"The slums must go. Toronto has awakened to its responsibility in regard to filthy, unsanitary conditions. It is our aim to obliterate all quarters that would even indicate the development of a state of affairs on a par with some American cities," Speaking at the annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society, 225 Simcoe-st. Thurs-day afternoon, Mayor Geary voiced the above statement. Slums, he said, were decidedly doirimental to the communabove statement. Slums, he said, were decidedly detrimental to the commun-ity, and if the city sought to save money it should be saved by preven-tion. In lauding the institution for its sympathetic work in saving children from destruction, he said the city's grant was well expended.

"In order to wipe out the objection-able conditions we must begin at child life," he said. "No better praise of the great work of this institution can be given to satisfy the public than the fact that there are many prosperous, happy men and women to-day who are thankful for what the society has done for them.

WHEAT AND BARLEY NOW AT LOWER PRICES r Free Marketing of Grains Induces

Weaker Tone-Export Trade. in Wheat Very Quiet.

The first indication of weakness in the Ontario grain list became manifest yeserday in the continued easiness in wheat

Outario grain list became manifest Yes-terday in the continued easiness in wheat and barley, and before the day was over dealers had found it necessary to reduce their prices on both these commodities. Wheat at the close was down a full cent a bushel, and barley showed a two-cent ioss, at Soc to 96c. Freer deliveries, as a result of the recent higher prices obtain-ing, are, of course, explanatory of the lower figures now ruling. Dealers report that a large amount of wheat and barley has been marketed by the farmers during the last week, and that the supplies now available exceed the demand. One prominent member of the grain section, of the board of trade stated that barley, particularly, was de-cidedly dull, even at the two-point reac-tion. An overplus of supplies was his explanation for this occurrence, when, a week ago, the commodity was in active demand on all sides. Manitoba spring wheat over the cable was very quiet, and bids for No. 3 north-ern for May-June shipment to Liverpool were 1½d per bushel under cost. The de-mand for oats was good from continental buyers, and, if ocean freight room to these ports was available. a large busi-ness could be worked for May-June ship-ment. The Montreal market for maiting barley is, strong, and prices have ad-vanced 20 per bushel. There was an in-creased demand from European sources for spring wheat flour for last half of February, first half March shipment, but as millers are closely sold up for this period, the orders were refused. A good trade continues to be done, and prices for winter wheat grades are 25c per bar-ret higher. Demand for millfeed is good.




