ERZBERGER'S SUDDEN SHIFT

Had Been a Constant Defender of German Government's Policies Mrs. C. Lawrence, of Boston, and by two brothers, S. Clerke, of Butte, Montana, and H. Clerke, of Philadelphia.

It is one of the significant events in recent German politics, says the New York Times, that two of the conspicuous German leaders who attended the Stockholm conference supposedly as representatives, in part at least, of the Berlin government, have since their return to the Fatherland, taken a stand against the policy of Bethmann Hollweg in refusing to make known his peace terms to the world. These two are Philipp Scheidemann, leader of the Socialist majority, and Matthias Erzeberger, one of the leading members of the Centrist party.

Erzeberger, who by his severe criticism of the government's course and for a no-annexation peace and parliamentary reform, raised such a storm in the Reichstag main committee, is forty-two years of age, and is regarded as one of the most fiery speakers in the German parliament. He became a member of the Reichstag as a Social Democrat in 1897. Later he became one of the leaders of the Centrist (Catholic) party, forming one of the principal bonds of union between it and his old party.

Until the trip to Stockholm, Erzeberger stood in the front rank of defenders, of the government, von Hindenburg, and von Tirpitz. On Jan. 18, 1917, he gave an interview to the Overseas News Agency on the Entente's reply to president Wilson's note, asking the belligerent chancelleries for information in regard to aims in the war. In this Erzeberger asserted that the Entente wanted to reorganize Europe on principles which they themselves did not consider—race and nationallty—while "the unprovoked attack of the Entente had welded Germany into a unit both politically and nationally."
