He enlarged the slit in the box (in our presence) with a chisel or plece of iron so that it would let them in this way. With these arrangements he could tell without any arfaculty how each ballot was marked. I protested against his doing so, and a number of voters also raised objections, but the only result was to have a bill tacked up to the window which did not prevent his still distinguishing for whom the ballots were marked. He said Deputy Returning Officer had with him a list of names of voters written out on foloscap paper, which he referred to and made marks on after voters voted.

4. The said Deputy Returning Officer refused and neglected to swear a number of men whom myself and my coagent requested him to swear. Michael Ileenan was one of these. He refused to swear him, he said, because we gave no reason for wanting him sworn.

5. When the time came to count the ballots the said Deputy Returning Officer, after first pretending to count the total number, threw the ballots all out on the table, shoving a few towards each of Macuish's scrutineers (one of whom was a stranger), the poli clerk and my co-agent, but hauling back the main bulk to himself. He allowed these men to sort or manipulate what they got as they chose, while he stood up and sorted the main bulk, so that nobody but himself could see the face of the ballots. He placed his back to the wall and purposely kept the ballots and himself in such a position that I could not by any possibility see their faces. He set them down on the table face down. 



The beginning of the final remedy for railway trusts is suggested in the late report of the United States Commissioner of Haliroads, Gen. Longstreet. The Supreme Court has decided that a railroad is a public highway, an improved highway; that the business of railway transportation is of a public nature; and that, in performing it, the carrier is, to a certain extent, performing a function of government. Now, let Congress act on Gen. Longstreet's recommendation and begin by providing for the early construction of a national freight railroad with double tracks from St. Louis to San Francisco, and follow that immediately with three others like it—one from Chicago, by vay of St. Louis, to Gaiveston, Texas; another from Jamestown or Bismarck, North Dakota, by way of St. Louis, to Savannah, Georgia: and a third from St. Louis to New York city. The aggregate length of these several lines would bot exceed 5500 miles; and the roads could be built and equipped for about \$25,000,000. This amount could—if it were deemed necessary, rather than to issue treasury-notes—all be borrowed from our own people on 2½ per cent. 50-year bonds; and long before these bonds had matured, the net earnings of the roads would have raised a sinking fund large enough to pay them. Afterward, rates could be reduced accordingly; or the income of the roads could be turned into the treasury as public revenues. There would be no dividends to be paid to stockholders, no extravagant salaries to officers, and no campaign contributions to political comnittees. Nor would there be any need of the services of a corps of high-priced lawyers.

These roads, in the beginning, need carry nothing but freight and the heavier classes of mail matter, they should be supplied with motive power sufficient to haul not only Government cars but those of all persons or companies applying for transportation; and the employee should he protected from political intermeddling by a tenure de-
