sea".

From the News of the Churches.

**HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE ARMENIAN CHURCH IN TURKEY.\***

The Protestant movement in the Armenian Church commenced about thirty years ago in the conversion of three ecclesiastics at Beyrout, two of whom were bishops. They were impressed through reading some tracts left

by Mr Goodell, we believe, now at Constantinople. In 1825, the American missionary, Mr King, who has since been so much persecuted in Greece, wrote a farewell letter to the Roman Catholics on the occasion of his leaving Syria, stating the reasons why he could not be a Romanist. This pamphlet was translated into Armenian, and a copy was sent to an Arminian of distinction at Constantinople. There it produced an extraordinary effect, being considered of so much importance that it was read at a large meeting of the clergy in the Patriarchal church; and on the Scripture references in it being examined, it was agreed, as if by common consent, that the Church needs reform. The way had been prepared by the circulation of the Holy Scriptures during the preceding ten years.

In 1815, an edition of 5000 Bibles in the ancient Armenian character had been issued from St Petersburg, and in 1817 another of 2000 from Calcutta. New editions were printed by the British and American societies, and extensively circulated among the clergy, schoolmasters, and others conversant with the ancient tongue, and a partial reformation commenced among them. At length editions were issued in Turkish and Armeno-Turkish, for circulation among the people generally; the latest in modern Armenian was printed at Smyrna by Mr Riggs, only last March. It is a noble quarto, of 5000 copies, with copious marginal references. Nothing is more apparent in the history of the Armenian Reformation than the influence thus exerted by the circulation of the Holy Scriptures.

Among the more enlightened Armenians at Constantinople was a man named Pestimaljian, at the head of a seminary for the Church; it was his constant aim to make his pupils Bible students, and his influence was felt long after his death. In the summer of 1832, two American missionaries were stationed at Constantinople.

Fire, plague, cholera, together with the usual obstacles in man's corrupt and stubborn heart, prevented much being done for the first year. The good seed was, however, sown; men like Pestimaljian cultivated the acquaintance of the missionaries, and so did some of the priests. The result was an outward reformation in many quarters, pictures were removed from the churches, and the pure gospel was preached. Many Lancasterian schools were established. A high school carried on for some time at Pera by one of the evangelical Armenians, at length aroused the jealousy of the leading ecclesiastics, and through their influence and that of the bankers, at that time the ruling council of the nation, the school was broken up; but, to their utter dismay and chagrin, a rich Armenian, who had founded a large school in one of the suburbs of the capital (Haskouy,) appointed as chief teacher the very man whose evangelical views had led to the breaking up of the Pera school. This banker was no Protestant, but he was resolved to have the best possible teacher: the Bible was the avowed text-book; and thus, instead of the limited influence in a school of 40 pupils, Sahakian was at the head of the national school of 600. After a protracted struggle of two years, the school was closed, but the rival one at Scutari was never so prosperous; and, in the meantime, a seminary was formed at Bebek, in connection with the American Mission, which, though small, has been the means of training most of



the pastors and native helpers now in the field. The number of persons now avowing evangelical principles was constantly on the increase—the doctrines of the Bible, as contrasted with the tenets of their priests, were the subject of daily discussion in private houses and in their shops. The Patriarch, though formerly, as a priest, on friendly terms with the missionaries, and apparently evangelical, now became alarmed at the extent of religious inquiry, and resolved to use extreme measures to put a stop to the reformation.

The Patriarch at Constantinople is, strictly speaking, only a bishop, appointed by the Ottoman Government as political head of his nation. The proper Patriarch of the Armenians resides at Echmiadzin in Georgia, but when that territory was appropriated by Russia in 1828, it was, of course, the policy of the Porte to counteract any new influence over her Christian subjects which Russia would thus seek to exert—hence the creation of a Patriarchate in the capital.

As this man was almost irresponsible, and possessed of unlimited power, the consequences of a persecuting policy were sure to be most serious. He had but to prefer an accusation, true or false, to the Turkish officials, and the party charged could be punished at his pleasure, by fine, confiscation of goods, imprisonment, torture, or banishment. A long catalogue of such cases at Constantinople is given in the correspondence respecting the condition of Protestants in Turkey, printed by order of the House of Commons in March 1851. Anathemas were heaped on the heads of all obnoxious persons, and on all who refused to sign a new creed drawn up by the Patriarch. In this creed were such articles as these:—"That faith alone cannot save a man"—"that the holy, wooden cross, anointed pictures, and relics of saints, are to be adored, and that God always works miracles by means of them,"—"that the mystery of the holy communion is the true body and blood of Christ," &c. A priest, named Vertaness, was especially obnoxious, having been already twice vanished for his bold avowal of evangelical sentiments. He was denounced by a public anathema as "a traitor, a murderer of Christ, a child of the devil, and an offspring of antichrist;" and was ultimately banished to the convent of Armasb, in the interior of Asia Minor; but in his journeyings, and in his place of exile, he always made many converts, and is now a valuable deacon of the church at Pera (Constantinople).

