

## OVER FOUR HUNDRED

Complete Returns from the Districts Swept by **Tornadoes** 

lief Measures Being Taken by the State Suffering in Some Quarters.

atlanta, Ga., April 2.—Practically complete returns from all portions of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia show that the death list in the tornadoes of last Friday, Saturday and Sinday will not be more than four hundred. The number of injured stands tonight at about 1,200, with reports indicating that a numbeor of persons hurt will probably die.

Relief has been extended by the United States government to Hattlesburg, Purvis and other towns in the four states, and the states themselves took prompt measures today for the prompt assistance of those made home—

The floods which threatened parts of Georgia today caused no loss of life but did considerable property damage. The few who may yet be added to the fatalities are possibly a score of the two hundred most seriously wounded in hospitals throughout these states. The remaining injured, numbering about 1,000 were reported to be on the road to recovery.

about 1,000 were reported to be on the road to recovery.

The gravity of today's situation centred in the problems of the living, namely hunger and shelter. At least one stricken town was reported to have eaten literally its last meal at noon today and it was relying on charity for its supper. Fortunately the great territory over which the stricken districts were scattered, left an opportunity for the unharmed neighbors everywhere throughout these centres of want to furnish relief more quickly and effectively than would have been possible had the disaster been confined to one place. Cities, little and big, on all sides of the tornado belt made rapid preparations today to ship supplies and money into the tornado district. New Orleans started a money subscription and also slip-

ed a money subscription and also ship-ped food to Amite, the worst camaged town in this state. Amite was the town which reported its food supply practically exhausted today, otherwise the little fown was making rapid progress toward rehabil-

itation.

Purvis, Miss., was one of the few communities still reporting fresh lists of injured and dying who were found in the outlying country, some of them in a desperate state from lack of care. Amite, Purvis and several other stricken towns were badly frightened last night by heavy winds, but the only fatalities reported in this second storm was near Selma. Ala., where 4 negroes perished.

Belated reports from Hattlesburg, Miss., indicate that the loss of life in that section is much larger than at

that section is much larger than at first reported. At a turpentine camp between Epps and Purvis, twelve dead were found and fourteen injured. Eight white persons were injured at Lowler's Hill.

MR. WYNDHAM'S IRISH LAND ACT

The Departmental Committee Has Issued

Its Report.

LONDON, April 27-In view of th comparative stagnation in purchase under Mr. Wyndham's Irish Land Act under Mr. Wyndham's Irish Land Act, owing to difficulties in connection with the provision of funds, a Departmental Committee was appointed in November, Mr. Runciman, M. P., financial secretary to the treasury, as chairman, to inquire how far the difficulties can be diminished or removed without imposing additional charges on the Expensiver. This committee has now isbe diminished or removed without imposing additional charges on the Exchequer. This committee has now issued its report. It was estimated when the Land Bill was before Parliament in 1903 that the whole of the purchases would be covered by a capital sum of \$500,000,000, and provision was made by which a bonus of \$60,000,000 was to be contributed out of the Imperial Exchequer to bridge the gap between what the tenant could afford to pay and what the landlord was willing to accept. Considerable financial difficulty has, however, been created in the carrying through of transactions by reason of the unfavorable condition of the money market, which has resulted in only \$104,560,000 in cash being obtained by the issue of \$118,750,000 of stock, leaving an "excess" of \$14,185,000, which necessitates an annual charge for 681-2 years, of \$461,000. In the opinion of Mr. Enneiman's Committee the amount that will be required to finance the Land Act to completion will be not \$500,000,000 but \$800,000,000 or more. Pending purchase agreements represent about \$20,000,000, and when these have been concluded over \$35,000,000 out of the \$60,000,000 bonus will have been paid, leaving only \$25,000,000. This means that the bonus, if spread equally over all, will be hardly 5 per cent.; under the Act it was fixed for the first five years at 12 per cent. This reduction in the inducement to sell offered by the State to the landlord, the Committee think, will further hamper the administration of the Act in the furture, and they suggest that the limit of \$60,000,000 or cash for bonus might be extended if necessary. The committee recommend that notice should be given of a date after which no agreements can be accepted or entered into under the terms of the Land Act, and that fresh legislation be passed for agreements subsequent to that date.
