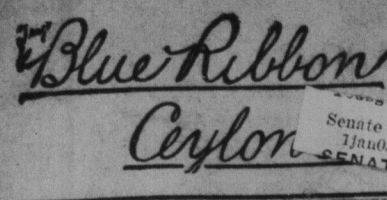

"LORD OF THE MANOR." New Yorker Buys Old Seignior Cap a L'Aligre in Quebec.

Manoir Richelieu, Point a Pic, Que., Sept. 5.—George T. Bonner of New York bought today the old seignior cap of Cap a L'Aligre, a well known tract in a tract of land eighteen miles long by six miles wide, on the north bank of the lower St. Lawrence, extending eastward from Murray Bay.

This purchase makes Mr. Bonner the new seignior of Cap a L'Aligre, an American citizen, he was born in Canada, and has lived in the summer season for many years at Murray Bay.

WEARING APPAREL AND MACHINERY. Letter from Premier Hime of Natal to Sir William Mulock Forwarded Here.

Toronto manufacturers are manifesting much interest in the following letter, forwarded to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association by Sir William Mulock, who received it from Sir Alfred H. Hime, Premier of Natal, indicating the character of manufactured articles this country may sell to advantage in South Africa.

"Dear Sir William Mulock,—Referring to your conversation of the other evening at Lord Strathcona's, I believe that it will be found there is a good market in South Africa for the following: Woollen and cotton goods of all kinds; boots and shoes, light and heavy furniture, iron and brass, frames, sashes, and joinery generally; agricultural implements and machinery of all kinds; especially plows, harrows, picks, axes, snades and shovels. Our natives use cheap goods in large numbers. American spiders or bugies, two and four-wheeled spokes and cart and wagon tires; buckets and other woodenware; tinware, fencing wire, barbed and smooth wire, iron and steel, mining machinery, electrical machinery and cables, both for light and heavy purposes, canned fruits and meats of all kinds; wheat flour and bran; deals and scoundings. No doubt there are many other articles which I have not enumerated, but it would be absolutely necessary to send over agents to ascertain what articles are most required, and to obtain orders with a view to establishing a trade. SIR E. BARTON'S FUTURE. Will Shortly Assume Chief Justice-ship of Commonwealth.

Sydney, N.S.W., Sept. 5.—It is persistently rumored that federal circles at Sir Edmund Barton, the Commonwealth Premier, has been offered a position in London at a salary of £5000 per annum and the office of chief justice of the Commonwealth.

PROF. VIRCHOW PASSES AWAY. Death of Renowned Pathologist Calls Forth Liberal Tributes.

Berlin, Sept. 5.—Prof. Rudolph Virchow, the pathologist, died here at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The evening papers here print glowing eulogies of the deceased professor, classing him as the world's greatest medical and scientific reformer, and saying that no other man had so deeply influenced modern medicine, and that no other had such world-wide reputation, and so many followers in all lands.

Johnson, a negro known as "Ferne", and wanted by the police of several cities, and instantly killed John Robinson, another negro, 25 years old. After the shooting Johnson fled from Buffalo, and was tracked down to Port Robinson.

Johnson was taken into custody at Port Robinson, and is being held in the local jail.

KEPT SECRET FROM NURSES

Police Believe Mrs. Nellie Mulqueen Was Hurled Over Balustrade at Her Home.

SHE IS DYING FROM BROKEN BACK. Said She Fell Down Stairs, But an Attempt Will Be Made to Get at Truth.

A STRAIGHT TARIFF ISSUE

The Globe of Friday deals with the Tarte-Sifton episode in its usual nobby-pammy fashion. It says that Mr. Sifton has a right to his view and it also says that the present tariff is a reasonable tariff and a moderate tariff, and that, therefore, no change is likely to be made in it—in fact, that no change ought to be made in the interest of the country. Now, that is not the issue. The real issue is that Mr. Tarte says that there ought to be a change in the interests of protection and the encouragement of home industries, and Mr. Sifton says that neither himself nor the West will stand for any change in the tariff in the direction of protection. This is a straight declaration of war as between two members of the Laurier cabinet. The Globe pretends that there is no war by saying that there is going to be no change in the tariff. But the issue is raised, and we imagine that the bulk of the people of this country are in favor of a tariff sufficiently protectionist to encourage new industries to be located here. The tariff is the one instrument with which we can compel every nation with which we have business to treat us fairly, and the crying issue in Canada to-day is to so use our tariff as to compel the people of the United States, who close their markets to us and to our markets, to change that law or take the consequences. And that same tariff can be applied equally to Germany, which is hostile to us at present, and to all other European nations. That is the issue, and the Globe must say where it is on this question. The question cannot be dismissed in the nobby-pammy fashion in which the Globe attempted to dismiss it Friday.

