INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 27.—Time's relentless hand has left only the broken, rust eaten frame of the first gasoline driven vehicle which now lies in the basement of an Indianapolis business house.

and carriage maker, lost the honor that went to another Hoosier, Elwood Haynes, because his application for

patents on his engine were denied. Black sought patent papers in 1891, two weeks after the Otto Gas Engine Company of Mannheim, Germany, filed for American protection of a gas engine.

RAN TWENTY YEARS. Black was offered patents on his differential gear and floating rear axle, but disgusted, he refused them. He lived to see both become universal equipment.

Black began operating a forge and wagon plant in Indianapolis in 1865. Late in the 80's he became interested in gasoline engine propulsion of vehicles. He eventually perfected an engine which he attached to a type of carriage, known as a runabout. He drove it more than twenty years. Several years ago it was stored in the business house basement by an owner who never reclaimed it.

Two years after Black's failure, Elwood Haynes, of Kokomo, an oil operator, who had perfected an automobile in the wagon works of Elmer Apperson, secured patents on his machine. It is today in the Smithsonian Institute at Washington labeled, "First gasoline automobile."

Others followed. Indians became the cradle of the automobile industry through the activities of Haynes and Apperson, and now only Michigan and Wisconsin produce

more cars than the Hoosier state. However, few of the early well known Indiana made cars now are in the market. The Cole, National and Pathfinder no longer are made. The Premier factory makes only cabs. Stutz is out of control of the Stutz plant, and since retiring from that concern, has made the H. C. S.

The Monroes, Lafayette and Maxwell, all Indiana made cars, aren't manufactured now. In place of these pioneers in the automotive field are the Marmon, Stutz and Deussenberg, of Indianapolis; the Studebaker at South Bend; the Elcar at Elkhart; the Davis at Richmond; the Chrysler at New Castle; the Auburn at Auburn, and the Lexington at Connersville.

It is not known at present exactly when the new Governor-General, Lord Willingdon, will arrive in Canada. It is customary that the departing Governor and his successor pass each other in mid-sea.

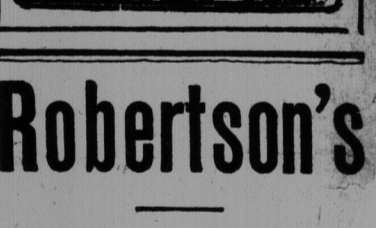

THE HARBOR—WHAT NEXT?

The proper equipment of the port of Saint John has been discussed in general terms by several candidates during the present campaign. It has been the subject of much discussion in civic circles, by the Board of Trade, and by other organizations interested in giving Saint John its rightful place in the sum.

Unless we are to suffer grave injustice we shall secure in the near future a much larger portion of both export and import traffic as a result of the work of the Railway Commission, of the Duncan Commission, and through the action of the next incoming Federal Government.

Quebec, through the complaisance of both political parties, has steadily neglected to pay interest on the money borrowed by its harbor commission to expand its port facilities.

It is natural Atlantic winter port of Canada, and, under proper conditions, all-Canadian transportation, its geographical position would give it a lull of traffic many times in excess of the present one.

The port of Halifax has been nationalized in the sense that the great terminals there were constructed in connection with the Canadian National Railways, and the interest and sinking fund charges due to their cost are not paid out of harbor dues but are absorbed by the transportation company.

Invitations suggested. The Saint John Exhibition will open a week hence. What have you, as a citizen, done to date to make a success of that exhibition? What schemes have you to help things along?

position the Exhibition Association has doubtless done all it can to ensure success. Exhibitors again may be relied on to put forth their best efforts. The Press is not neglectful of the subject as will soon be seen. The merchants and manufacturers of Saint John will most assuredly capitalize this opportunity. But there yet remains what is vaguely called the general public which may have no direct and personal interest involved, yet are no less concerned than those already mentioned.

