THE ASTRONOMICAL CALCULATIONS

Have been made for Charlottetown, in lat. 46° 14' N., long. 63° 10' 22" W. from Greenwich.

The Sun's declination and equation of time are from the Londor Nautical Almanac.

VENUS.

VENUS will be morning star until February 25th, then evening star until December 11th, at which time it passes the inferior conjunction with the Sun, and becomes invisible. Just before this time it exhibits a long slender crescent, always convex towards the Sun, its horns being turned back, and towards the east; but when seen again, it appears in the east before sunrise, with its long crescent bowing back towards the west. On the 5th of November it will be brightest, being then about 40° east of the Sun.

MARS.

MARS will be morning star until October 8th, when it is 90° west of the Sun; then evening star the rest of the year. On the 2d of December it begins to retrograde, or move westward past the stars. It will be in the southern signs until May 7th, when it passes the equator northward. On the 28th of March it will be about 10° south of the central stars in the Urn; on the 20th of July it will be 5° south of the "Seven Stars;" on the 6th of August it will be 5° north of Aldebaran; on the 29th of August it will be 2° north of Tauri; September 14th it will be between and 1° north of Geminorum; October 18th it will be 9½° south of Castor, and on the 25th, 5° 37′ south of Pollux. When a planet is north or south of a star, a straight line drawn from the North Star runs through both, whether they be in the meridian or not.

JUPITER.

JUPITER will be morning star until April 21st, when it is 90° west of the Sun; then evening star the rest of the year. It is in the southern signs yet, but is moving northward.

SATURN.

SATURN will be morning star until January 31st, being then 90° west of the Sun; then evening star until November 7th, when it is in conjunction with the Sun, and invisible; then morning star the rest of the year. It will be in Libra this year.

MERCURY.

MERCURY will be visible in the west soon after sunset, about March 23d, July 20th, and November 15th; also in the east just before sunrise, about January 16th, May 14th, September 9th, and December 30th, being at those times at its greatest brilliancy.

SHOOTING STARS.

Of shooting stars, there is an average of from five to seven visible every hour on a clear night. They are stray visitants in contradistinction to the prodigious swarms of November and August, which observation during twenty-five years has decided

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to be accurately returning phenomena. They are much more numerous during the latter half of the year, when the earth is passing from summer to winter, from aphelion to perihelion. The same increase of number in the last six months of the year is observable in the appearance of fire-balls and aerolites. Now, by what theory can we account for this uniform return of meteors in The theory generally accepted is, that there is a ring or annulus of small bodies revolving with planetary velocity about the sun; that the bodies in question are distributed very unevenly in the ring, there being a small section of the ring where the bodies are numerous, with a few stragglers scattered along the rest of its circuit; that the earth passes through the ring every year, and each year in a new place; and that it passes through that part of the ring in which the planets are most numerous once in about 33 years. When the bodies composing this assumed ring come within the limits of our atmosphere, they are rendered visible to us as shooting stars or fire-balls. Prof. Newton and Mr. Archibald Herschel have concluded independently that shooting stars commence at 70 miles and disappear at 50 miles above the surface of the earth. The velocity of their passage through the air is 38.7 miles, or nearly 40 miles per second. We have reason to expect a shower in 1866, since the cycle of 33.25 years is probably to be reckoned from some date between November in 1832 and in 1833.

THE FIXED STARS.

STRIKING as are the results obtained by spectrum analysis when applied to the sun, moon, and planets, they sink into insignificance when compared with the revelations afforded us of the constitution of those distant bodies the stars, and the light which is thus thrown upon their structure is conclusive as to their being of the same nature as our own sun; a result which analogy had previously indicated, but which had not been supported by any positive It might be supposed that their distance offered insuperable obstacles to such an inquiry, but spectrum analysis knows no such limits, and as long as we can obtain light of an incandescent substance in appreciable quantity, it matters not whether it exists within a few inches of the spectroscope, or at a distance of unnumbered millions of miles, the result being equally certain. In the spectra of all the brighter stars that have been examined, the dark lines appear to be as numerous and as fine as in the No stars sufficiently bright to be observed are solar spectrum. without lines, and star differs from star only in the arrangement of the lines, and consequently in the elementary substances present; but all the stars are constructed on one and the same plan. These spectrum observations on the stars contribute something towards an experimental basis, on which a conclusion, hitherto but a pure speculation, may rest, namely, that at least the brighter stars are, like our sun, upholding and energizing centres of sys. tems of worlds adapted to be the abode of living beings.

