
General Peyton C. March, chief of staff, has sent a letter to Senator George E. Chamberlain, chairinan of the Senate Military Affairs committee of the last Congress, setting forth the conclusions reached by General Per-shing concerning the fighting which took place in France on the morning of Nov. 11, 1918, the day on which the armistice went into effect. 