Last week we attempted to suggest that the assumption of the holiday spirit might go a long way to help the fair along. Of course that is not the beginning and the end of the need. There is the question of inviting out-of-town friends. What can you do about it?

Perhaps you have a spare room. What about filling it? It may be that you are living out at Westfield or Rosethay or Duck Cove or anywhere else and have an empty house or flat in Saint John; have you no friends in Moncton, Fredericton, Newcastle or Vancouver who could be induced to occupy it for exhibition week?

Attention Motorists

SECTION 5 SUB-SECTION (a) OF THE MOTOR VEHICLE LAW STATES: It shall be unlawful to carry on a motor vehicle any lighting device of over twenty-one candle power, equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed, deflected or arranged that no portion of the parallel beam of reflected light when measured seventy-five feet or more ahead of the lamp shall rise above 42 inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands.

SECTION 5 SUB-SECTION (b) STATES: On and after the coming into force of this Act no spot light shall be used unless the same is placed on the right side of the motor vehicle and such spot light shall be so attached as to, at all times, throw its glare towards the right side of the road. The throwing of the glare of the spot light towards the centre of the road or to the left of the driver, so as to interfere with an oncoming vehicle, shall be deemed an offence under this Act and the person guilty thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars.

SECTION 5 SUB-SECTION (c) STATES: The number plate on the front shall be as far forward and as high from the ground as may be necessary to render it distinctly visible, and the number plate on the back shall be so placed that the lower edge thereof shall be not lower than the body of the motor vehicle; provided that this subsection, so far as it relates to the position of the number plate on the back shall not apply to motor trucks or other motor vehicles for the delivery of goods.

Advice to Two Girls of 17 Concerning Their Love Affairs—General Questions Answered on Women in the Business World—Should the Girl Whose Health Has Failed Break Engagement?

DEAR MISS DIX—We are two girls 17 years of age who have been going with two boys who are near our age. Our parents and their friends had us about "puppy love," but isn't it possible for puppy love to grow into real love? Shall we go together for two more years till we finish high school and have one year at college, then marry these boys and live happily ever after?

Do you think it would be good policy for our parents to separate us from these boys, but let us correspond with each other and be together when we come home? TWO GIRLS.

ANSWER: Your letter indicates that you are two sensible, thoughtful girls, and so I take it for granted that you will not do such an impulsive thing as to get married at your tender age. This being the case, both you and your parents can sit back calmly and let nature take its course.

The majority of such youthful romances end in nothing. The love affair just peters imperceptibly out. One or the other outgrows the other one. Romeo gets tired of Juliet or Juliet grows weary of Romeo. Some new peach of a girl crosses the trail or a dashing sheik with a good line dawns on the scene and pouf! the fire is out and no harm done to anybody.

That is the way puppy love usually ends, and it is why parents are foolish to take it seriously and by their opposition make girls and boys get their backs up and just to show that they will not be bossed and that they are grown-up run off and get married.

For that is the tragedy of puppy love, my dear, it so often makes immature girls and boys, who are not ready for marriage in body or mind or purse, prematurely into matrimony. Then it is late because they almost invariably find when they grow up that they are tired of matrimony with its burdens and responsibilities. Worst of all, they are almost sure to come across the men and women who are their real mates and with whom they fall in love when it is too late.

Of course, there are exceptions to every rule, and now and then a boy and girl love affair does endure and the men and women who made mud pies together get married and set up housekeeping and make real pies. Such marriages are happy and comfortable when they do occur. So there is no reason why you and your boy friend shouldn't pal along together and wait developments.

But my earnest advice to you is not to let these boys monopolize you too much. Before you tie up for keeps with any man take a look-see around and observe a number of men so as to be sure you are getting the best of the lot. Resist also that boys have a way of changing, and that by the time these young chaps come back from college their tastes in girls may be entirely different from what it is now.

