EVERYTHING WAS Suddenly Changed at Washington Yesterday.

General Lee Could Not Get the Americans out of Havana in Time and War had to be Postponed Till Monday Next.

There was Great Excitement at Washington and the Fire-Eaters were Disappointed, but the President Triumphed.

The news received from Washington yesterday foretold plainly that war was imminent between the United States and Spain, but later dispatches were more peaceful in tone, announcing that Spain was willing to grant the Cuban insurgents an armistice.

The United States' Flying Squadron, under the command of Commodore Schley, has been ordered to sail for the Canary Islands. This is the first war order issued by the Navy Department, the battleship Texas has sailed from the Brooklyn Navy Yard to join the fleet at Hampton Roads.

ALL IS CHANGED.

The War Cloud Was Scattered as by a Lightning Flash and a Thunderbolt.

Washington, April 6.—Swift as a cannon's flash changed the Cuban situation today. The galleries of Congress were crowded; Senators and Representatives were anxious and agitated; even the diplomatic corps was in a ferment, awaiting the message from the President of the United States to the Congress of the American people.

American ships in Havana in Force.

The first reason for the delay was that the Administration received advices from General Lee at Havana, indicating that all Americans could not be got out of the island to-day and would be in grave peril if the message proceeded to the department.

Spain Weakens.

The second reason and perhaps equally potent one was that the President, after a careful consideration of the situation, decided to postpone the sailing of the fleet until the morning of Monday.

War Material From England.

London, April 6.—The British steamer Marston, Captain Blinham, of the Wilson Line, which sailed from Newcastle on March 29 for New York, had on board 14 of the most modern guns, 76 tons of gun carriages, 31 tons of empty shells and 11 tons of empty cartridges, oil from the Elswick Works.

Cruiser Cincinnati Struck in the Mud.

Key West, Fla., April 6.—The United States cruiser Cincinnati is aground in the middle of Thursday morning on a mud bank directly opposite the Government wharf.

Fleet at Hong Kong Coaling Up.

Hong-Kong, April 6.—The United States fleet is preparing to go to sea, and supplies are being purchased for the use of the American warships.

Gen. Lee Has Not Been Called Off.

Havana, April 6.—Consul-General Lee assures the correspondent of the Associated Press that he has received no instructions to leave Havana. It is reported, however, that some of the consular records were sent north by the Mascotte today.

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NOW THE JAPS ARE EXCITED.

They Don't Object to John Bull Occupying Wei-Hai-Wei.

But They Want to Have a Better Foot-hold on the Asiatic Continent Than They Have at Present—Officials Favor British Occupation and an Anglo-Japanese Entente—Cable News.

London, April 7.—The Yokohama correspondent of The Times says: "Japan is vehemently excited. There is no general opposition to a British occupation of Wei-Hai-Wei, but there is a feeling that Japan must assert herself, and secure some other foothold on the Asiatic continent. The Government is hampered by financial considerations, but will probably be obliged to yield to public pressure. Sober people and the officials generally favor a British occupation of Wei-Hai-Wei and an Anglo-Japanese entente, purporters for which are progressing favorably."

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WESTERN PASSENGER MEN.

Met at Chicago Yesterday and Discussed the Demoralization in Rates, but Nothing Was Done.

Chicago, April 6.—At a meeting of the Western Passenger Association held here today, a general discussion took place regarding the extensive demoralization of Pacific Coast rates. A proposition was presented for the discontinuance of the cut rates through the Missouri River gateways, and it was pointed out that these rates were being held over for further consideration, but the main feature of the bill were endorsed. Power to acquire stock in other companies was withheld for the present. CONVICT POPULATION HAS INCREASED.

Thirteen Hundred and Eighty-Two People in the Penitentiaries.

Unmarried Men Appear to be More Wicked Than the Benedicts, While Temperance People Make a Bad Comparison With Drinkers—Minister Harassed by Political Heaters—Nickel Steel Co.

Ottawa, April 6.—(Special.)—The annual report of the Minister of Justice was distributed today. It shows the prison population to be 1382, an increase of 40 over the previous year. The convicts under twenty years of age number 131, and those over sixty number 22. There are 57 life prisoners, 10 Chinese and 23 Indians. There are 839 single and 482 married men, and seven widowers. As regards social habits, 783 are put down as temperate, 475 intemperate and 124 abstainers.

Harassed by Heaters.

