



HIS WORSHIP OF COBALT. We publish a letter from Mayor Lang of Cobalt, in reply to an article in our columns dealing with that town and suggesting a commission, rather than municipal government, to straighten out the tangle that exists in that enterprising place. We have taken the liberty of pruning Mr. Lang's letter of its insinuations and bad temper. The World has been as much a friend of Cobalt as Mr. Lang, and is anxious to see things remedied; but the mayor must not forget, in fact he proves our whole case by his admissions, that an unusual set of conditions prevail in Cobalt. Not only does he admit that one-third of the town has been burnt down, but he must see that if the same kind of shacks are put up again and another fire should come, the whole town may be burnt the next time. The chief reason for the shacks and the lack of ordinary municipal improvements is that nobody can get a title to land in Cobalt, or an inferior title if they do get one, and as a consequence very few residents have cared to erect substantial buildings. The World, therefore, suggested that the government thru a commission should have power to secure building sites, with titles from the mining companies, and to offer these sites to business men in Cobalt, who would erect substantial buildings, and to workmen for homes.
