FIRST EDITION. KILLED BY MISTAKE. A MURDERER KILLS ANOTHER MAN'S WIFE INSTEAD OF HIS OWN.

Italian Are Leaving New Orleans Because of Cholera. A Rescued Crew Brought to New York.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 22.—Mrs. August Melin, the young wife of a railroad laborer, was shot and killed by Isaac Weiss on the street last evening. Weiss then placed the revolver in his mouth and blew his brains out. He came recently from Detroit and his wife joined him in a few days, but they quarrelled and separated yesterday. It is supposed that Weiss mistook Mrs. Melin for his wife, as a note that was found in his pocket indicates he intended to kill his wife and then commit suicide.

Specialist Interviews Held. All the Woodstock Herald.

By Telegram to the Gazette. Ottawa, Oct. 22.—J. F. Watson, M. A. who is of the Department of State, who has devoted some study to the mental sciences, has returned home after an interview with Birchall in Woodstock.

FRENCH BROTHERHOOD CONVENTION. The Oath of Secrecy Abolished and the Meetings Open to the Public.

New York, Oct. 22.—The biennial convention of the French brotherhood, which has been in session since the morning of the 18th inst., has just adjourned.

The most important action of the convention was the abolition of the oath of secrecy of the brotherhood. Hereafter the members of the brotherhood will be free to attend all meetings.

The secretary of the brotherhood said the minutes of the secrecy clause in the constitution by men with military and naval professions was adopted two years ago. A resolution was adopted to the effect that the brotherhood should be held in readiness to assist the United States in the event of a foreign war.

TWO TRAINS MET. Five Trains Met and Three in Collision.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 22.—A disastrous collision occurred early this morning on the Cincinnati southern railway in a tunnel a quarter of a mile north of Chicago. The collision was between a passenger train and a freight train.

The passenger train was carrying a full complement of passengers and a north-bound freight train.

The collision resulted in the death of a man and the injury of several others.

The cause of the collision is being investigated.

The railway company is expected to pay compensation to the injured parties.

TALE OF THE FORTUNES. One Guy Got a Gold Mine by Chance. A Spirit Helped the Other.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—The writer of fiction has told to the world an extravagant tale that connected with the personal history of Mr. James Treaswell, the quicksilver millionaire of California. Twenty-five or thirty years ago the Treaswell brothers, John and James, left their place in the State of California, and came to the far West, California was their goal, and it was the goal of another New Brunswicker to acquire the mine.

John found his wealth among the gold fields of distant and forbidding Alaska. Going thither on a prospecting party, he fell in with the owner of a gold claim, who was willing to sell out for more than the price he asked.