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Among the most wonderful and interesting recent discoveries in astronomy are those obtained by "spectrum analysis," bearing on the nature of nebulæ, and on theories as to the origin of worlds Modern improvements in telescopes have so much increased their power as to enable human sight to penetrate further and further into space, and to resolve one after another most of the known nebulæ. In a common telescope these nebulæ appear like faintly luminous cloudlets or patches of light in the remoter regions of the sky; but in the best telescopes they appear like countless minute points of light, as though from distant groups of stars. Some, however, still retain their nebulous aspect, with perhaps a bright spot in the centre. Very recently the light from some of these latter nebulæ has been analyzed by prisms, etc., and proves to be of the kind emanating from substances of a purely gaseous nature, in distinction from the light of the sun, planets, and fixed stars, which indicates that its source is a solid luminous body. In the present state of our knowledge, therefore, we are obliged to accept as authentic this information, brought on the wings of light with more than telegraphic swiftness from the far corners of the universe. Yet it is not proved that these nebulæ will ever consoli date into worlds, luminous or non-luminous; still less, that our own globe and all others were at first mere nebulous matter.

NEW PLANETS AND COMETS.

The discovery of three new asteroidal planets has been announced during the year 1864, making the whole number now recognized eighty two. The eightieth asteroid was discovered by Mr. Pogson of the observatory of Madras, India. It has received the name of Sappho. The eighty first asteroid was discovered September 30 by Mr. Tempel of Marseilles, France. It has received the name of Terpsichore. The eighty-second asteroid was discovered November 27, by M. Luther of Bilk, Germany. It has received the name of Alcmena. Five new comets have been discovered during the year 1864, but none of them exhibited any special features of interest.

DISTANCE OF SIRIUS.

THE absolute intensity of the light of Sirius has been estimated at 224 times that of the sun; and its parallax, amounting to C'.28 gives for its distance from the earth the probable number of 52,000,000,000 of leagues. It follows that we do not see the Sirius of to day, but of 22 years ago; the ray of light that we receive to-day having been emitted by the star about 1844.

ECLIPSES.

There will be five Eclipses this year as follows:

I. A partial Eclipse of the Sun March 16th Invisible in this Island, but visible in Siberia and the North Polar regions.

II. A total Eclipse of the Moon on the evening of March 30. Visible throughout the American Continent. Begins at Charlotteown at 10h. 45m.; total at 11h. 50m., and ends at 2h. 35m. on the norning of the 31st March.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Sun April 15. Invisible in Ameri-

IV. A total Eclipse of the Moon September 24, early in the norning; invisible in this Island, but visible on the Western side of North America.

V. A partial Eclipse of the Sun October 8, in the morning at the time of New Moon. Visible in this Island. Eclipse begins at 11h 10m., morning, and ends 0h. 25m. p.m.

Animals.—All the animals of the farm should be glad to see their owner, and in fact every other person who has to do with them. Man should be recognized as their best friend. Colts and steers particularly, should be petted and handled constantly. Treated thus, they will never need breaking. If there be a stable-boy who plays with the horses by pinching or pretending to pinch their flanks, keep-

ing himself out of the way of kicks and bites, no wonder they become vicious. The same boy in passing through the cattleyard will crack the cattle over the back with a fork handle it they are caught standing in the driest parts of the yard when he wants to pass. The result is always the same-a yard of wild cows and ugly steers to be after ward "broken" by fear and a goad. Feed roots to all classes of stock, particularly to those which may be breeding, and by this means counteract the ten dency to constipation.

POTATOES.—Keep seed pota toes in the coolest part of the cellar, secure from frost. Examine others, removing decayed ones, and rubbing off the sprout that will start if they be kept warm.

Roots are a substitute for green feed, which no good farm er ought to be without. Sort over all kinds, separating the soundest to keep latest into the spring. Feed the partially decayed and wilted at once. Be careful not to feed decayed turnips, rutabagas, or cabbages to milch cows—the milk will taste. Cook before feeding, all that are not entirely fresh and sound.

Tools.—It is not well to wait until tools are needed, before supplying deficiencies. Buy only the best. Get the lightest, is equally efficient. A few ounces weight in a spade, fork, or other tool, make a great difference in the comfort of using it. Make all needed repairs in advance.

POULTRY,—Examine carefully for vermin; grease, or better. whitewash the roosts. Clean out the nests, put in fresh straw, and whitewash the poultryhouse. Full Moon, 1st day, 7h. 40m., morning, W.N.W. Horses.—Bad roads and cold winds are very trying to horses. Give them good rubbing down after labor, and blanket carefully, if, exposed to currents of air. Feed in proportion to labor. Strong muscles come from the grain bin.

