"If the first demand triumphs, it is inevitable that social stagnation will result, that society will become per-manently stratified-one class owning and managing the earth, the other class doing the work, with the sole ambition of working and being fed.

"If the second demand triumphs, a thinking working class will see to it cial evolution is not impeded, that the interests of the laborers are served and that industry becomes more and more democratized to the end that mankind may be happier and healthier and more cultured.

"There is room for improvement in both the elementary and secondary schools of Toronto, and while we are making commendable efforts to add an efficient course in industrial education of a practical character, there much to be done along the lines of acquainting the pupils with the facts of industry, such as the evolutionary changes in the production and distribution of the necessities of life, how and by whom wealth is created and distributed, and in what way legislation would tend to pro-duce the best results for those who who do the world's work by rendering necessary useful service.'
