FIRST EDITION. HURLED TO DEATH.

AN EXCURSION TRAIN CRASHED THROUGH A TREESIDE. Fifteen Persons Killed and Fifty-eight Injured.

CHARLOTTE, W. Va., July 5.—A most frightful accident occurred on the Kanawha & Michigan road, about seven miles from this city, about 10:30 o'clock yesterday morning.

The locality of the accident was a short but high trestle which spans a ravine about twenty feet deep.

The train, which was the regular passenger train from this city for Columbus, O., pulled out of the station at 10:15 after 10 o'clock, and consisted of an engine, a combination express and baggage car, and two passenger coaches.

The cars were well filled with excursionists intending to pass the holiday in the country, among them being the members of the local lodge of the United Order of American Mechanics.

On coming within sight of the trestle the engineer, according to the latest and most reliable reports from the scene, observed smoke arising from the trestle.

The engine crossed the trestle in safety, and so did the express car, but the forward passenger car, after passing the trestle and reaching the high approach upon the other side, left the rails and rolled down the steep bank.

As the two cars left the track it seemed as if the occupants united in one grand yell of despair and alarm.

When the body of Jasper Dougherty of New Martinsville, W. Va., was found it was without the head, which had been torn off by the lower jaw.

Several of the dead had their brains dashed out, others had many bones broken, and all were cut, torn and mangled in a shocking manner.