I think it would be an excellent thing for your parents to send you away and separate you from the boys, because that would give all four of you a chance to test your sentiments.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—Will you please answer these questions? Why do business men employ married women and girls who do not need to work in preference to women who have to support themselves? Why do women in business work against each other? Why can't there be a law made to force women to give up working outside of their homes when they marry? Why is it that some people are more fortunate in business than others? CORINNE.

ANSWER: The answer to most of your questions is—they don't. Certainly, business men do not prefer society flappers and well-off married women as employees to poor girls who need to earn their own bread and butter.

On the contrary, other things being equal, the business man would rather give the job to the woman who needs it because every man in the world honors and respects and desires to help the woman who is bravely trying to make an honest living.

But, after all, business is business and not philanthropy, and a shop or an office is not an asylum for needy females. A business man wants the best service that he can get, and when he hires a married woman or the girl who doesn't need to work you may be very sure that she has proved that she has some special talent and ability.

Besides, because a woman is married is no indication in these days of the high cost of living that she doesn't need to earn money just as much as she did when she was single. Furthermore, there is no more reason why a married man should be deterred from gainful occupations than why a married woman should be. The working world is free to every one, and all of us, male or female, married or single, have a right to do our bit in it and collect our pay for it.

Nor do women in business work against each other any more than men in business work against each other. There is always bound to be rivalry and competition, and numbers of women are going to aspire to the good places and the fat pay envelopes, but that is all legitimate and fair. As for your accusation that women work against each other, that is absolutely false.

On the contrary, I have always been amazed at the way women help each other, at the patience with which the old-timers will help the newcomers in any line of business, teaching them their work "putting them next" as the saying goes. And I have marveled at the way every working woman keeps tab on the jobs in her own place and tries to pass one on to a sister woman.

As to why some people are more fortunate in business than others, many answers might be given. One is that financial genius is just as much a special talent as a gift for writing or singing or acting. Some people have it. Others never acquire it. The general reason, though, why some people succeed in business and others do not is because some are willing to do more work than others. They put more heart and brain and backbone into their jobs.

Don't let yourself get morbid, Corinne. Don't cherish the illusion that the world is down on you and that you are a poor, unjustly treated creature. No employer wants that kind of a woman about him. Cheer up and do good work and you won't have to worry about whether other women competitors are married or single. DOROTHY DIX

ANSWER: If you are sure that you are going to be a hopeless invalid, it is certainly your duty to let the young man go, or, at least, give him a chance to retire gracefully from the scene.

A wife who is always sick, who is nervous and self-centred, as sick people always are, who can perform none of the duties of a wife and whose husband's earnings must go for doctors and sanatoriums, is certainly a handicap to any man, and no honorable woman would foist this upon one without his knowing just exactly what he was letting himself in for.

But do not be unduly despairing. Because one's health breaks down and one is temporarily put out of the matrimonial running is no indication that one is barred forever. Science and intelligent care will work miracles, and some of the strongest and healthiest people one knows today were invalids in their youth.

Breakfast: Ripe Pears, Prepared Cereal with Top Milk, Poached Eggs, Toast, Coffee. Luncheon: Juiced Veal Salad, Hot Rolls or Biscuit, Stewed Parsnips, Milk. Dinner: Baked Salmon, Baked Potatoes, Cucumber Salad, Lemon Rice Pudding, Tea or Coffee. TODAY'S RECIPES: Juiced Veal Salad—Dice one tablespoon gelatine in two tablespoons of cold water and stir into one cup of veal stock seasoned to taste and heated to boiling point. When it begins to thicken stir in three tablespoons of mayonnaise dressing. Add a cup of chopped veal and a cup of cold boiled peas. Pour into a mold, chill, then serve on lettuce. Serve with potato chips if an entire cold meal is wanted, or with creamed potatoes if a hot dish is wanted.

Stewed Pears—Peel and halve pears, taking out the core. Make syrup of one-third cup sugar to one cup water. Drop halved pears in with a little cinnamon or sliced lemon and a clove or two stuck into some of the pears. Cook until tender but not until they drop to pieces.