Cows coming in should be kept in wide stalls or loose boxes, well littered, fed some roots if possible, and closely watchd and perhaps assisted at calving. Vermin are apt to appear at this season, especially on young cattle. Use the card and brush freely, and apply unguentum mixed with 4 or 5 times its bulk of lard, behind the horns and down the spine—a sure cure.

Hous.—Keep store hogs at work in the manure heap, and in working over the litter collected in cleaning up the yards and about the buildings. Breeding sows should have regular feeds of roots of some sort, even a very few raw potatoes will have an excellent effect. Saws are rarely cross, and never eat their young, if they are in good health, and at this season nothing promotes their health more than raw roots, sods of grass roots, or other moist food.

Tools.—Repair broken implements, get duplicates of parts liable to break in ordinary usage—plow-points or shares, cultivator and harrow teeth, whiffletrees, and the like.

STARTING EARLY POTATOES. A crop of potatoes ready for the table early in June, may be secured without great trouble. If seed potatoes are brought into a warm room about the first of March, the eyes will start rapidly, the nourishment in the tubers will sustain them for two or three weeks, by which time they may usually be planted out in some favorable spot. Of course care must be taken in planting out not to break the sprouts. Or the tubers may be planted in a hot-bed of moderate temperature, about the middle of the month. Cut them in halves, lay them flat side down, as thick as they can be placed, and cover with about two inches of earth.

THE season for grafting is approaching. There is no kind of labor which brings a richer return than a few hours spent in grafting. There is no difficulty now in procuring scions of the most approved varieties, gratis, or at a rate merely no-The best scions for apple minal. trees, are obtained from the last year's growth, on the points of bearing limbs. The scions may be cut any time during March, and placed in a cellar with the butts upon the ground where the air will not strike them. ters.

Grafting wax may be made in the proportion of 24 lbs. rosin, 1 lb. tallow, and 4 lb. beeswax, melted together and poured into a tub of water. If it should be too sticky, more beeswax may be used. Probably the best time for grafting apple trees is from the 15th of April to the 10th of May. If the grafting is to be done in May, the scions should be cut earlier in the season. The best mode for preserving scions is to fill a large box with fine pulverized moss, or still better, with moist saw-dust, in which the grafts are simply immersed, and which are thus packed away or withdrawn with the greatest ease at any desired moment. A box of saw-dust, in a cool cellar, will remain moist without watering for many weeks.

CARROTS .- For the farmer who feeds cows and horses, there is no crop more remunerative. It necessitates thoro' culture and enriching of the soil, and as a preventive of disease, and as excellent feed, it has no equal Sow Orange or Altringham early, in good, deep, clean soil.

Onions .- When sown on new soil. sow mixed with carrot seed; both crops will mature; the on-ions first. The second and following crops on the same land improve.

POULTRY .- Set all kinds as early as good eggs can be obtained. Old butter or lard tubs are excellent for nests. chicks should be fed with bread soaked in milk at first; cooked Indian meal afterward. Water, green food, and some grain daily, with scraps of meat now and then, heaps of pounded oyster shells, bones and gravel, and a dusting box containing ashes, are essential to profitable keeping of hens in close quarLast Quarter, 7th day, 5h. 29m, evening, N.

Ar this season, work accumulates faster than it can be done, as a general rule. A week of rain puts every thing back, and then the sun and wind dry the soil and push forward vegetation so that many a farmer gets nervous and half sick, worrying over unavoidable delays. Any man who has two or three teams, and as many as four or five hands to keep employed, may well spare

himself much physical labor while he plans for the constant diligent employment of his men and teams.

CATTLE.—Give the pasture a good start before turning stock upon it. The grass makes roots and strengthens itself to endure the drouths of summer at this time, and a week's feed taken too soon now, is paid for by short pasturage, and likely enough many barren spots before September. Keep up the flow of milk by feeding roots if possible. "Spare the calves." The high prices of butter, cheese, milk, etc., will tempt many farmers to "deacon" their calves, to the detriment of the herd and to their own sorrow two years hence. Get them as soon as possible accustomed to do without milk, or take only skimmed milk. Calves should have access to a variety of feed; sweet hay, clover, oat and pea straw are a good variety, and a few cats will be relished. before grass starts.

BARN-YARDS ought to be so drained that all the wash may be saved, not by leading it out upon some piece of grass, but so that the liquid may be used for wetting the manure heap, or for watering the vegetables of the garden, or for distribution by means of some sort of wateringcask, over grass, grain, or root crops in the field. Strong fences, clean sheds, and tidy tool houses ought to surround the barn-yard. and every preparation should be made for making and saving manure in the very best condition for use.