LANDS FOR VETERANS

At the session of 1901 the Ontario legislature decided to award 100 acres of land to veterans of the Fenian Raid, the Northwest Rebellion and the South African war, and a year and a half or more has passed without any of the lands being apportioned. Finding the delay irksome a veteran of "Sixty-six" writes The World a letter of complaint. He points out that the legislature was none too whole-hearted in passing the measure, that when the grant was finally decided upon the prospective grantees were deprived of the pine and the minerals on the lands, and lastly that while the government is delaying the issue of certificates to the land the veterans are dying off. He recalls the good work that the men of 1866 did for their country, and thinks it a shame that their small reward so tardily decided upon should still be withheld from them. It is no doubt hard luck that the veterans have to wait so long for their lands, and no doubt the government might have hurried their distribution to some extent, but it is fairness to understand that the department has held back all certificates with the idea of issuing them all at once, so as to avoid showing favor to any. It is thought that by issuing all simultaneously the recipients will each have an equal chance in obtaining a choice of locations in the land distribution. We shall help to curb the impatience of the men of Sixty-six, by announcing that the government promises to issue the certificates this fall.

DUNDONALD HAS A MISSION

Two Toronto Journalists—one of them yet in shorts pants—are constantly in a state of perturbation lest something may happen to Canadian liberty. They seem to fear that it will wander away in the night, or that someone will steal it while their backs are turned. They are in a perpetual state of hysterics over their self-assumed charge, and fairly shriek if anybody goes near it.

If Canadian soldiers visiting England are not carried on flowery beds of ease, one of these neuritic newspapers weeps in long double-column articles for days at a time; and the statement that Lord Dundonald "has a mission" is the latest announcement to throw the nervous sheets into a blue funk.

Canadian liberty is not in any danger, and it would comport more with national dignity if these papers displayed a little less trepidation. Local autonomy is firmly established in the Dominion, and hysterics will add nothing to the security of national self-government.

As far as the Earl of Dundonald is concerned, he has, in his public statements, clearly shown that he understands his position in this country. In announcing his ideas as to the improvement of the Canadian militia, he has plainly made the reservation that his recommendations are subject to the approval of a responsible minister. It is, nevertheless, true that the new Commander-in-Chief "has a mission" in Canada. Otherwise, there is no purpose in his being here at all.

Moreover, because he fully appreciates the true value of the citizen soldier familiarized with the saddle, the rifle and the spade, and because he evidently understands the democratic conditions existing in this country, Lord Dundonald is emphatically the man for the place; and since Canada has at last secured the man for the place, it were a pity if nervous newspapers should throw obstacles in his way, and thus put a drag on his use-

fulness. Certain sections of the Liberal party have not been any too friendly towards the serious task of developing an efficient militia force in this country, and we trust they may henceforth pursue a more patriotic note to say a more dignified course on the question.

MR. TARTE AND PROTECTION. Hon. Mr. Tarte, continuing his campaign in favor of protection and the encouragement of native industries. At a dinner of the holders of liquor licenses in the Province of Quebec, at Montreal, on Wednesday night, he said that, while he did not himself use alcohol (he likes a glass of good wine), still, he thought we ought to make all our own whisky in this country, and all our own gin. He said we could make as good Scotch whisky as is made in Scotland, and as good gin as is supposed to come from Holland. He sided with the resolution passed by the association, that the government amend the law, so as to encourage Canadian-made alcohol, as against the imported article, either for consumption or manufacturing purposes.

TWO HUNDRED MILLIONS

The World Friday drew attention to the enormous crop which Ontario is reaping this year, and what we then said we wish to somewhat amplify. We use large figures when we have to value the year's wheat crop at \$110,000,000, and the oat crop at over \$31,000,000, but both these sources of revenue are surpassed by the yield of hay, which without taking in the second crop will bring the farmer \$40,000,000.

And according to the Department of Agriculture, when we include all the cereal crop and the dairy and livestock industries, we must fix the total agricultural product of Ontario for 1902 at about \$200,000,000.

We are proud of such a showings which compares with Manitoba and Northwest total returns, combined estimated at probably \$60,000,000.

Besides we repeat that Ontario, which has many sources of farm revenue to rely upon, is in a safer position than the west, which, as yet depends mostly on one crop.

WHITE SLAVERY

At last the governments of Europe have been induced to take steps for the suppression of what is euphemistically known as "La traite des Blancs," the infamous international traffic in women. A conference will be held in Frankfurt next month to consider the best means for concerted action to deal with a system of white slavery which President Loubet indignantly denounced in a recent address as an abomination and disgrace to civilization. It is impossible to go into the details of this horrible business, which, however, were fully exposed in the August number of La Grande Revue, and copied by several German newspapers. The writer showed that the traffic is as thoroughly organized as was the negro slave trade of former times, with its salaried agents, its centres of distribution, and its regular exchanges. This network of systematized infamy was further shown to extend to all parts of the civilized world, and that concerted international action, directed with uncompromising severity, was the only way in which it could be broken up. The movement in this direction was brought to a focus when the Congress of Germany took an active personal interest in it and appointed Count von Keller, her champion, to act as chairman of the committee to make arrangements for the Frankfurt conference. It is stated in the New York press that the United States has not been invited to send a representative, although its eastern coast is mentioned as a centre of operations for the traffic.

