

The advantage of a large mining population in this country (which — is expected will reach at least thirty thousand in the next few years) will be a distinct gain in Hamilton, and must necessarily increase the business of our wholesale and manufacturing firms.

Dr. Coleman speaks in glowing terms of his recent visit to this country, and addressed a very successful meeting of the Ontario Mining Institute at Rat Portage on Sept. 8 last. Many were unable to obtain admission. He concluded by referring to the interest being taken by the people of Ontario in mining speculations beyond their own province. He stated that many of the schemes being put before them were "wild-cat" and should be avoided. "The people of Ontario," he said, "have a great gold field at their door," and he predicted a great development when the value of its gold deposits was fully realized.

INFLAMMATORY RHEUMATISM—Mr. Vancouver, B.C., Oct. 3.—The recently reported large find of asbestos in North Kootenay, where a deposit 1000 feet thick is stated to extend for miles, should prove of considerable and increasing importance, in view of the non-conducting and non-inflam mable qualities of the mineral. Numerous new finds of precious metal ores are reported from widely parted districts of the province daily and important communications are being made, with a view to a further introduction of British capital into British Columbia mining.
