

The session congratulates the congregation on the encouraging nature of the reports received from all departments of the Church work. Judging by these there has been steady advance during the year all along the line.

The Managers report a general improvement in the ordinary congregational revenue. It is specially gratifying to notice a growing liberality towards the missions of the Church, the contributions for the year just closed showing an increase of fully wenty per cent over those of the preceding year.

Sabbath-School work has been carried on with great vigor and heartiness, both in the Home and in the Mission schools. The Session rejoices to find a most efficient staff of teachers at work, with others equally enthusiastic, ready to enter on this noble service for Christ, as soon as classes are ready for them. In the kindred work of temperance, the Association continues to hold monthly meetings for the dissemination of wholesome sentiments on the subject, for the protection of the young and for the reformation of the erring.

Another indication, and not the least marked, of the Church's prosperity, is the large attendance at the Sabbath services, and especially on Communion seasons. The Session therein commend the congregation and remind them also of the Wednesday evening prayer meeting, affectionately urging them to spend this one hour of the week together in quiet Christian fellowship. At the beginning of the year the number of names on the church roll was 343; at the close of the year it was 380. During the twelve months 21 names were removed, and 58 added. Of those removed 10 died, and, 11 left the city and were certified to other churches. Of those added, 34 were received on profession of faith, and 24 by certificate.

Reviewing thus these unmistakable indications of prosperity and growth, we would not forget that they are outward and visible, nor should we fail to remind each other that the external organization is but a means to an end—the ingathering and up-building of the children of God in holy Christian character. We earnestly exhort you, therefore, brethren, to still greater diligence in the use of all the means of grace, to prayerfulness, activity and consistency in the daily religious life, and we commend you one and all "to God, and to the Word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."

After some explanatory remarks by the Treasurer it was moved, seconded and unanimously resolved, that the reports now read be received, adopted, printed and circulated among the congregation.

The election of office-bearers and members of the Board of Management was then proceeded with, and resulted as follows:—

The Chairman then made some remarks as to the spiritual condition and progress of the congregation, and asked the members to attend the Wednesday evening prayer meetings more regularly, as they were productive of much good.

The envelope or schedule system of collections was discussed by the meeting, and it was agreed that the Board of Management at its first meeting, take the matter into consideration, and if deemed advisable, submit some scheme for the approval of the congregation.

Refreshments were served during the evening.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX CHURCH For year ending 31st December, 1882.

At the last annual meeting of the congregation, held on 29th March, notice of motion was given of a proposed amendment to Article 1 of the By-laws, and at a special meeting held on 26th April, 1882, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"That Article 1 of the By-laws be, and is hereby altered by substituting the word 'January' for the word 'March' in the third line, which alteration shall have for its effect the holding of the annual meeting of the congregation in the month of January instead of the month of March as heretofore; and the making up of the Books and accounts of the congregation to 31st December in each year instead of 28th February, the first financial period to consist of ten months, ending 31st December, 1882, and thereafter, of each twelve months ending with the calendar year." In accordance therefore with the said alteration, your Board has pleasure in presenting you with the following report for the ten months ending 31st December, 1882, and desires to acknowledge with grateful hearts. God's goodness and mercy, which has been poured out abundantly upon the congregation during the said period.

By the Treasurer's statement shortly to be read, you will learn with pleasure that the Church is now entirely free from debt, the liability of \$1700, incurred for alterations to basement having been

liquidated during the past year. Subscriptions to the amount of \$1393, were collected on behalf of said liability, and the balance, \$307, was paid out of the ordinary funds.

The receipts from pew rents and collections, shew a proportionate increase for the ten months, and not-withstanding the heavy disbursements, the surplus in the Treasurer's hands at 31st December was \$493.94.

The number of sittings allocated at the close of the financial year, was 444 to 146 names.

Pew rent this year is promised to the amount of \$2339.

The Sabbath School and other associations connected with the Church have been carried on with zeal and energy, as their several reports will show.

Several improvements have been made in connection with the heating of the Church, which have proved quite satisfactory.

During the summer, our esteemed Pastor had his usual vacation, the pulpit during his absence being satisfactorily supplied.

The members of the Board retiring this year are Messrs. W. S. Evans, Walter Paul and George W. Lundie, who are all eligible for re-election.

Your Board has resolved that the Pastor's stipend be increased to \$2500 from 1st January, 1883.