BIGGER THAN THE CEDRIC. Another Steamer to Be Built to Beat the Record.

London, Sept. 5.—The White Star Line has ordered another steamer to be built by Harland and Wolff of Belfast, which is to be 20 feet longer and a few feet wider than the same company's steamer Cedric, now the largest liner in the world.

The White Star Line steamer Cedric of 21,000 tons the largest liner afloat, was launched at Harland and Wolff's yards, Belfast, on Aug. 11 last. She is 700 feet long, has 75 feet beam, and a depth of 49 1/2 feet. Her carrying capacity is 18,400 tons, and she has accommodation for 3000 passengers. Although the Cedric is inferior in length by about seven feet to the Kaiser Wilhelm II. (launched on Aug. 12), yet her greater beam of three feet makes her the larger ship.

THREATENING HAND OF TRUSTS

Trades' Union Congress Fears Combinations May Yet Control the State.

OPPOSED TO USE OF CHILD LABOR

Hostility to All Wars of Foreign Aggression Expressed in Resolution.

London, Sept. 5.—The Trades Union Congress, at its session to-day, voted that the Parliamentary Committee be instructed to introduce a bill in the House of Commons to prevent any children under 15 years of age being employed in any textile or non-textile factories.

The Cigarmakers' Mutual Association introduced a resolution aimed against "capitalistic combines," which was unanimously adopted. It was worded as follows:

"That, in the opinion of this Congress, the growth of gigantic capitalistic trusts, with their enormous power of controlling production is injurious to the advancement of the working classes, as by combination the prices of commodities are raised, the standard of comfort of the people is endangered, the workers' freedom endangered, and national prosperity menaced."

The speakers contended that the time had arrived when, if the State would control the State, and that the only permanent solution of the difficulty rested in national ownership and control of these monopolies.

At the instance of the Navvies' and General Laborers' Union the following resolution was passed:

"That this congress of British trade unionists places on record its unqualified disapproval of the war against the Orange Free State and the Transvaal Republics, believing that the question of extending the franchise and the protection of industry was not the real cause of the dispute, but the mere shield to cover an unscrupulous conspiracy to grab territory and reduce well-paid white labor with unpaid, partially enslaved blacks and Asiatics."

Further, this congress reaffirms its continued hostility to all wars of foreign aggression, which only tend to enrich the sinister figure of cosmopolitan finance, whose main object is to hold the workers of all countries in universal, social and economic servitude."

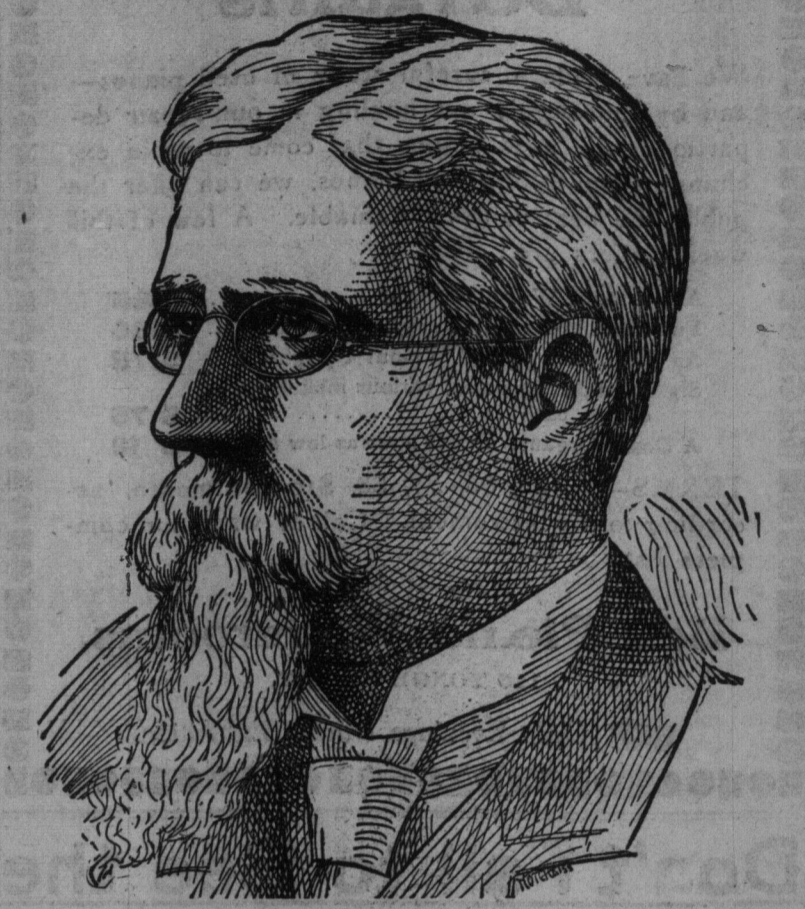
