HOSPITAL AND ODDFELLOWS' HALL WANT LOOKING AFTER

Safety Board in Session Last Evening Recommend More Fire-Fighting Facilities for These Buildings—Hydrants for West Side—Increased License Fee Hits Moving Picture Shows

Last evening the Board of Public Safety held its last meeting in the present civic year. Considerable business came before the board.

The greater part of this was connected with the fire department and with the recent inspection of the schools and other buildings.

Ald. Baskin made reference to the manner in which the recent fire on Duke street, West End, was handled, and stated that it was generally understood in Carleton that the hydrant at the corner of Lancaster and Duke streets was of the value and for that reason was not used in the fire of the 18th instant.

Chief Kerr disagreed with the alderman and said that the hydrant had been used. He laid the blame for the handling of the fire on District Engineer McLeod.

It was decided to supplement the fire alarm boxes on West Side with boxes not used at present. Chief Kerr was also instructed to prepare a plan of the location of additional hydrants on West Side to report to the board at the next meeting.

Public Buildings

The condition of public buildings that were considered by the Safety Board dealt with the General Public Hospital and the Oddfellows' Hall.

The condition of the latter building was said to be particularly dangerous. The hospital was reported to be in a better state but poorly supplied with chemical extinguishers.

The board decided to call the attention of the proper persons to the recommendation of the report.

Among other things considered by the board was the appointment of a janitor for the City Hall.

Geo. Clark of the North End was given the position. It was also decided to have the law concerning the licensing of shows and exhibitions changed so as to permit of higher fees being levied.

This will particularly affect the moving picture shows.

Those present at the meeting were Ald. Vanward, Ald. Hamn, Ald. Holder, Ald. Sprout, Ald. Kelly, Ald. Prink, Ald. Baskin, Ald. McGowan, Ald. Christie, Chief Kerr, Director Wisely and the Common Clerk, Ald. Baxter was also present.

Chief Kerr reported that Wallace Fisher had been appointed janitor for No. 6.—The report was received.

The pay sheet was then passed and referred to the Treasury Board.

Renewal of lease was granted by Thomson, Duke street, at \$5 per annum.

Director Wisely announced that Geo. Clark of Murray street, had been appointed janitor of the City Hall.

The appointment was ratified.

Exhibition Building

The director next brought up the matter of repairing the Exhibition building.

Ald. Holder thought no repairs should be made this year.

Ald. Sprout wanted to know what was to be done. Was the building to be burnt down or allowed to fall down?

Ald. Holder moved that a committee be appointed to examine the building and to interview the Exhibition Association and inform that body that as the Mills Department was liable to take over the building it was not advisable to make repairs.

Ald. Holder and Ald. Sprout were appointed on the committee by Chairman Vanward.

The director next reported that the committee appointed to look into the matter of repairing the Carleton City Hall had reported that the building was in a bad state of repair.

The committee also reported that the present band room at the water service and to put a closet in a room off the hall.

Ald. Holder moved that if the large room mentioned was to be used for moving pictures it would be impossible to rent the hall upstairs for the same purpose.

On the motion of Ald. Prink it was decided to have the committee submit a final report on the matter at the next meeting.

Fire Alarm Boxes

Ald. Baxter suggested that a number of unused fire-alarm boxes be installed on the West Side.

Ald. Baskin embodied the suggestion in a motion, which was passed.

The director was instructed to obtain a carpet for the chamberlain's private office, also to call for tenders for the necessary painting and whitewashing to be done in the City Building.

Holidays for the policemen and firemen were next considered. The usual holidays were granted.

Policeman James Jones was granted full pay for eight days during which he was sick. Policeman Merrick was granted full pay for four days.

Ald. Holder wished to know what had become of the sections of the report on the condition of public buildings which had been referred to the Board of Public Safety.

The common clerk then read the sections of the report dealing with the General Public Hospital.

It was suggested that platforms of the fire escapes on the hospital be made level with the ward floors, that the ladder steps be made broader and covered with wood that larger and more numerous chemical extinguishers be supplied by the commissioners of the hospital.

Ald. Prink moved that a copy of this section of the report be forwarded to the hospital commissioners and that they be required to carry out the suggestions made.—Carried.

D. J. Purdy's New River Boat Proves to be Fast and Comfortable

Yesterday afternoon D. J. Purdy's new river steamer, Sinicness, carried a large number of invited guests on a trial trip for nearly ten miles up the river and back. The boat started about 3 o'clock in the afternoon with Fred Mabee, captain; Herbert McClurey, mate; and W. W. Roberts, engineer, returning at five o'clock in the evening.

As the steamer left the wharf at Indiantown the steamers which lined the water front blew a salute in chorus and loud cheers arose from the many spectators on the wharf. Nearly seventy-five passengers enjoyed the trip and viewed the magnificently equipped boat from bow to stern.