A general anathema was next issued against "the followers of the corrupt new sect, who are," says the Patriarch, "accursed and excommunicated and anathematized by God, and by all his saints, and by us;"—as to a directive, "whoever gives him bread, or assists

him in making money, or has intercourse with him as a friend, or does business with him, will lose his soul," &c. Compulsory potent measures were immediately employed; some were bastinadoed, many sticks being broken on their naked feet, others were imprisoned on false pretences, the shops and houses of many were forcibly closed, and their goods and furniture thrown into the street; wives were forced to separate from their husbands, parents to disinherit their children who avowed evangelical sentiments, or else be anathematized themselves. Some Protestants, perfectly innocent, and sane, were sent to the madhouse, and there confined in chains. The various public guilds were forbidden at their peril to retain among them any of the heretics—the bread and water carriers were forbidden to supply those common necessaries of life. Nor was this confined to Constantinople. The Turkish Governors in the provinces received letters from the capital, at the dictation of the Patriarch, to aid the ecclesiastics there in bringing the refractory evangelicals ("evangelical infidels," the Turks called them) to order. As the Patriarch was their recognized civil head, it was easy to represent them as rebels against the state. The grossest charges were circulated against the whole Protestant Church, as approving of polygamy, adultery, and theft, and sanctioning rebellion against the civil power. But the more persecution raged, so much the more did the truth spread and strike root; the eyes of the multitudes were opened to the selfishness and duplicity of their priests, and the contrariety between their creed and practice, and the teachings of the Holy Scriptures.

At length the persecution raged to such a degree that after the lapse of some months, the evangelical brethren applied for relief to Reshid Pasha, Turkish minister for Foreign Affairs, but owing to the influence of some leading Arminians, nothing was done until Sir Stratford Canning (now Lord Stratford de Redcliffe) vigorously espoused their cause; and in accordance with a pledge of the Sultan, given three years before, that henceforth there should be no persecution for religious opinion in Turkey, it was now decided that free toleration should be granted to the Protestants.\* On the 21st of June 1846, the Patriarch Matteos gave the finishing stroke to his work by a public official act, which resulted, of necessity, in the organization of Evangelical Protestant Churches among the Armenians. On that day, which was a solemn festival of the church, he issued a new bull of

excommunication and anathema against all who remained firm in their evangelical principles, decreeing that it should be publicly read at each annual return of their festival in all the Arminian churches through the empire. "Thus," as Mr Dwight says, "were the Protestants cast off and cast out for ever." On the 1st July 1846, the evangelical Armenians in Constantinople, to the number of forty (three being females), organized themselves into a church, on a basis jointly Presbyterian and Congregational, with the advice of the missionaries of the American Board and those of the Free Church of Scotland labouring among the Jews, and one of the native brethren was chosen by ballot as pastor. Strenuous efforts were made to close the Protestant places of worship, and to prevent them burying their dead, but the Turkish authorities now interfered on their behalf; even to this day, however, it is quite common for mourners to be stoned and spit upon. The position of the Protestants was now most anomalous, as, while separated from the Patriarch as their ecclesiastical head, he was still recognised by law as their civil head. The difficulty could not be remedied, under the peculiar constitution of Turkey, except by the appointment of a Vakeel of their own body to superintend their secular affairs. At length this boon was obtained, the Vakeel chosen being the Patriarch's own brother, then and still a staunch Protestant. On the 15th November 1847, Lord Cowley procured from the Turkish Government an Imperial decree, recognising the native Protestants as a separate and independent community, with whom no interference should be permitted either in temporals or spirituals on the part of patriarchs, monks, or priests of other sects. This decree was immediately circulated through the provinces, and the Pashas were instructed to see it duly observed. Thus the Patriarch's schemes were rendered completely nugatory, and he was himself, before many months, deposed from office on account of various frauds on the public treasury. Since then, the reformation has made rapid progress; missionary tours have been made through most of the territory occupied by Armenians; and as respects the churches thus left at rest, it might be said of them as of the churches of Judea, Galilee, and Samaria in apostolic times, that, "walking in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, they were multiplied."
