Moreover as in the course of this year's work I came to know him better I was made to marvel at his breadth and depth of knowledge. Only a phenomenal memory and tireless industry could account for his vast stores of learning. It is, I suppose, in a sense true to say that a man's scholarship is not so much revealed by what he says as by what he does not say. In other words it is not the explicit statement of a direct fact, but the passing and unexplained references in ordinary conversation that reveal the well stored mind. That was pardy possible to talk with him for more than a few minutes without being made to feel that there were in his mind depths of thought and learning far beyond either the experimence or power of ordinary men. His death has left the church in Canada distinctly poorer. It is hardly going to far to say, I think, as a theological scholar, there is no one in the church to take his place.


