The latest dates from England are by the Great Western, at New York, by the 28th of April, four days later than the last mail steamer. The Britannia, with the second April mail, has probably reached Halifax by this time, and the news by her may be expected this week.

His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke, our new Lieutenant Governor, took the oath of office, and assumed the administration of the Government of this Province on Tuesday last.

Our late Lieut. Governor, Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, Lady Harvey, Family and Suite, arrived in this City from Head Quarters last evening, in the steamer Frederick, and took lodgings at the St. John Hotel. His Excellency held a levee at 2 o'clock this day, which was very numerously attended.

At a meeting of the Stockholders of the Bank of New-Brunswick, held yesterday, the following Gentlemen were duly elected Directors for the ensuing year: Dr. John Boyd, Hon. H. Johnston, L. H. Devoe, Geo. Swinney, R. F. Hazen, Nehemiah Merritt, Thomas Leavitt, C. C. Stewart.

At a meeting of the Directors this morning, Thomas Leavitt, Esq., was unanimously re-elected President for the ensuing year. The weather still continues wet, cold, and disagreeable, with the mud ankle deep in some of the streets. Accounts of similar kind of weather come to us from other districts of the Province, Canada, &c. This morning the sun shone out an hour or two, but has again disappeared.

CITY OF HALIFAX.—The first election of Common Councilmen for the City of Halifax, under the new Charter, is to take place on Monday, the 10th instant. It is expected that there will be much competition for the Civic honours of the new City.

It is stated that the Governor-General does not intend to make Kingston his permanent residence, but will return to Montreal as soon as the business of the approaching legislative session is finished.

Steam ship Columbia.—The Boston Transcript of last Saturday evening says—"The steamship Columbia, Capt. Judkins, will 'pull off' this afternoon, for Halifax, for Halifax and Liverpool. She will be accompanied by the schooner, and will have all the other berths in the ship engaged, and reserved for passengers who will embark at Halifax. Her mail bags contain about six thousand letters, and five large bags full of newspapers."

The Unicorn is to leave Halifax for Quebec direct, on the arrival of the Steamer Britannia from Liverpool. She will be accompanied by the schooner, and will resume her regular trips between Pictou and Quebec for the season.

The Great Western encountered very severe weather, and fell in with large banks of ice, which she was obliged to break through, and at 9:30 ran into a field of ice extending as far as the eye could reach; at 10:15 she struck one of her masts, which was broken, and at 11:00 she was completely surrounded by ice.

Among the passengers in the Great Western from British North America, were Mr. James Leavitt, Esq., and a party of friends; also, Professor Wayland, Mr. Sigourney, and others, 44 in all. The steamship President had not arrived at Liverpool, out of New York, Green's Island, and was expected on her safety, and Insurances had been effected on her as high as 20 and 25 per cent.