Bones should never be wasted on a farm or by any one having even a square-rod garden-spot. Throw them into heaps with a mixture of horse manure. 4

Butter .- June butter is commonly the best of the year. The grass is fresh and sweet; the weather is not so hot that butter the flow o' milk is larger then at and hoeing,

any other period, so that butter may ordinarily be made in larger quantities, and better. Milk should not be disturbed at all after it is set, until it is skimmed. It should be kept at a temperature not lower than 55° F., and not higher than 60°. Though, without a cool, spring dairy room, this is seldem practicable. The cream ought to be kept as cool as possible and thoroughly stirred every time any new cream is added. Scrupulous cleanliness, the use of tin or earthen pans scalded daily and most thoroughly, good ventilation and perfect freedom of the air from any odors of cooking, putrefaction, or any thing else, but clover blossoms, or new mown hay, churning at the lowest natural temperature, never touching the batter with the hands, working out the buttermilk very thoroughly, and salting moderately, will secure butter of an excellent quality, which if well packed will keep the year round. Scald new Erkins or tubs with buttermilk, and subsequently with strong brine.

Cubbages - At the time of setting out, dip the roots in strong brine to kill the white worms The application also benefits the plant. Delay setting out the main crop until next month, and then if possible put them upon new ground.

Minure making should commence in earnest, and all vegetable and animal matter not valuable for other purposes should find its way to the compost, or dung heap. Look out for dead animals.

Potatoes .- Frequent stirring of the soil is very beneficial, so also are top dressing of ashes, making is interfered with, and plaster, etc., at the first or sec-

Cabbages. - There are few surer and more profitable crops on new land. Unfortunately this plant has so many enemies in old ground that its culture is often uncertain and attended reclaimed swamp ground or on plants if too crowded.

land recently cleared, or in soil which has been exposed to a good heat by burning brush or bogs, it is sure and remunera tive. It is not too late to sow for transplanting.

Clover Seed .- Give the cleanest part of a clover field a topdressing of ashes and plaster. (and a little fine manure from the barn yard or compost heap will do no harm.) This will give the clover a good start and vigorous growth, so that it will blossom and go to seed before the grass and weeds show their heads above it. The more rampant weeds may be pulled, or cut with the "spud" (a chisel on a long handle), if necessary. If headed at the proper time it will furnish clean and heavy

Hedge-rows and fence corners those nurseries for weeds, ever encroaching on the tilled land, should be kept clean with the hook and scythe. Sheep, when they can be used, make very clean work at exterminating brush.

Manure. - The hog-pens and compost heaps should receive every thing that will decay. The fermentation in compost heaps may need quickening by a few pailfuls of manure liquor. In hot weather manure makes very fast, and dead animals and all such things rapidly form an excellent compost with muck, sods, etc. Use plaster to prevent the loss of ammonia, sprinkling it over manure while it is in active fermentation, and upon stable floors, etc.

Weeds .- Watch against their going to seed. Smother those which cutting and plowing will not kill by spreading a coating of litter over them.

Cattle .- It is important to keep all kinds of cattle in good flesh; if they lose fat at this season it will be hard to regain it so that they will begin the winter in good condition. Give salt, and look to the water in the pastures, that stock have good water.

Fallows are relics of the agriculture of a former generation. and fast becoming obsolete as they ought to be. The best fallowing decent land can have, is a crop of roots. No man ought to take from land more than be gives to it. The whole object of the fallow is to enable men to skin the land more effectually. Let no land that is good for anything lie idle. If it needs fallowing, put on turnips in drills and plow and hoe them; or plow in growing buck wheat.

Fences .- Do not let them harbor weeds; dispense with every rod of fence possible, but maintain those that must stand, in good order.

Grass - August is probably the best month in the year for manuring grass lands. Apply fine manure of any kind, soon after mowing.

Hay .- Push forward the bay ing with all dispatch, for the grass is generally injured by delay.

Horses -Let them stand, when not in use, in dark but niry stables during the day, and turn them into the pasture at night. This will be grateful to them. and they will keep in much better condition, and secure freedom from bots.

Shrep .- Tar the noses of all to repel the fly. Separate the rams from the ewes; wean the lambs and give them a good chance by themselves if possible. Keep ewes that have lambs unfit to wean with the lambs, and in small flocks let the yearlings run with them. After taking a ewe from her lamb, examine her udder, and milk her if there is any danger of caked bag.

