PELOPEE'S WEB, AND HOW THE THE PARSON WAS CAUGHT

A HUMOROUS STORY.

The Rev. Josiah Clutterbuck was senior curate of Blankington Parish church. He was also a widower with a family of five.

From a worldly point of view he had not been a success. In early youth great things had been predicted of him, not alone by dotting parents, but even by distinguished strangers. Later a distinguished university career had seemed to point the way to a bishopric at least; but somehow year had trod on the heels of year, and still at the ripe age of fifty, the Rev. Josiah Clutterbuck was only a curate at \$150 per annum.

Truth to tell, one thing had ever stood in the way of his advancement, and that was an almost morbid bashfulness. Bashfulness was his outstanding characteristic, and he was learned, he was hard working, he was pious, he was hundreds of other things; but above and beyond all else he was bashful. You could not get a minute in his company without making discovery of the fact; you could not be two without pitying him for it.

His outward man squared with his inward. He literally preached diffidence. He was tall and thin, with a thick crop of yellow, wavy hair, which he wore plastered down like butter on each side of his head. His nose was small, of that class which in a lady is called *retrousee*, in a man, "pig"—eyes of the palest blue, eyebrows hypothetical mouth deprecatory. His hands seemed always in his road, like those of a bad actor.

Among the Rev. Josiah Clutterbuck's many parochial duties was that of chaplain to certain Orphan Homes in the district. Now, the patron of these homes had recently died, and the Board of Management (of which the Rev. Josiah was *ex-officio* a member) had begun to select a successor. Many names were proposed, only to be rejected out of hand. Some were too young some too old. One wouldn't do because she was a Dissenter, another because she wore green ribbons in her hat, another because she had a red nose and smelled of cloves. At length when none of the candidates were found suitable, it was unanimously agreed, on the motion of Mr. Clutterbuck, to offer the situation to Miss Penelope Webb, Laburnum Cottage, Blankington, and the Rev. Josiah was himself deputed to sound her on the subject.

Miss Penelope Webb was a spinster of uncertain age—that is to say, she was nearer fifty than forty. The census return, indeed, gave her age as thirty-five, but she was obviously older. She was small of stature—what in a younger person would have been called *petite*—perky in manner, and chirpy in voice like a canary. She dressed unobtrusively in black, wore a white miter, lace in summer, wools in winter; had a great weakness for jet jewelry; like all orthodox old maids, kept a tom cat and a parrot.

This latter was an especial favorite with Miss Penelope. During the day it caged hung in the centre of the parlor window, and at night she marched it off in triumph to share the privacy of her room, enveloped in an anti-macassar. Great pains had been expended on its education, but after years of labor, the only two things it could be got to say were—"Miserable sinners" (presumably from the prayer-book) and "Folly" got her eyes on you. When once set agoing, it rattled these off like a runaway machine.

Though in all else a model of spinsterhood, Miss Penelope Webb had one amiable weakness; she said kept a soft corner in her heart for the opposite sex, and sooth to say, she was by no means abandoned hope of one day changing her condition. Her manner (with men) was more that of a schoolgirl in her teens than a maiden lady of forty-five. It was coquettish to a degree—bashful, blushing, almost kittenish; and she was always in danger of mistaking ordinary courtesies for tokens of affection. People said she had set her cap, of late, for that good man was in blaspheous ignorance thereof.

Such was Miss Penelope Webb, to whom the Rev. Josiah was commissioned to offer the matronship of the Orphan's Homes.

Pondering the matter deeply, the Rev. Josiah came to the conclusion that the mission was one of not a little delicacy. Miss Webb was a cut above the ordinary run of salaried servants. She had a small private income, which she eked out by fancy needlework and other marketable accomplishments, such as being independent spirit, it was doubtful in which light she would view the Board's unsolicited proposals. It was just possible she might resent them; so, before calling in person, Mr. Clutterbuck thought it wise to pre- pare for his visit by letter, and thus escape the awkward task of introducing so brittle a subject by word of mouth.

Now, one of the many ways in which the Rev. Josiah's bashfulness displayed itself was in a total inability to say a plain thing in a plain way. Like any ordinary mortal could express in a dozen

words, he needed as many sentences to arrive at; and even then it would be by no means certain that he had made himself understood—so remote was often the apparent connection between his words and his meanings. So to Miss Penelope Webb the following extraordinary, but very characteristic, effusion was sent:—

"Belthelium Villa, Blankington, 3rd Dec. 18—

"DEAR MISS WEBB,—I am doing myself the pleasure by calling upon you to-morrow afternoon, in order to confer with you upon a subject which lies very near my heart, which I feel sure, cannot but appeal to a lady of your known understanding and benevolence. The offer I hope then to have the honor of making you is of a somewhat personal and delicate character, and I therefore deem it wisest to prepare you for it beforehand, so that it may not take you wholly by surprise, as otherwise it is conceivable it might.

Her thoughts were very pleasant ones. She had long worshipped Josiah in secret, and now he had all but offered her his hand. For what else could his words mean? "A subject which lies very near my heart"—"the offer I trust then to have the honor of making you"—"keep the communication inviolably secret"—words which involuntarily secret—words which were cautious and reserved, but that was just the natural delicacy of the man.

"Yes," she said, half aloud, as she kissed the letter fervently and hid it away in her bosom, "it is quite clear. He has written to prepare me for the shock which he has too much for me. How thoughtful! And he does not forget that I am a martyr to chibblains. How sympathetic!"

Ten times did she commence her reply—ten times did she tear what she had written up—ten times did she start up, crease her fastidious taste was satisfied, Josiah had been reserved; she would be reserved too.
