

At the hour already named, the Right Worshipful Grand Master entered and assumed the Chair. The Companions being seated in their proper places, under the superintendence of the Grand Director of Cemmonies, the Grand Master directed Brothers Dr. Allen (County Master of Stormont) and William Henderson (Past County Master of Durham) to test each Brother present, which having been completed and reported in the usual manner to the R. W. Sen. Dy. Grand Master, that Officer

made his announcement to the G. M. & S., who, assisted by Bro. Rev. R. A. Carden, Deputy Grand Chaplain, and the other Companions, opened this Special Session in the Illustrious Order of the Royal Searlet, according to the proper forms, with solemn prayer, and the Companions resumed their seats.

The Grand Master then arose, and addressed the Grand Lodge in substance as follows-the utmost silence reigning throughout the large assemblage, except while interrupted by cheers and other tokens of approbation:—He expressed his very great pleasure at meeting many of those brethren who had been separated since we last met in this very building in 1853. Our glorious Institution should be one and undivided, and not one had gone further or taken more pains to bring about that happy position, which, he was proud to state, the Order now occupied. He hoped the proceedings of this Session of the Grand Lodge would be conducted in that orderly and decorous manner which should characterise a society in which brotherly love and union reign predominant. He then gave several reasons for summoning this Session, amongst which were: that he desired to see the members of the Institution more cemented in unity of feeling and sentiment, and he thought personal intercourse with each other the most judicious way of accomplishing the object he had in view; that being admitted, he trusted that all the brethren would be actuated by the same feelings that he was, and that the interests and well being of the Institution would be carried out to the fullest extent, with a determination that brotherly unity should and must govern all their actions; then would the Seciety prosper and be a terror to its foes, and an instrument of power in our hands, which would make our influence be felt throughout the length and breadth of the country. He next alluded to the rapid increase in the ranks of the Society, not only in numbers, but in respectability, wealth and position. He was confident that the brethren would hear with the greatest satisfaction, that one hundred and one Warrants to open new Lodges had been granted since the last meeting of the Grand Lodge, at which time he had the henor of being chosen the head of this great and powerful body of United Orangemen. In the past ten months an average of ten Warrants had been issued, or one every third day. Brethren, we have reason to be proud of the tide which public opinion is taking in our favor. Let us be moderate in our transactions, and enjoy our high position with that dignity which becomes true Orangemen. He also alluded to the vast amount of Correspondence and several other matters, which would be brought under the notice of the Grand Lodge, and which he had no doubt

would receive the most careful consideration of the Companions and Brethren. He also apologised for the absence of the Grand Treasurer, which was caused by sickness in his (the G. T's.) family.

The Grand Moster was repeatedly cheered during the delivery of his opening address, and the brethren, as well those of the party who were formerly attached to the other body, as those who had always been attached to this body, evidenced their approbation and attachment to the head of the Order by repeated expressions of approval.

On motion of Bro. Ogle R. Gowan, Last Past Grand Masier, seconded by Bro. John McKinnon, Deputy Grand Master for Canada East, it was unanimously

Resolved—That a Committee of five Brothers be now appointed, to whom the Correspondence referred to by the R. W. the Grand Master in his opening address shall be referred, and that such Committee consist of Bros. O. R. Gowan, 137; Michael Crawford, 163; McKenzie Bowell, 274; William Henderson, 265; and Dr. Wm. C. Allen, 181.

Some discussion having arisen relative to the Proxy of Brc. Ketcheson, for No. 274, Belleville, and Brc. S. B. Morrics for No. 419, Colborne, it was, upon motion of Brc. O. R. Gowan, L. P. G. M., seconded by Bro. John McKinnon, D. G. M. for C. E., unanimously

Resolved—That the Proxy now presented by Bro. Benjamin Ketcheson, for Lodge No. 274, Belleville, Co. Hastings, be received, and the said Brother be entitled to sit and vote as the Representative of that Lodge, on all matters coming before this meeting of the Grand Lodge.

A motion similar to the above, relative to Bro. S. B. Morries, Proxy for No. 419, Colborne, was then, on motion of Bro. C. R. Gowan, L. P. G. M., seconded by Bro. A. J. Van Ingen, C. M. Northumberland, put and carried unanimously.

W. M. Pattyson, 548; Rev. R. A. Carden, 349; David Marshall, 309; Joseph T. Dutton, 18, C. E., and John Hogg, 651.

On motion of Bro. Wm. C. Anderson, C.M. Prince Edward, seconded by Bro. McKenzie Bowell, C. M. Hastings, it was unanimously

Resolved—That a Committee of five members be now appointed, to whom the question of the amendment of the Royal Scarlet Dispensation be reterred, and that Bros. Wm. C. Anderson, 175; John Loan, 527; John Campbell, 6, C. E.; Thomas Cairnes, 115, and S. B. Campbell, 675, do compose said Committee.