In conclusion, your Board, while congratulating you upon the very satisfactory report, and the fact that the Church is now entirely free from debt, desires to express its grateful sense of the Divine presence and encouragement through all the events of the year, and feel with confidence that if the

# KNOX CHURCH CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting was held on the evening of the 3rd January, 1883. Rev. Mr. Fleck occupied the chair, and the meeting was opened with devotional exercises, after which the Chairman called upon the Recording Secretary to read the

#### ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Committee in laying before you the result of the year's work, desire to recognize the "good hand of the Lord upon us," as shown by the very favorable report they are now enabled to submit.

By the change of expiry of the financial year to the 31st December, this report only embraces ten months.

Your Committee scarcely expected that the subscriptions for that term would come up to those of ordinary years, but are happy to say that the response of the Church to their appeal has been so general and generous that they can now report an addition, both in subscribers and subscriptions.

The total amount raised is \$1,122.50, from 108 members, as against \$943 last year, from 105 subscribers—an exhibit which certainly speaks well for the missionary spirit of the congregation.

This favorable showing is doubtless in some measure due to the circular issued by your Committee last June, to the members and adherents of the Church, for though the return of these was very limited, they showed a gain of 8 new subscribers.

In this connection your Committee would heartily submit that much of the success of this year is owing to the zealous labours of the lady collectors.

Mr. Jas. Brown, Superintendent of the Taylor Church Sabbath-School, reports another prosperous year. Increased accommodation has been perforce secured by the addition of three large rooms to the building. The roll at date contains 23 teachers and office-bearers, and 196 scholars, and the work done includes, besides the ordinary Sabbath-School work, Dorcas work, and classes twice a week to teach backward scholars reading and writing.

The Missionary Record has been circulated in increased numbers during the year, and doubtless keeps alive the interest in Missions which this Society seeks to foster.

Thanking God and taking courage, your Committee respectfully submit this report.

#### KNOX CHURCH SABBATH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

For year ending December 31st, 1882.

In presenting our Annual Report for 1882, it is our pleasing duty to announce steady progress in almost every respect, and to acknowledge our deep sense of gratitude to God for the many blessings bestowed on us during the past year.

Our School was closed during the months of July and August, as it was found on inquiry that the majority of Teachers and Scholars would be absent from the city during that period.

The attendance has been very well maintained, and shows a slight increase over that of last year, the average number present being:—Teachers and Officers, 23; Scholars and Bible Classes, 131; and the numbers on roll at present; Teachers and Officers, 28; Scholars and Bible Classes, 196 We have now great hopes of the success of the coming year, as the attendance of the past two months has exceeded that of any previous year of our history.

Our Missionary Collections on the whole have been very good, as will be shown by the Treasurer's statement, but we regret to observe that the interest in the Children's Missionary Society appears to be lessening, and we would recommend that some change be made in the carrying on of this important branch of Sunday School work.

The Library is still in good form, and continues to supply the Scholars with abundance of good and

instructive reading. A few months ago we weeded out about 50 books which had done long service, and sent them, by request, to the Rev. Mr. Coboue, who is doing Mission work at Joliette, Que. We are at present engaged in making an addition of from 50 to 100 new books, which, we trust, will make the department still more effective

The Scholars have, as usual, been supplied with various Sabbath School Papers, and the Teachers with the Sunday School Times, as heretofore.

The Rev. Mr. Fleck, not being able to resume his Young Men's Class at the re-opening in September, Prof. Campbell kindly undertook to conduct a Bible Class on Sunday afternoon in the Church during school hours. This class, we are happy to report, is being very well attended.

Our Annual Soiree was held Feb. 3rd, and was very largely attended by the Scholars and their friends. A social gathering and Magic Lantern Entertainment was also provided for the Scholars at the re-opening of the School in September.

The usual Sabbath School Pic-nic was held June 15th, at Isle Gros Bois. Owing to the unfavorable state of the weather it was not quite as enjoyable as we would have wished, but all arrived safely home, seemingly none the worse for the many showers which had taken place during the day.

We have lost, during the year the services of several Teachers, who, for various reasons, were compelled to relinquish their labours with us; we are, however, thankful to be able to report that we have also had the good fortune to have their places filled by others, thus leaving us well equipped for the coming year's work.
