

"I never had any intention of attempting to bias the opinions of any officials by giving them pass books and do not wish to do so. More than this, if I thought that any person was being influenced by the acceptance of a pass I would revoke it at once.

"The giving of passes is not a bribe, but merely a custom. It has come down to us since railway companies were first organized, and it seems hard to do away with. Our company did not start the custom in St. John, but when we took over the old company we simply carried out this plan as followed by them.

"And the tendency of the bresent company is to gradually lessen instead of to increase the number of passes issued. This thing is a misance and you may be sure we are not anxious to keep it up, but it is a custom and, as I said, is hard to drop.
"But what I want to make clear is that the giving of these passes to aidermen and others is not in any sense a bribe, and if I thought the books were for one moment regarded as such I would stop them at once."

WILL SPEND \$300,000.

Great Improvements in the Street Railway This Year.

Railway This Year.

The Street Railway Co. will spend \$300,000 in improvements to their line during the coming summer, and when the contemplated work is completed the line will be half as long again as it is at present. That is, instead of twelve miles of track in the city there will be eighteen miles, and the equipment will be much improved.

Work will start as soon as the first shipments of stock arrive, and these are expected in a few weeks. The company has purchased from a Glasgow concern twelve miles of ninety pound rails, eight hundred tons in all, and efforts are now being made to have these brought here by the direct steamer. It is expected that these arrangements will be made.

The tires for the new road are coming chiefly from the North Shore, and some of them will probably be forwarded to St. John within a very short time. There is still considerable snow in the north and until this melts loading on the cars will be rather difficult, but there will be no delay in the work on account of the ties.

When everything is in readiness, the double tracking of Douglas avenue will receive the first attention and it is probable that at the same time a gang will start on the new line around Wentworth street and King street east. This will be pushed as rapidly as possible, and then work on the Carleton line will be commenced. It is hoped that the entire six miles of new track will be finished before autumn.
