National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics by which can be recorded what an airplane pilot does and how the airplane responds. Three special instruments have been perfected to record the speed of the airplane in the air, the laedings or changes in weight on the wings and the movement of the controls. PLANS BIG TAX ON

Toronto, May 11-A new tax of \$15,one a year upon every liquor export company is announced in a resolution which has been placed upon the legislative order paper today by Peter Smith, provincial treasurer. The five per cent tax upon wagers at race tracks will also not merely apply to the winning tickets, as originally forecasted, but to all bets made on the pari mutuel machines. This is provided in a further clause of the resolution.

Yet another clause reads:
"Every company, owning, operating or using a telephone line or part thereof in Ontario for gain and having paid up capital of \$100,000 or over, shall pay a tax of one quarter of one per cent upon the paid up capital thereof."

This amends the corporation tax by striking out the figures "\$20,000" and the substitution of \$100,000. 000 a year upon every liquor export





In each country there were those who cheered for war when first it came, and there was throughout the country a loyal and generous response to the calls of the government for the sacrifices necessary to make the war effective.

The burden of the heavy war taxes, conscription and the blunders and waste that are inseparable from the creation in a hurry of a huge military force wearled the people, even while they made no loud complaint; and though success was gained in the fields of struggle, those whose directing efforts had made him a favored candidate in two national contests; and his party was everywhere beaten in the country. Of 485 congressional districts, the Republicans won in 301. The conditions that made such a result possible were not permanent, however,; and the fact is recognized by all.

Republicans whose heads are strong enough to control their party sympathies admit that in the next House of Representatives they will be less powerful than they are in that now existing, which was elected when Mr. Harding won the presidency. 

### WEW YORK'S PAYROLL \$75,000,000 A WEEK

But Employers Fail to Increase Payments by Check to Foil Robbers — Hylan's Appeal Unheeded.

New York's payroll is about \$75,000,1 000 a week, according to estimates furvished by Louis I. Dublin, statistician of e Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., and ere has been no recent tendency, as are as bank's report, to pay it in checks rather than cash, in spite of losses by

hold-ups.

Mayor Hylan's recent appeal to employers to pay by check instead of cash, so as to baffle payroll robbers, has had no appreciable effect, according to statements on behalf of the Chatham and 'henix and the Emigrant Industrial Saverna Back. This precaution has not been taken for a variety of reasons, it is said, in spite of the fact that losses from hold-ups, burglaries and larcenies in the last twelve months have caused a net loss to surety companies on their year's business.

In calculating the payroll of the people of New York City, which is far greater than that of any other city in the world, Mr. Dublin said:

"There are approximately 2,500,000 wage earners in this city. These include all occupied males and females. My best estimate is that the annual salary for those employed in New York city is about \$1,500, or approximately \$80 a week. We have for 1919 the results of the census of manufacturers, showing an average salary of \$1,264 a year, or \$24 per week, which is for all manufacturing industries in New York City, and includes both salaries and wages. I am inclined to think that the higher salaries which prevail in commerce than in manufacture will raise the average to the figure that I suggest. agure that I suggest.

Total \$75,000,000,000 a Week "On this basis of 2,00,000 the \$80 average per week means a total of \$75,000,rage per week means a total of \$10,000,000 as the weekly payroll of New York city. This is subject to correction, because of the difficulty in the lack of authentic data on the subject of salaries for persons in various types of employ-