At the urgent request of the Companions, the Grand Master and Sovereign was pleased to declare the Grand Lodge reduced to the Orange Order at a quarter past One o'clock, P. M., in order to admit some brethren who had not been farther advanced in the Degrees of the Institution.

Bro. John Hogg, D.M. Nottawasaga seconded by Bro. F. C. Stewart, C. P. Co. Simcoe, gave notice that he would move at the next Session of the Grand Lodge, "That a Committee of seven Brothers be appointed, whose duty it shall be to consider, and report to this Grand Lodge the propriety of appointing a paid Grand Secretary to be paid a salary of £—, per annum, said Secretary to devote all his time to the duties of the Orange Institution, and to hold office during the pleasure of the Grand Lodge, and that The Constitution and Laws be altered so as to meet the present emergency."

Rev. Bro. Carden, Bro. O. R. Gowan, and other brothers addressed the Grand Lodge, strongly urging a large attendance at the Annual Session in Quebee, in June. Their remarks produced the desired effect upon the brothren, many of whom promised to attend, not only them-



selves, but would use their influence on their return home, with the brethren in their several localities, to induce them to be present also.

Bro. Rev. Nassau C. Gowan, Dy. G. C., (seconded by Bro. Rev. R. A. Carden, P. G. C.,) gave notice that he would (D. V.) move at the next meeting of this R. W. Grand Lodge: That at the Annual County Meeting of each County, in February, it shall be determined whether all the Lodges in the County shall assemble in one place, for the Celebration of the never-to-be-forgotten 12th of July, or whether each District in the County shall be permitted to have a Procession within its own bounds.

On motion of Bro. Thomas M. Morton, M. D., Co. M. Leeds, seconded by Bro. Thomas Johnston, Co. M. Grenville, it was unanimously

Resolved—That this Grand Lodge do now adjourn, and so remain until the hour of seven o'clock this evening.

The R. W. the Grand Master now assumed the Chair, and the Companions and Brethren took their seats.

On the Grand Master declaring the Grand Lodge ready for business, Bro. Ogle R. Gowan, Chairman, read and presented the Report of the Committee on Correspondence, as follows:

To the R. W. the Grand Master and Sovereign of the L. O. I. of B. N. A. and the Grand Lodge in Special Meeting assembled, in Kingston.

R. W. SIR AND BRETHREN,

The Committee on Correspondence respectfully begleave to report that they have had under consideration the Correspondence referred to them upon the subject of the two Lodges, now meeting under number 316, in the City of Kingston. They have also had under consideration the Warrants of the same number granted to Bros. James Greadon, James Agnew and Thomas Robinson, and have examined a number of the Brethren of both Lodges upon the questions in dispute. The Committee, after a full and patient investigation, recommend that the members of both Lodges be requested to meet on the 15th day of May, 1857, and then elect, for the remainder of the present year, a Master and other Officers of the Lodge—that a Warrant of the same number

(316) be issued in the name of Bro. Thomas Robinson, under the authority of which, the Lodge shall meet on the said day—that the District Master do preside at the said meeting until a Master shall be elected and sworn into Office—and that all former Warrants of the same number (316) be called in and cancelled.

The attention of your Committee was next directed to the subject of the two Warrants of the same No. (133) granted to Cartwright, in the County of Durham, and they recommend that a new Warrant be issued in the name of Bro. Wm. Vance, of the said No. 133, and that the members of both Lodges need on such a day as the District Master may appoint, to elect a Master and other Officers for the said Lodge—that the District Master preside at the said meeting, till a Master shall be elected and sworn into Office,—and that all former Warrants of the No. 133, be called in and cancelled.

The Committee have read over the Correspondence from New Brunswick, and from Montreal in L. C., and they recommend that the consideration of the subjects referred to in them, be deferred till the next Annual Session of the Grand Lodge.

The attention of the Committee has been given to the letter of Bro. Grant, of Quebee, upon the subject of the removal of the next Annual Meeting of G. L. from that city, and they trust that the appearance of the R. W. the G. L. in the ancient Capital of Lower Canada, on the day appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Brethren of B. A. in Annual Session, will allay all anxiety that might have been entertained by our Quebee Brethren; an anxiety, however, that was not called for, as the removal of the said Meeting never was contemplated.

The Committee recommend that all action upon subjects connected with the differences existing in Quebee, in reference to the two Royal Scarlet Dispensations in that City, be deferred till the Annual Meeting to be held in that City, when the parties interested can be heard personally and fuller information received, than is at present before your Committee.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Lodge report Laubstitute the following, viz., "No Candidate shall be admitted unless he subscribes to the Orthodox Protestant Creed, as understood by the Evangelical Churches of Christendom; and that such Creed be held to be a firm belief in the Dectrine of the Holy Trinity—the Divinity and Humanity of our Lord Jesus Christ—the personality and Divinity of the Holy Ghost—the sufficiency of the Holy Scripture, as the sole rule of Faith and practice, and the Doctrine of future rewards and punishments. And further, said Candidate must be also of good moral habits, and a loyal subject of the British Empire."

