





President McNaught, in introducing the subject, asserted that the pioneer deserved the good-will of all citizens. He regarded him as the herald of empire. He had built up the colonies that contribute is of largely to the strength of the British government. He had caused the earth to be girdled by the empire, and made the English language the language of the whole world practically. It would in time, he thought, become the language of diplomacy, too. He called upon W. H. Doel as the first speaker.

Mr. Doel said that when he was a boy there were vast woods around Toronto. He had been one of the first directors of the Exhibition, and looked back with satisfaction to the several years of its early growth. Then its organizers scarcely dreamed of its present scope. He concluded with a brief history of the early struggles of the association.

Prof. Robertson delivered some extemporaneous remarks of much merit. He desired especially to recall the first four years of the Exhibition—years full of trials and tribulations. It was just twenty years ago that he secured \$200 in prize money for exhibiting cheese at the Exhibition which he had made with his own hands. This was no small amount of money, the speaker said, for a young man to have in his possession twenty years ago and he made good use of it. He attributed his present position as Commissioner of Dominion Agriculture to the prizes he took two decades ago at the Canadian Exhibition at Toronto, and as he had contributed in some measure he believed to the advancement of the butter and cheese industry of the continent, he thought the Fair of twenty years ago, which enabled him to show the product of his skill as a cheese maker, was indirectly responsible for whatever advancement he had helped in this way to accomplish. Then the speaker broadened his theme. Canada excels all other countries in the splendid qualities of her cheese, and is second in point of production of first class commercial butter.







BOERS SEE CHAMBERLAIN. Conference Held Friday Afternoon_ Nothing Was Divulged.

London, Sept. 5.-The conference between the Boer generals, Botha, Dewet and Delarey, and Colonial Secrewet and Dearley, and Colonial Secretary Chamberlain, was held this afternoon at Downing-street. The generals were escorted to the Colonial Office by an official of that department of the government and drove there in an open carriage. They received a hearty welcome from the considerable crowds assembled at either end of the route. Just prior to their departure from their healt Alvaham Figsher the Reon Just prior to their departure from their hotel Abraham Fischer, the Boer delegate, had a conference with them.

Lord Kitchener and Lord Onslow, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, participated in the conference.

The conference lasted two hours.
Reporters were refused all information as to what took place.

Mr. Chamberlain has authorized the announcement that the proceedings will be published later in a blue book.

RARE CORONATION SOUVENIR. An Exact Fac-Simile of King Edward's Copy of the Coronation Service.

In the south window of the Whaley Royce music house, corner Yonge and Richmond streets, there is now en view the most unique souvenir of the coronation service which has yet reached Canada. The work is a copy of the coronation service and is one of a limited and numbered edition de luxe. King Edward's copy was numbered one and Queen Alexandra's copy was numbered two. and the Whaley Royce copy is numbered eighty-two. The copy, as to paper, binding, and press work, is an exact fac-simile of the services, which were in the hands of King Edward and Queen Alexandra in Westminster Abbey on Aug. 9. The service is bound in red morocco, richly embossed with gold. The cover design is a striking representation of the royal arms and the arms of England, Ireland and Scotland brilliantly wrought out, and was designed by Mr. Clayton, the famous English artist, in stained glass. The volume is a masterpiece of the bookmaker's art, produced by Messrs. Novello & Co., and is a souvenir of the coronation, which no British subject should fail to see.

SWISS PLAGUE OF VIPERS.

Geneva, Sept. 5 .- Switzerland is suffering from a plague of vipers, as well as insects. The snakes have become so numerous that the cantonal governments are paying 2s 6d per head in order to exterminate them.

This week alone 110 have been killed in the Canton of Neuchatel, while, in the Cantons of Vaud and St. Gall, the plague is equally bad.



Trades' Union Congress Fears Combinations May Yet Control the State.

OPPOSED TO USE OF CHILD LABOR

Aggression Expressed in Resolution.

London, Sept. 5 .- The Trades Union Congress, at its session to-day, voted that the Parliamentary Committee be structed to introduce a bill in the House of Commons to prevent any children under 15 years of age being nployed in any textile or non-textile factories.

The Cigarmakers' Mutual Associa tion introduced a resolution aimed against "capitalistic combines," which was unanimously adopted. It was worded as follows:

"That, in the opinion of this Congress, the growth of gigantic capitalistic trusts, with their enormous power of controlling production is injurious to the advancement of the working classes, as by such combination the prices of commodities are raised, the standard of comfort of the people can be reduced, the workmen's freedom endangered, and national prosperity menaced."

The speakers contended that the time had arrived when, if the State did not control the trusts, the latter would control the State, and that the only permanent solution of the difficulty rested in mational ownership and control of these monopolies.

At the instance of the Navvies' and General Laborers' Union the following resolution was passed:



"That this congress of British trade unionists places on record its unqualified disapproval of the war against the Orange Free State and the Transvaal Republics, believing that the question of extending the franchise and the protection of industry was not the real cause of the dispute, but the mere shield to cover an unscrupulous conspiracy to the dispute, but the mere shield to cover an unscrupulous conspiracy to grab territory and replace well-paid white labor with unpaid. partially enslaved blacks and Asiatics.

"Further, this congress reaffirms its continued hostility to all wars of foreign aggression, which only tend to enrich the sinister figure of cosmopolitan finance, whose main object is to hold the workers of all countries in universal, social and economic servitude."