Owing to her machinery not having been tested the boat did not travel at high speed most of the trip, but to display her possibilities the first mile was passed at a rate of speed beyond that of the average boat on the river.

The interior of the new boat is prettily painted and presents a clean and attractive appearance. There are five double state-rooms and a ladies' cabin beautifully upholstered with red plush with wash rooms and closet attached. There is also a bridal chamber fitted with every comfort.

OPERATIONS OF

MR. WYNHAM'S

IRISH LAND ACT
The Departmental Committee Has Issued Its Report.

LONDON, April 27.—In view of the comparative stagnation in purchases under Mr. Wynham's Irish Land Act, owing to difficulties in connection with the provision of funds, a Departmental Committee was appointed in November, Mr. Ronman, M. P., financial secretary to the treasury, as chairman, to inquire how far the difficulties can be diminished or removed without imposing additional charges on the Exchequer. This committee has now issued its report. It was estimated when the Land Bill was before Parliament in 1901 that the whole of the purchases would be covered by a capital sum of \$50,000,000, and provision was made by which a bonus of \$60,000,000 was to be contributed out of the Imperial Exchequer to bridge the gap between what the tenant could afford to pay and what the landlord was willing to accept. Considerable financial difficulty has, however, been created in the carrying through of transactions by reason of the unfavorable condition of the money market, which has resulted in only \$104,563,000 in cash being obtained by the issue of \$112,750,000 of stock, leaving an "excess" of \$818,000, which necessitates an annual charge for 63-1/2 years, of \$461,000. In the opinion of Mr. Ronman's committee the amount that will be required to finance the Land Act to completion will be not \$30,000,000 but \$200,000,000. Pending purchase agreements represent about \$70,000,000, and when these have been concluded over \$35,000,000 out of the \$200,000,000 will have been paid, leaving only \$25,000,000 for future agreements estimated to total little short of \$60,000,000. This means that the bonus, if spread equally over all, will be hardly 5 per cent. under the Act. The committee think, however, that the limit of \$20,000,000 for the bonus might be extended if necessary. The committee recommend that notice should be given of a date after which no agreement can be accepted or entered into under the terms of the Land Act, and that fresh legislation be required for agreements subsequent to that date.

FOR MISSING JEWELS

Father Sold Crown Jewels to Avoid a Scandal — Bank Governor Admits It.

LISBON, April 27.—King Manuel has announced his intention of personally refunding the value of the missing crown jewels to the royal treasury. His attitude has caused universal admiration. When King Manuel was divorced as ruler of Portugal in 1834, the crown jewels, valued at \$2,000,000, were confiscated and deposited in the Bank of Portugal as the property of the State. Recently the Republican press has charged that absolute proof existed of the fact that a large portion of these jewels had been sold without the consent of Parliament to meet the expenses of the royal household. King Manuel thereupon ordered that an inventory be taken and this proved that the value of \$750,000 were missing. The governor of the Bank of Portugal was questioned and admitted the removal of the sale had been made upon the urgent demand of King Carlos who desired to meet the pressing debts of the royal household in order to avoid a scandal.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATION:
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 2 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.
The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.
(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother) in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.
(4) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above may have living with himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.
Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.



THE MIGHTIEST RESERVOIR OF POWER.

Having its long axis in its tube of the mirror axis.

The device thus far described had little beyond experimental value. In the beginning of the twentieth century, however, was the first practical employment of a solar engine. This was set up at the orchard farm, Pasadena, California, for the purpose of pumping water, and it has continued for some years in successful operation. Here again is the truncated conical mirror, which is thirty-three feet in diameter at the top and fifteen feet at the bottom. The rays of the sun are thus received on seven hundred and eighty-eight facets, whence they are focused on the boiler.

COST OF CONSTRUCTION.

The mass of glass and iron composing the mirror is moved by autoly arranged clockwork, so that it is automatically held with its axis directed toward the sun. The boiler is carried on the same frame, moving, of course, as the mirror moves. It has a long, narrow, horizontal tube of water, with eight cubic feet of steam capacity. From the boiler, steam is conducted to a compound engine operating a centrifugal pump. To set the machine in operation, it is turned by hand until its axis is set going. It is stopped by merely turning the mirror away from the sun. The whole apparatus is so nicely balanced with its weight on roller bearings that a hand pressure of only a few pounds is necessary to shift its position. The engine develops fifteen horsepower, with a pumping capacity of fourteen hundred gallons a minute.

The great difficulty with engines of this character is that the cost of construction is almost prohibitive, while the mirror surfaces are ill-calculated to withstand the ravages of the elements. For these reasons the solar motor in its present form cannot be widely employed. Now, however, a Pennsylvania engineer announces that he has perfected an apparatus altogether unlike the foregoing, whereby solar heat is cheaply converted into mechanical energy. His method is so simple that it promises success.

