The administration currency reform bill, proposing a revision of the financial system of the United States and the creation of regional reserve banks to act as stabilizing elements in the banking and financial world, passed the Senate tonight by a vote of fifty-four to thirtyfour.

Senator Hitchcock, who had led the opposition to the bill, returned to the Democratic ranks, and Senator Weeks of Massachusetts, a banker, and one of the leaders on the Republicans side, with five other Republicans and Senator Poindexter, (Progressive) voted for the measure.



Hire Ships in Summer.

The chartered ships are hired only during the summer. The vessel belonging to the company is sent out as a tramp steamer during the nine months of closed season at Spitsbergen. She gets timber at Archanel for Holland, then carries a cargo to Lisbon and brings out iron ore for England whence she can secure a cargo of coal for the continent and mayhap goes up to the Baltic.

The fleet of vessels may range in tonnage from 400 to 2200 tons and the largest will load 3800 tons. These ships will make from three to five trips in one season according to the rapidity with which they are unloaded at the ports on the continent.