Poultry. - Allow them the range of the grain fields after harvest. Those of sufficient age not only to have it there, but will fatten as readily now as later, and bring better prices.

September, standing betwixt the summer and the autumn, unites in itself the characters of the two seasons. Dry and swelt ering heats of the first week or two, give place to storms and blustering winds, often accom-panied by frost. It is a month of care and anxiety to the farmer; success or failure are so evenly balanced that his good judgment and activity are often sorely tested to secure the harvests upon which his labor has been expended, and at the same time to make the ground ready for next year's crops. A Northern September epitomizes the year-seed time and harvest. summer and winter, often crowded into 30 days. Day and night are evenly balanced in the course of this month, so, with a pardon. able fertility of imagination the Ancients saw a pair of weighing scales among the stars, and called the constellation, and sign of the zodiac in which the sun measures equal hours of darkness and light. Libra.

Eggs.-If eggs can not be marketed fresh and well, pack them for winter food, dipping the fresh eggs in melted tallow and packing them in dry chaff or sawdust, the ends up, and in boxes so that they may be in. verted occasionally.

Manure and Muck .- Before the rains fill the swamps, make sure of a good stock of muck for mixing with dung in winter. Gather diligently all poultry droppings, the deposits from house drains, scraps of woolen cloth, hair and leather, bones, and every thing that will decay to add value to the compost heap.

Weeds .- Burn all that have gone to seed, and add the rest to a compost heap, quickened with lime, horse dung, or the like.

But few days will now intervene before the 'Advance Guard' of stern Winter will make a de-

fearful 'havoc' among the stores of those unprepared for the 'raid.' Farmers must marshal their forces at once and exercise a watchful care against this invader. They must volunteer their efforts, and not wait to be driven or 'drafted' into the contest. Remissness is sure to lead to defeat. 'A penny saved is worth two earned,' and no season of the year affords the farmer a better opportunity to reap the benefit of this great truth than the early portion of the month of October. Root crops must be gathered and marketed or securely stored; buildings must be erected, repaired and put in a good state of preservation; implements must be housed for a season of rest, and cleaned, painted and oiled to preserve them from decay and rust; stock must have extra feed to prevent loss of flesh, etc., etc.

Forest leaves are excellent for absorbing liquid manure and for mulching. Gather them freely when available.

GRAIN. - Thrashing, cleaning, storing and marketing must be attended to. Do the cleaning thoroughly. An extra winnow. ing may greatly increase the market value.

Hogs may be made to answer purposes, manufacturing manure for the garden, and supplying pork for the table. Give them muck, sods, leaves, straw, etc., for the former, and good cooked food and clean water for the latter. It pays well to give frequent scrubbings to ensure cleanliness and thrifty growth.

Schools. - See that schoolhouses are in good order, and use all proper efforts to secure good teachers, and a full attendance. A good teacher is cheap scent upon us, and Col. Frost at any price; a poor one is dear and his Snow Brigade will make even if he works for nothing.

ANIMALS. - Keep them always improving; twice or thrice as ing snows. to bring up an animal fallen off day in Spring and ready to plant.

in flesh, as will be needed to keep them in good condition; a single exposure to a cold storm is as likely to involve influenza, and general debility in a farm animal, as in the owner himself. Comfort for the animal is money in the purse of the proprietor.

BARNS AND STABLES. - Stop the rain leaks in the roof, and the cold air leaks around the stalls. That clapboard is loose or gone. That great crack under the door lets in cold, and the horse or cow must have more fuel (food) for the fire within the body to counteract the cold draft without. Pure air is essential. but let it not come in chilling currents upon man or beast. With ventilators above for the escape of bad air, there will generally be enough good air stealing in almost insensibly through the seams and crevices; if not, admit it from some point where it will not blow directly upon any human or other animal Light is as essential to animals as to vegetables; potatoe vines in the dark cellar are no more bleached and injured than the animal kept in a dark stable.

IMPLEMENTS .- The thrifty man will not only know where they are, but see that they are never exposed to rusting or rotting by dews and rains. As a rule, tools are depreciated more by exposure than by wear. A hint to set the readers to thinking on the subject is all we have room for here.

Plowing in Autumn is highly beneficial. The new soil turned up (and some should be every year), is ameliorated by frosts. The herbage turned under is saved; on the surface much of it would be lost in decay, or washed away by rain and melting snows. Rude Winter is upon us, with all his frosts and storms. complete change has come over the aspects of the earth and sky, and a change almost as great over our feelings. 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
