The Lumbering Interest.

Here is an important item news telegraphed to the St. Cross Courier from Fredericton:

We learn by telegraph from Fredericton that the Hon. John J. Fraser has been appointed Provincial Secretary in room of the late Hon. Geo. L. Hatheway.

—Hon. Robert Young has accepted Presidency of Council.

Crown Land sales begin thirteenth August, just price eight dollars.

Simultaneous with the appointment of the Solicitor of the River Du Loop Railway to a high position in the Government, and proposed introduction to the floors of the Assembly, comes the information that the Government, which is absolutely controlled by the Railway Company, has advanced the rate of Timber Millage to all Lumbermen throughout the Province!

The Company, including several leading lumber operators who are its most prominent members, will have control of nearly two millions of acres of the Public Lands of this small Province besides the large tracts they already own; and these vast way lands they are selecting from among the finest lands, not from the settlement lands, as was expected. If they can, through their influence inside and outside of the Government, succeed in advancing the cost of lumbering on all who are not within the charmed circle of "River Du Loop," they will do a tremendous stroke of business for themselves at the expense of everybody else. The game will come with the cost of getting logs into Fredericton, and the end may be foreseen without any difficulty.

The gentlemen in the Company who are not interested in extensive lumbering operations, will be doing the public and the lumbering interest of the country a service by carefully watching the development of this attempt to enhance the cost of lumber on all who cannot cut or have not purchased large tracts of timber lands. We are informed that the cost of getting logs into Fredericton and manufacturing them has increased fifty per cent in the past three years—the further addition to the expense when this new scheme has succeeded can be realized even by the uninitiated.

The Canal Surveys.

Says the Moncton Times—

The Times again attempts to start an agitation in Westmorland for a new survey for the Bay of Fundy Canal. It is plain that now, before the election, in the time and delay is dangerous. The Times means mischief but will fail in its efforts even if Rockland comes to its aid.

What the Times means, "what it desires to impress upon the people of Shediac, Moncton, Dorchester, Rockland, Memramouc, Dover and other points interested, is that unless they move promptly the Canal via Bay Verte will be a fixed fact. They should not be "cold water" now thrown upon their project by the Moncton Times for some insupportable reason—a journal that has all along been crying out for new surveys, and now that the time has arrived when the surveys must be made or the opportunity forever lost, suddenly calls a halt and suggests "delay." It is the Times that "means mischief," mischief of the very worst description to a scheme on which a large body of the inhabitants of Westmorland County have set their hearts. The people should heed the protesting policy of the Times, but act at once, not energetically and earnestly, and they may yet accomplish much. We repeat,—there is no time to be lost.

Farworth and Jardine's Wood Circular.

Deal Liverpool, June 29, says: "Of Spruce Deals there has been a fair import, and as prices have given way at least 50 per cent Standard during the month, a large proportion has gone into the hands of the country trade, the consumption during the month having been 4,014 Standard. The present stock here is less than one month's ordinary consumption, still the trade refrain from buying freely, expecting prices to go yet lower. Pine Deals are readily saleable at full prices."

At 40 cents "Several cargoes of Spruce Deals have been sold by auction at from \$8 12 64 to \$9 26 64, the last sale from St. John having been at \$8 15 64—Pine Deals from St. John have been sold at \$9 7 64 to \$9 10 64 per Standard. Quebec Pine Deals are difficult to sell at prices to cover cost. Lathwood and Spruce Spars are wanted.

The stock of N. B. and N. S. Deals held in Liverpool, June 29, was 1,138 Standards, against 4,203 deals at same date last year.

INTERESTING HYMNAL CEREMONIES.

We copy from the Courier the following interesting description of the ceremonial connected with the Marriage, in Christ Church, St. Stephen, on Thursday morning, of Mr. F. Tuller, of Ottawa, to Miss Annie Chipman, daughter of Z. Chipman, Esq. The bride is sister to the lady of the Minister of Customs.

"The Church was filled to overflowing by an interested crowd of spectators, a number of seats in the centre aisle being reserved for the bridal party. Part of the palisading in front of the Church was taken away to allow the carriages to be driven up to the church door. The entrance to the church was carpeted. The Chancel was beautifully decorated with flowers and evergreens.