Baked Salmon—One can salmon pickled to pieces and bones removed. Put in a baking dish with layers of bread crumbs, butter, salt and pepper and salmon alternately. Add one-half cup of milk. Bake thirty minutes.

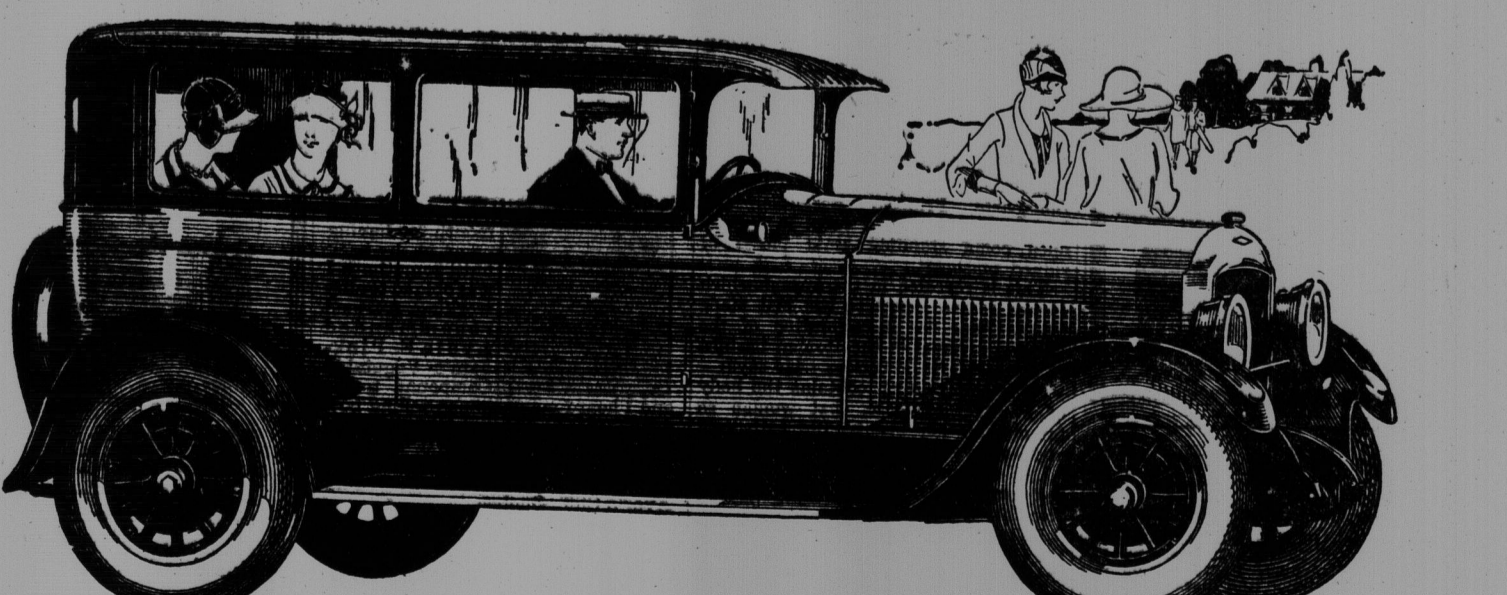

LONDON, Aug. 26.—London's one-armed artist—a girl who sits all day on the pavement in Regent street and Oxford street, earning a meagre livelihood by painting postcards—is beaten by Yoneko Yamaguchi.

As her name implies, she is a Japanese girl, 37 years of age. Twenty-two years ago, her father, in a fit of insanity, killed five of his six children and cut off Yoneko's arms.

She paints on the obi—the gorgeous silk sashes that form a part of every Japanese woman's dress, and so clever are some of her paintings that sums varying from £15 to £100 are paid for the sketches.