POWER OF THE SUN.

The inventor has constructed as his working model a large hotted, sixty feet in length by eighteen in width. It is made by letting wooden boxes into the ground, and covering this with a double top of hothouse glass, having one inch of air space between the panes. The hothouse is filled with iron pipes, painted black. These form the generating plant. In our climate, the pipes are filled with ether, but in the tropics water serves the purpose. The ether in the pipes is converted into vapor, passes through the engine, enters a condenser, and then return to the boiler. This circuit is a closed one. The whole effect is secured without any use of fuel; the accumulated heat of the sun is sufficient to vaporize the ether.

The inventor declares that with this apparatus he gets a temperature of from three hundred and fifty to five hundred degrees. In the tropics this would mount easily to a thousand.

Plants are to be established in the tropics where the fierce heat combined with low humidity offers the best advantages. There is almost no limit to the power that might thus be drawn from the sun. Changed to portable form, in liquid air or storage batteries, the genie of the greatest lamp, the sun would be ours to command.

BOARD OF TRADE BOOM WAS COMMENCED TODAY

Committee Hope to Add Nearly Two Hundred New Members Within the Next Week

The membership committee of the board of trade has commenced its campaign which has during the past few days been announced in the city papers. Last year the effort to increase the membership of the board was made with the result that thirty-two names were added to the roll. That was not a clearly planned campaign and the present one, but the success achieved then with comparatively little effort has led to the belief that by well directed work much more may be done. For the present a list of between one hundred and fifty and two hundred names has been prepared. This has been divided into a number of smaller lists, and each of these has been taken by two of the membership committees. Every man whose name appears on these lists will be seen by the committee-men, and asked to join the board. Active canvassing was begun this morning and it is said that a dozen new members were secured within a very short time.

It is the hope of the committee that at the May meeting of the board which takes place in about ten days, the majority of the present big list of names may be added to the roll and that the membership, which at present is two hundred and ten, may be increased immediately to nearly four hundred.

It has been found that there are many business and professional men in St. John who have never been asked to join the board, and it is felt that a large number of these are only waiting to be asked.

PREMIER HAZEN PREPARING AN IMMIGRATION POLICY

Commission to be Appointed to Get Information from All Parts of the Province

The Star understands that Premier Hazen will very shortly announce an immigration policy for New Brunswick along the lines advanced by the late government, but on a somewhat more elaborate scale. While the details of this scheme are not yet worked out sufficiently definite to warrant an official announcement, the outcome is as follows:—

A commission of two or three men will be appointed to visit all parts of the province and secure all available information with regard to the conditions existing, the opportunities, and the requirements in the various industries. Accurate figures will be obtained concerning lands suitable for colonization and all this information will be tabulated. This will occupy considerable time and when it is completed the commission will be transformed into an immigration bureau. If such a course is deemed advisable, or else new men will be selected. Agents will be appointed, and it is the policy of the late government, to visit European countries and the United States, and these men will have at their fingers ends such facts as have previously been obtained.

JAMES ARMSTRONG, OF CARLETON, IS DEAD

James H. Armstrong, a very well known resident of the West Side, died at his home 311 Lancaster street this morning after a lengthy illness. Mr. Armstrong who was a blacksmith by trade, was born at Wigan in Lancashire, England, and came here when 14 years of age. He learned his trade with a blacksmith named Nichols and afterwards for many years was in business for himself on the West Side. Mr. Armstrong at the time of his death was in his seventy-fourth year. On Tuesday, 1904 he was married to Miss Eliza J. Warnock, daughter of the late Walter Warnock who curries him Mr. Armstrong, who leaves three sons: Walter of the Inland Revenue Department, at Ottawa, William of Church E. Gates and Co., lumber dealers of York and James D., of the C. P. R. staff in St. John; and two brothers living in Barrie, Ont. Mr. Armstrong was a member of the Carleton Presbyterian church and Carleton Union Lodge F. and A. M.

CARLETON WOMEN WERE CHASED BY A GANDER

There were five prisoners on the police bench this morning. Three of the number were drunks, and one of these was James Boyd. James is better known as "Heaver," and yesterday his wife made complaint that he had been beating her. The police were to have notified Boyd to appear in court tomorrow but he saved them that trouble by getting drunk and being arrested. He was remanded to jail until the wife could be heard.

Wm. Morris, of York Point, some days ago escaped from the chain gang. He was recaptured last night and pleaded not guilty. He was remanded. J. J. Hudson was reported by Sergeant Ross for allowing grease to wander about the Carleton streets. The Sergeant informed the court that Hudson's grease were on the street Sunday, and an old gander in the flock persisted in chasing women. The magistrate told Hudson that he must not allow his "gander to wander." Hudson was allowed to go under a suspended penalty.