- 8. To alter and amend Section 25, by adding after "County" "Local Lodges."
- 9. To alter and amend Rule 31, by adding after "Deputy Master" the word "Chaplain."
- 10. To amend Rule 33, by adding after "each Lodge" "except if working under a Lodge."
- ·11. To amend Rule 35, by substituting "for one copy of the books" simply the books."
  - 12. To amend Rule 41, by striking out the word "written."
- 13. To add in Rule 43, the words after "Proxy" "who shall be a member of the Lodge."
  - 14. To add after "include all" "Provincial" in Rule 43.

- 15. To add to Rule 60, "and parties from Great Britain, who have there got the Degree of Royal Arch Purple, shall be obliged to take the Degrees of Purple and Blue, as given in Canada, within six months after deposit of Certificate, if practicable, and otherwise within the shortest possible period at the discretion of the Masters of the several Lodges."

- 23. To add after the words "established for" defraying the expenses of its Representative to the Grand Lodge, and when established to."
- 24. After Rule 79 add, "Any member of the District Lodge failing to attend any regularly established or convened meeting, and not assigning any good reason therefor, shall be fined at the discretion of the Lodge, in a sum not exceeding five shillings."

31. In Rule 96, after the words "Opened in the Scarle! Degree," read and the business may be conducted in the Royal Arch, if the Right Worshipful the Grand Master or Brother presiding, see fit and necessary.

\$2. After Section 25, in Rule 113, add "District Chaplains."

33. After Section 29, add "Chaplains of Lodges."

34. In Section 10, strike cut "One Pound," and substitute "Two Pounds Ten Shillings."

35. In Section 11, add "the Fees shall not be less than 40s. for the Orange; 5s. for the Purple Degree; 7s. 6d. for the Blue; 10s. for Royal Arch; and 12s. 6d. for the Royal Scarlet."

Your Committee further recommend that, in the issue of Warrants to new Lodges, the number of dormant Lodges be attached and the former Warrants cancelled, when such Lodges shall be free from liability, and recommend the Incorporating of the Institution forthwith,

Bro. Wm. C. Anderson, C. M. Prince Edward, Chairman, read and precented the Report of the Committee on the Revision of the Royal Scarlet Order, as follows:

GRAND LODGE ROOM,

KINGSTON, 30th April, 1857.
REPORT

Of the Committee on the Revision of the Royal Scarlet Dispensation, Your Committee, after having carefully and diligently, investigated and enquired into the working order of the Royal Scarlet Dispensation, and also into the present state of the said Dispensation, do report as follows:—

1st. That when the Grand Lodge of B. N. A., in granting to County and District Masters, the right to have and to hold, to each of them, a Scarlet Dispensation, made no provision for the rescinding and calling in of Dispensations which were then held by brethren not holding the Office of County or District Master.

2nd. That during the late unhappy differences in the Orange Institution, Scarlet Dispensations were granted by both Grand Lodges, to persons residing, in some instances, in the same locality.

3rd. That as a consequence of the foregoing, much confusion prevails, and the Illustrious Order of the Royal Scarlet is not sufficiently respected, and very frequently granted to persons not justly entitled to this exalted Degree.

4th. That in some instances the present form of Dispensation is inoperative, that is, as to the carrying out of its provisions, and containing requirements which, in the opinion of your Committee, are not only useless, but perplexing.

Your Committee beg to submit as a remedy for the foregoing evils:

That all Dispensations of the Royal Scarlet Degree not at present held by County or District Masters, in Rural Districts, be immediately cancelled and declared null and void.

That in Towns and Cities the County Ma ters alone be entitled to receive and hold a Searlet Dispensation, all others to be declared null and void—in his absence, the Deputy County Master, or District Master to act in his place and open the Chapter and earry on the business in the same manner as the County Master, and with the same responsibilities—the Deputy County Master to take precedence to the District Master.

That in all cases, the County Master (holding a Dispensation) shall have authority to hold in Cheek, any District Master in his County who may hold a Searlet Dispensation; and no such District Master shall open his Chapter and exalt any brother to the Degree of R. S., without the permission of the County Master, unless he, the District Master, may have eight or more Lodges in his District.

Provided always that nothing in the foregoing shall be construed so as to prevent the Grand Master, or either or any of the Deputy Grand Masters, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, Grand Lecturer, Grand Chaplain, or President of the Grand Committee, and Grand Director of Ceremonies to

That those parts of the Sections of the Form of Royal Searlet Dispensation which make it necessary for the holder of such Dispensations, to refer to and ask the consent of a Grand Officer to the opening of a Searlet Chapter, or asking the consent of the Sovereign to exalt the brethren who may be elected in the different Chapters, be expunged.

That a fee of One Pound be paid for each and every Dispensation granted as above.