Yoneko does her painting on a table. The ash, or other fabric upon which she is to paint, is stretched in front of her, and an assistant stands at her side mixing colors. She takes the brushes from a tray with never a mistake, and with quick, masterful strokes sketches her subject.

She was only 18 when her dreadful handicap was imposed.

MILK REGULATIONS BEFORE MEETING

Suggestion to be Given Consideration at Special Health Board Session

The sub-District Board of Health is to give reconsideration to the milk regulations now in force in the city at a special meeting to be held on Monday, it was announced yesterday following a conference with the government at which John Kelly, chairman of the board; Dr. William Warwick, district medical health officer; milk dealers from the parish of Simonds, and E. P. Raymond were present.

Premier Baxter said after the conference that the belief was expressed that it would be possible to overcome all difficulties which had been raised and find a working basis to enable those who desired to purchase raw milk to get it under conditions which would ensure its purity and at a price that would not make it unduly burdensome.

At the conference there was a general discussion of the regulations now in effect with regard to the sale of pasteurized milk and raw milk. The Premier stated that many practical suggestions had been made at the meeting and these suggestions will be given careful consideration at the special meeting of the sub-District Board of Health.

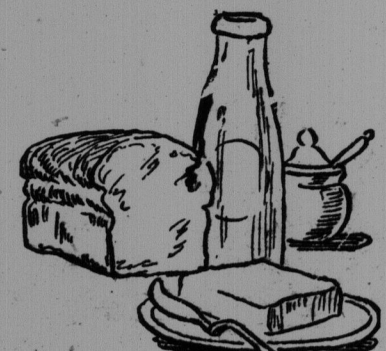

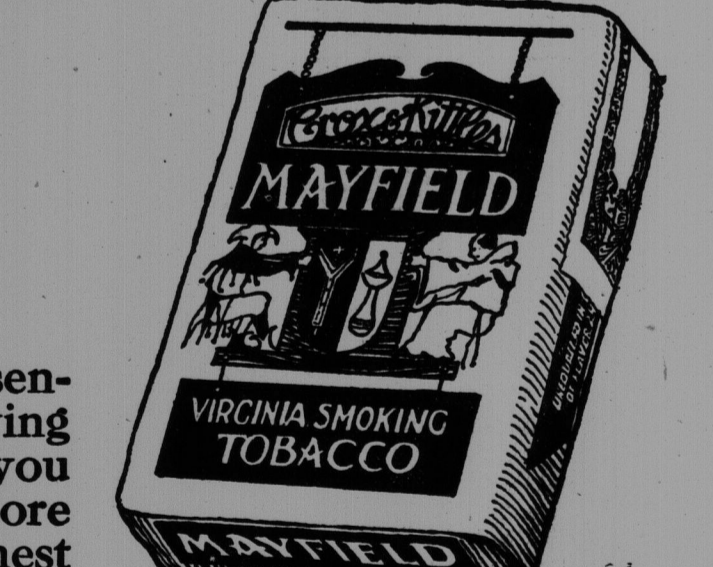

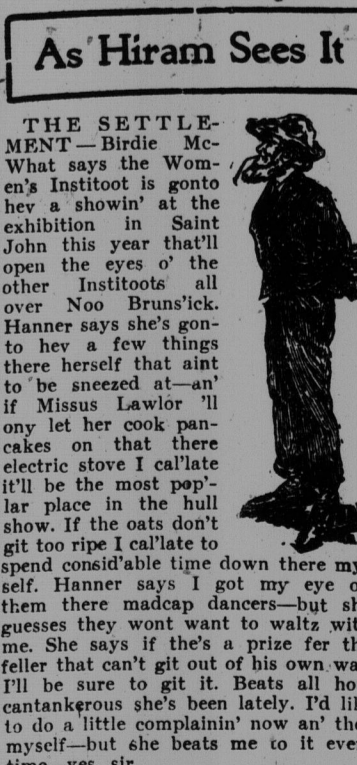
Automobile Cuts Capers in Prince Street This Morning With Woman Driver