Mr. Douglas Stewart, Inspector of Penitentiaries, has a report which concludes as follows: "The system vests the control of all penitentiaries in the fact succeeding Ministers have been harassed and embarrassed to such an extent by the persistent interference of local political organizations that the selection of officials has been virtually delegated to local and irresponsible politicians whose chief aim has been the potency of the institution as a political factor in the constituency in which it is situated."

It is quite apparent that so long as this de facto local control, continues the whitewash brush of departmental officials and the brush of special commissioners will be alike ineffectual in removing stains which are occasionally exhibited to public gaze. What is required is such a change as will relieve the prisons from the grasp of the tentacles of the local political octopus. The burden of maintaining the institutions is imposed upon the whole of Canada, and it is not reasonable that the privileges which attach to a penitentiary should be equally extensive."

THE GRAND TRUNK OFFICES

Mr. Hugh Blair Argues for Their Removal to Toronto.

An Opportunity Now Which is Not Likely to Offer Again—This City's Importance as a Revenue-Producer to the Road—Ontario's Great Preponderance of Millage.

Editor World: The importance of the question is my excuse for asking space in your column to lay before my fellow-citizens some reasons why I think the city and the Grand Trunk Railway should at once negotiate on the basis of a removal of the head office here.

There is a tide in the affairs of corporations, as well as in the affairs of men, which when it rises, leads on to fortune. The tide in the affairs of the city and the company as to the establishment of the head offices here is at its flood now.

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Canada Will be Swept. Again, the St. Lawrence Canal will be deepened to 14 feet by next year. This will bring a fair percentage of Montreal business to Toronto and will also largely to Toronto's importance as a shipping port.

NETER GOOD CANADIAN CASH

Spanish Swindlers Tried to Work a Citizen of Beamsville, Ont.

The Exact Story—Large Fortune Locked Up in a Bank—Beautiful Girl Whose Father Was Cast in a Prisoner and Diaz Good Friend Takes Care of the Girl and Wants Money to Send Her to Her Relative in Canada.

Hamilton, April 6.—(Special)—A telegraphic dispatch appearing in an Ontario paper two days ago to the effect that a gang of swindlers operating from Spain were defrauding people in the United States of large sums of money has brought to light a similar operation right here at home.

It makes an interesting drama, into whose scenes there crowd the gloomy fortresses of Valencia, Spain; New York, Canada and the quiet little Ontario village of Beamsville.

The play opens in Mar., 1897, and runs nearly a year before the curtain rings down. On May 11 Harvey Tallman, former proprietor of the saw mills in the village of Beamsville, had thrust into his hands over the postoffice counter, an envelope covered with seals and bearing the postmark Valencia, Spain.

The writer began his relationship with the Beamsville man on the ground that he had married in Cuba a lady the name of Carolina Tallman, and then went on to unfold his story. According to Diaz had during the summer in Cuba of Captain-General Martinez Campos been "Captain-General" in the hands of his island, and was signed "Alfred Diaz."

When General Campos was retired General Weyler took his place and Weyler and Treasurer Diaz quarrelled. Diaz, in revenge, went over to the Cubans, taking the money with him.

The Treasurer had a daughter, Cecilia, who later on figures prominently in the story.

To ensure the future of this girl, Diaz decided to leave Cuba, Spain, and return to London, where he takes the precaution of placing \$100,000 in a bank. The sum, "payable to bearer," he places in a portmanteau having a false bottom, and then with Cecilia and the postoffice counter, he embarked for London.

THE GOVERNMENT'S PREFERENTIAL TRADE POLICY.

Canada has taken three distinct steps towards the initiation of the much-talked-of Imperial Zollverein policy. First of all the Dominion Government cleared away the obstacles that have made the adoption of such a policy an impossibility.

The second step was the practical, although limited, application of the policy by the Dominion of Canada. On and after Aug. 1 next Great Britain and certain of the colonies will enjoy a specific and substantial advantage over all foreign countries in dealing with Canada.

The third step taken by Canada was announced by the Minister of Finance in his Budget Speech on Tuesday. In increasing the duty on sugar from 10 per cent to 12 per cent, he has received a marked preference in Canadian markets, Canada has applied the principle of taxing an important food product in order to benefit an Imperial industry.

Canada, then, has cleared the way for reciprocal preferential trade; has adopted the Imperial Zollverein principle as far as it is possible for her to adopt it; and, finally, has shown Great Britain the unreasonableness of her opposition to agreeing to a reciprocal trade.

While the Government has committed Canada to a policy of preferential trade it is surprising that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not only insisted on Great Britain extending reciprocal treatment to Canada, but has actually told the people of Great Britain that no reciprocal treatment was expected of them.
